## JOHN A. McMAHAN, EARLY PIONEER, DIES

### Death Occurs Early This Morning After a Long Illness of Paralysis

John A. McMahan, one of the best-known residents of Lane county, died at his home at 722 Washington street in Eugene this morning at 12:30 o'clock, after a long illness of paralysis, at the age of 69 years. The funeral will be held at the First Christian church Friday at 2 p. m., with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. D. C. Kellems will conduct the services.

John A. McMahan was born at Jamestown, Hendricks county, Indiana, April 12, 1841. In 1842 he, with his parents, moved to Illinois, where he remained until May 25, 1864, at which time he, seeing greater opportunities in the West, left his kindred and started in a train of 33 wagons, comprising sixty men, besides women and children, over the Oregon trail, arriving at Boise, Idaho, September 15th, in which vicinity he remained until October 1, 1865, when he started for Portland, Or., arriving there after nearly a month of travel. In March, 1869, he came to Lane county, where he engaged in logging and delivering to the O. & C. Railroad Co. until September 5, 1872, when he and Mrs. Catherine Callison were married and they established a home east of Springfield, where they remained until 1903, with the exception of one year, which was spent in Whitman county, Washington. March, 1890, he obeyed Christ and was baptized by D. C. Kellems, and ever since took a prominent part in the Kingdom of his Lord and Master.

He was always a public-spirited man of affairs. He served one term as county commissioner of Lane county, April 12, 1903. At the time of his death he was a member of the board of regents of the Eugene Bible University, and an elder of the Church of Christ at Eugene.

Owing to failing health it became necessary, in 1903, to leave the farm and the family moved to Eugene, where they have since resided. He departed this life April 7th, at 12:30 a. m., aged 68 years, 11 months and 25 days.

Deceased leaves a wife, Catherine; three daughters, Mrs. H. W. Eyer, of Springfield, Or.; Pearl and Minnie, of Eugene, Or.; and two brothers, Dr. C. W. of Louisville, Ky., and O. A. of Thurston, Or., to mourn the loss of a devoted husband, a loving father and brother.

## CHICAGO'S COUNCIL GOES DEMOCRATIC

Chicago, April 5.—The complexion of Chicago's city council was changed from republican to democratic in today's election. In the 35 wards, the democrats elected 21 candidates, republicans 12 and independents 2.

The new council will stand; democrats, 29; republicans, 31; independents, 2. The latter will vote with the republicans, but the democrats have a compact machine with enough margin to put through any legislation. Previously they had only 17 wards in the democratic column.

The election was characterized by a crusade by the municipal voters' league, a non-partisan organization, against the section of alleged "gray wolves" for the new city council. Alderman John C. Coughlin, bath-house John, of the First ward, was re-elected by a large majority.

It is probable that the new council will have to deal with the problem of constructing a passenger subway and with gas and telephone rates.

## YOUNG "RINGLING" CONFESSES IN JAIL

Albany, Or., April 5.—Lodged in jail last night for trying to force his attentions upon a young woman, the youth who asserted that he was a son of Al Ringling, one of the owners of the big Ringling circus, today confessed that his name is not Ringling and that his stories about establishing winter quarters in Albany for one of the big Ringling shows were creations of his brain. He is a half-breed Indian named Baxter. His purpose in telling these stories was to secure free board and an automobile and some other property.

## SMUDGES IN ORCHARDS ARE BIG SUCCESS

The experiment of smudging in Lane county orchards to keep away the frost has been tried by a number of fruit growers this spring and as far as the results have been noticed, the plan has proved to be a success. During the winter the Southern Pacific company offered to furnish common grade oil, such as is used by the company's locomotives for fuel, for this purpose and a number of orchardists have been using it since early spring. The oil is placed in smudge pots in various parts of the orchards and when there are prospects of frost each one of the smudges is lighted and the heat from the burning oil keeps the frost away. More than a thousand gallons of oil have been used for this purpose in the orchards and berry patches surrounding Eugene this spring. About 40 smudge pots to the acre are placed and when all are burning, there is a decided rise in the temperature in that vicinity.

Secretary Holt, of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association is working on a scheme to install thermometers in the orchards to warn the growers of the approach of cold weather during the night. These appliances will be attached to wires leading to the sleeping room of the orchardist and when the temperature reaches a certain point the action of the thermometer will send an electric current over the wire and ring a bell, awakening the fruit grower who will arise and light his smudges. When the smudge idea gets a firm hold on the fruit growers of this county and they are installed by all fruit growers, there will be a saving of thousands of dollars each year.

## ILLINOIS WETS GAIN ADVANTAGE

Many Towns Formerly Dry Vote For Saloons At Election

Chicago, April 5.—Incomplete returns on the local option issue voted on in 240 cities and towns throughout Illinois today indicated gains for the "wets."

These figures showed that 32 towns changed from "dry" to "wet," 13 changed from "wet" to "dry." Of 93 towns 48 voted "wet." Among the cities which had been "dry" but which returned to "wet" were Decatur, Pana and Riverton. Issue Not Raised in Chicago.

The issue was not put before the voters in Chicago, the plan because of insufficient signatures to the petition. Danville township voted "wet," after one of the most exciting elections in its history.

At Grape Creek there were numerous fights and at one time looting, so having failed to call out the troops. In the course of the afternoon Judge Allen telegraphed Governor Deneen, asking him to order out the militia, but later the sheriff swore in a large number of deputies and the order for troops was cancelled.

**Important Cities "Wet."**  
The following important cities went "wet," the numbers indicating majorities:  
Carmi, 105; Springfield, 1300; Decatur, 695 (dry by 1000 two years ago); Joliet, 1500 to 2000; Centralia, 178; Rockford, 206; Freeport, 191; Elgin, 1200; Pana, 101 (dry two years ago); Danville, 485; Clinton 70 (dry two years ago); Bloomington, 84; Mattoon, —; Rock Island, —.

Majorities were won by the "drys" in the following places: Monmouth, 200; Taylorville, 41.

## ST. JOHN WETS CARRY ELECTION

Portland, Or., April 5.—With two-thirds of the vote yet uncounted at midnight, candidates on the progressive ticket in the St. Johns city election, held yesterday, conceded their defeat, with one exception, the candidate for treasurer. The proposition advocated by the progressive ticket to make St. Johns a "dry" town also suffered an overwhelming defeat.

Mayor J. F. Hendricks, it is estimated, was re-elected by a majority of 2 to 1. He headed the citizen's ticket, and all his associates, it is believed, were elected, with the possible exception of Adam Kaelmeier for city treasurer, who is being run a close race by W. Scott Kellogg, the progressive nominee.

J. C. Mounce wishes it stated that he was not "turned down" by the people of Springfield. His railroad proposition was referred to a committee of the council and the matter was talked over, but nothing definite was done, and he did not push the matter to a conclusion.

## VICTORY AT ELECTION FOR ADMINISTRATION

(From Tuesday's Daily Guard.)  
The annual municipal election yesterday resulted in a victory for the administration except in the Third ward, where E. L. Dorr, candidate for councilman on the independent ticket, defeated A. W. Gilbert, the administration candidate, by a large majority. The reason for Mr. Dorr's victory may be attributed to his public statement made in The Guard to the effect that he favored the completion of the city's power plant, that he was no corporation candidate and that he favored the commission form of government. The last named statement is probably what did the work. The commission government idea is becoming very popular and Mr. Dorr's friends say that statement elected him.

There was a very close race in the Fourth ward between S. P. Ness and W. C. Yoran, and it is said that Yoran owes his defeat to the union laborers, who opposed him. Friends of both candidates in this ward worked hard all day, but in the other wards there was little activity.

As predicted, the proposition to annex the outlying suburbs carried by a large majority. The vote in detail was as follows:

The total vote cast for annexation was 723, and against, 91, a majority of 632.

## HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR WESTERN LANE

The school board of Florence has been considering the matter of organizing a high school district in the west part of Lane county, to include Florence and several other districts in the Siuslaw valley. At present our high school is connected with the graded district, being under the management of the same board of directors. But the law provides for organizing a separate high school district to be controlled by an independent board of directors. The tuition received from the county is about sufficient to pay the wages of the teacher in charge of the department, under the present arrangement, so the only additional expense would be in providing the building and equipment. It would also give the people outside of Florence the right to have a say in conducting the high school, selecting the teacher, and all matters pertaining to its management.—West.

## EVERYBODY SHOULD HELP CENSUS MAN

On April 15 the census enumerators will begin their work in Eugene and Lane county, as they will throughout the United States. It is essential that they secure the exact population. Therefore it behooves every man and woman to reply to the questions asked promptly and candidly. Some of the questions may seem a trifle too personal. Do not let that disturb you. Uncle Sam wants to know these things. Otherwise they would not be asked.

The census man will want to know all about your affairs. Besides, he will ask for your age. That is a delicate subject to touch upon when women are concerned, but that should make no difference. Tell him. Be sure to give the names and other information about every member of your family. This does not merely mean the grown-ups, but the baby in arms as well.

The subject of taking the census is one of so great importance that President Taft has dealt with it in a letter addressed to all the people. The president aimed to expedite the work, and, by his timely suggestions, contribute toward its accuracy. In this letter he took occasion to assure everybody that all the information gathered by the census enumerators is of value and that the federal government's pledge is that it is to be regarded as strictly confidential. This pledge should be sufficient to the masses.

Your neighbor will learn nothing of what you have told the enumerator. It is none of anybody's business what information you have given—except, of course, the United States government's. This is a guarantee that nothing will leak from the records. The United States government tells its business to no one.

Bear the fact in mind that it is of interest to every resident to have these figures complete and accurate, because they must stand for the next ten years in all sorts of government appointments. Eugene expects to grow a great deal in the next ten years. During that time we want to have the advantage of as large an official population as possible.

Remember that there is no question of deceit involved in the matter. The census enumerator must swear to his returns. It is merely a matter of seeing that every nose is counted.
