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BOARD OF REGENTS ELECT NEW TEACHERS

Two valuable additions were made to the University of Oregon faculty at the board of regents' meeting this morning. Arthur J. Collier will fill the chair of geology, that has been vacant since the death of Professor Condon, and Dr. C. J. C. Bennett will fill the chair of psychology. Arthur Collier is a former graduate of the University of Oregon. He is now a member of the U. S. Geological Survey with headquarters in Washington, D. C. His home is here and he attended Harvard after he graduated from Oregon. Dr. Bennett is now president of the state normal school of West Virginia. He took a doctor's degree at Columbia University, majoring under psychology, and has had six years experience at teaching that branch.

The degree of doctor of letters was conferred by the board upon Prof. B. J. Hawthorne and he was made professor emeritus in the chair of psychology, which is an honorary title.

The following portion of the president's report was adopted and goes into effect:

New Instructors

"The appointment of two assistant instructors and one laboratory assistant in the departments of botany and zoology, at an aggregate amount not to exceed \$700, to supply vacancies left by terms of service. The aggregate amount would be an increase of only \$20 over that paid for the same service last year."

"An advance in the salary of Miss Mollie Hair, English and history instructor, in the correspondence department, and clerk of the department, to \$500. This salary is already provided for in the budget in the allowance of \$2000 made the corresponding department."

"The authorization of the employment of an assistant cataloguer in the University library, at a salary of not to exceed \$75 per month, with term of service beginning September 1st. The aggregate amount paid for library assistance for the year would not exceed the budget allowance of \$630. Two student assistants have been employed on part time heretofore, at a total cost of \$45 per month."

"The needs of the library now call for a permanent assistant, capable of giving help in the rapidly increasing work of cataloguing new books."

"The authorization of an assistant in the men's gymnasium, at an expense not to exceed \$400 per year."

"I would respectfully renew my recommendation made at the January meeting of 1909, that the salary of registrar, Mr. A. R. Tiffany, be made \$1,600 per year. An advance of \$200 was made at that time, bringing the salary up to \$1,800."

The work of the office has grown each year more burdensome and more responsible, and its duties have been faithfully and well met by the present registrar.

The resignation of Dr. Geo. M. Wells, professor of pediatrics in the school of medicine, is transmitted to the board, through the dean of the medical school, with the recommendation that Dr. Wells be made professor emeritus of pediatrics.

"I wish to recommend the following changes in the instructional force of the University:

Changes in Faculty

"The appointment of Mr. George F. Sumsy to the position of instructor in German, at a salary of \$1000 per year, for the academic year of 1910-11, to supply the place of Mr. H. W. Koehler, absent in Germany for graduate study."

"The appointment of an instructor in mathematics, at a salary of \$1000 per year, to fill the place left vacant by the expiration of the term of appointment of Mr. R. L. Grider, instructor in mathematics and mining."

The appointment of assistant instructor in the department of modern English literature, at a salary of \$600 per year, to take the place of Miss Angeline Williams, resigned."

"An advance in the salary of Miss Mary Watkins, assistant instructor in modern English literature."

"The appointment of Miss Estella M. Sage as assistant instructor in romance languages at \$400 per year. Miss Sage was paid for her services as student assistant during the past year. The department now has approximately two hundred students."

"I would also recommend that the salary of Mr. C. W. Converse, instructor in the department of electrical engineering, be advanced from \$1,200 to \$1,400, the advance to take effect October 1, 1910."

"The total amount of addition to the year's budget involved in the foregoing recommendations is approximately four hundred dollars."

"The departments of rhetoric and public speaking are both apt to be seriously overcrowded with the matriculation of a large freshman class in September."

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MRS. C. M. COLLIER ELECTED MEMBER OF BOARD

Mrs. C. M. Collier was elected school director at yesterday afternoon's election over Robert McMurphy by a vote of 198 to 127, and the proposition to purchase the Old High school grounds for \$5000 carried by a vote of 122 to 42.

The annual meeting of the district was held after the election at which Chairman McMurphy submitted his annual report as follows:

The bonded indebtedness at this date amounts to \$94,500.

For a detailed report of expenditures we refer you to the clerk's books, which are open to any taxpayer of the district at all times.

These books have been carefully examined from year to year and are always found to be in perfect condition and correct to a cent.

Since the last annual meeting we have completed two new school buildings, one in Fairmount, and the other at the corner of West Ninth and Monroe streets. These buildings are identical in plan and construction and cost the sum of \$37,379.51.

These buildings were erected none too soon, as every room in all the buildings has been full during the term just closed, except two rooms in the building at Fairmount.

The school census taken last December showed a total number of children of school age in the district of 2,243, divided in the different buildings as follows:

High school, 497

Central school, 396

Patterson school, 370

Condon school, 218

Geary school, 408

Lincoln school, 358

During my term of office for five years I have seen the number of school children increase from 1884 to 2724, and the number of teachers increase from 34 to 60. The expenditures of the district have increased during this period from \$27,986 to \$51,627, while the cost per pupil has remained practically the same, or to be exact from \$18.03 five years ago to \$20.07 per pupil at this time.

When the additional cost of everything, including the higher salaries paid to the teachers, is taken into consideration, it will be observed that the board has been quite careful in the matter of expenditures.

High School too Small

We have now almost outgrown our present high school building. An addition of five rooms and a large seating capacity in the assembly was added to the building two years ago, and the room is now fully occupied. Further additions to the building are entirely impracticable. The heating plant now is hardly capable of keeping the building comfortable during cold weather, and further additions to this plant are impossible.

There is at the Central school practically no playground for the children. A street car line is being laid down Williamette street, and it is absolutely necessary to re-arrange the High and Central school buildings or provide more play ground adjoining this property. The personal opinion of the chairman is that the Central building should be moved to some other location, the present High school building devoted to grade purposes and a new High school building erected in another location, several desirable properties being available at reasonable prices at the present time.

We have submitted to the voters for action today the matter of buying a lot 60x175 feet in size adjoining the High school on the south; this purchase should be approved by the voters.

Manual Training

The board has all along been convinced of the necessity for the teaching of manual work in the schools, but there have been many obstacles in the way of its successful introduction, some of which still exist.

study so the music and drawing (which had already been introduced) might have their proper share of time and be taught effectively. These subjects have now been measurably accomplished and were manual work introduced for the coming year the teachers could do all the other required work and still find time for the manual subjects.

Lack of Money

The two principal obstacles in the way of the introduction of this department were lack of money and lack of room.

To properly install the department and provide teachers for both the boys and girls would mean an outlay for the first year of four or five thousand dollars, and this year's levy will not provide enough revenue to provide additional funds to this amount.

While it is possible to provide manual centers in the grade buildings, there is no room at all for the accommodation of high school students in this department.

These are the conditions as they now exist. The board is committed to the introduction of this work at the earliest possible moment, but it would be governed by conditions and not sentiment.

In this connection I desire to report to the tax-payers that Mrs. S. B. Eakin has recently generously donated to the district the sum of \$150 for the purpose of supplying manual training apparatus for the Patterson school. This, of course, was accepted very thankfully and will be applied to its intended use.

An election is being held today for the purpose of electing my successor on the board. Being petitioned by a number of taxpayers and voters of the district to become a candidate for re-election, I consented to serve another term, if elected. Subsequently Mrs. C. M. Collier was nominated for the office, and consented to serve. Being personally acquainted with Mrs. Collier and having served with her on the board of education, I speak authoritatively when I say that she possesses the highest qualifications for the position as a member of the board of education. I have myself urged her before to accept another term on the board, but she has always refused; now, however, she has very much pleased to have her on the board as my successor, and I shall be glad to retire, feeling that the affairs of the district will be in competent hands, as the other members of the board, too, are painstaking and conscientious in the discharge of their public duties.

I have always taken a keen interest in public school affairs, and during my residence of 17 years in the district I do not think that I have missed a school meeting. I have enjoyed the work of the board very much, and during my entire term of five years the board has been harmonious and our association together has been pleasant at all times. I shall still continue an appropriate interest in the affairs of the schools and will at all times labor for their promotion and welfare.

NEW SAWMILL NEAR COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove, Or., June 18.—C. C. Shay, of Portland, has purchased a section of standing timber near Divide, two miles south of Cottage Grove, and will forthwith commence the erection of a sawmill of 50,000 daily capacity, to be completed and in operation within ninety days. The mill will cut railroad ties and timbers exclusively, and it is estimated by Mr. Shay that there is sufficient timber in the tract to run the mill for at least five years. Mr. Shay, who is the principal owner in three other corporations, will incorporate a company composed chiefly of Portland men, to operate the new timber deal. He left for the metropolis of Oregon this morning to complete arrangements.
