CELEBRATE IN HONOR OF BRIDGE COMPLETION

Springfield, July 2.—When the Springfield bridge is completed and the Portland, Eugene & Eastern sends its first car into Springfield, there is planned a gala held here a big celebration to commemorate the event of the first street railway. This matter was brought up at the commercial club meeting last night and a committee appointed to plan for the event. It is not definite as to just what will be held by the city, but a large street carnival or fair is considered. It is thought that the city has been looking forward to for some time and has been disappointed for several years even though the cars ran to the opposite side of the river. The bridge has been chiefly the cause of the delay. It is thought that it will be completed by September 20, and if it is, the day the big celebration will be held.

SPRINGFIELD WILL BE WELL ADVERTISED

Springfield, July 2.—The Springfield commercial club at its meeting last night decided to advertise the city and during the remainder of this year will systematically advertise the city with its fund of nearly \$2,000 that was raised this spring by popular subscription. The first thing that will be done will be the issuance of a post card on which will be printed views and facts about the city. These will be distributed and mailed to all parts of the country. The way in which this publicity money will be spent, other than this plan, however, will be left to the meeting of all the subscribers to the fund, and this will be announced at the next meeting of the club next week. Up to this time this year the commercial club has devoted its attention to local improvements, but now will begin their outside work just as the real estate season is about to open. A committee was appointed last night to investigate the various methods of advertising and will report at next meeting.

HARDWARE STORE CHANGES HANDS

J. H. Singleton and son, of Hermiston, Or., arrived last week to look over Springfield with a view to locating here, having had a deal on with Holcomb & Mead for the purchase of their hardware stock. The deal was closed Saturday evening, and Monday morning the store was closed for the purpose of inventory. Holcomb & Mead engaged in the business several months ago, purchasing the stock of Michaels & Co. from the creditors of the concern. On account of ill health Mr. Holcomb was desirous of retiring from business, and Mr. Mead had other interests demanding his attention, although the business was improving. Mr. Singleton and son have been engaged in various enterprises, having until recently conducted a grocery at Hermiston, and formerly residing in Spokane. It is the intention of Mr. Holcomb to leave this fall for Nevada, where he hopes the higher altitude will improve his health.—News.

WOODSMEN COME OUT TO CELEBRATE

Springfield, July 2.—The fact that the Fourth comes on Monday this year and affords a two-days' holiday, and also possibly the big fight, have drawn a very large number of men from the lumber camps and railroad construction crews above Natron. For the past few days every train from the hills and camps on the Wendling branch, and from all other lines, there are hundreds pouring out of the woods in order to celebrate. The majority of these go straight to Portland where the necessary liquor can be obtained to aid in the glorious celebration. The loss of the men is paralyzing the work in the mills and camps all this week, and will most of next week. The local banks report that they have during the past few days cashed between seven and eight thousand dollars worth of checks from the laborers going from the Booth-Kelly and the Fischer-Bally mills and the Southern Pacific Co., and expect to cash over \$5,000 today, at this will be the heaviest day of all. Only one of these three banks in Eugene say that they have up to yesterday cashed \$10,000 of the checks of these laborers who are going to the metropolis to celebrate.

Three hundred feet of the new water ordered by the city arrived Saturday and was tested. The city water system operated by R. H. Parsons was also tested and the pressure was sufficient to throw a stream on the roof of the Central hotel, three stories high. The water system has reduced the rate of insurance in the business district 20 per cent.—Chronicle.

FARMERS WHO HELD SPUDS WILL LOSE

Springfield, July 1.—With new potatoes coming to the market, a number of the farmers have found themselves with a great deal of last year's crop on their hands that will prove a total loss. It is said that some of the farmers have as many as 1200 bushels each of the old potatoes on their hands that cannot be sold at any price and which they held out of the market the past winter when offered a good price, thinking that it would raise. There were also a large number of potatoes left in the ground over winter that could not be dug and which they were waiting and now are of no value. Early "spuds" have been on the market now for nearly a month and bring about a cent and a half a pound at the stores.

POISONING FROM BLACKBERRY THORN

Springfield, June 30.—As a result of picking blackberries about ten days ago, Mrs. Kester nearly lost her life and now it is a question whether her right hand can be saved as the result of blood poisoning from a thorn that entered her finger. She was gathering berries in her own yard and accidentally ran a small thorn from one of the vines into her finger. At the time she thought nothing of it but not long afterward the member became badly swollen. The doctor examined the trouble the next day and it is only now that he has hope of saving her arm, and she has been in a very dangerous condition, for the poison entered her whole system.

BOY RUNS SLIVER THROUGH HIS HAND

Springfield, June 30.—The little son of Peter Tometh, of this city, has lost his desire to slide down cedar doors or any other forms of wooden inclines, and not because it tells of the reverse side of the small trousers. The boy had a plank that was very smooth and while making a downward trip with his hands on the side to maintain equilibrium he ran a small sliver entirely through his hand, which a physician had to cut out.

WILL SELL BONDS AT SIX PER CENT

Springfield, June 30.—The Springfield council held a special meeting this morning in order to change ordinances 178 and 180, which call for an election upon a city bond issue, to read that the bonds shall be sold at not more than six per cent, instead of five. The reason for this is the condition of the bond market which might make it hard to sell the bonds after they were voted on at the lower figure. The council figures that if sold at the six per cent interest that there is a possibility for a good bonus. In order to make this change, a resolution repealing the ordinance was adopted, then the new one was passed.

JAMES A. PATTEN RETIRES FROM STREET

Daring Wheat Speculator Has Accumulated a Big Fortune

Chicago, June 30.—James A. Patten, the most widely known grain trader in Chicago or the world since the days of B. P. Hutchinson, retires from business today. The only statement he would make for publication was this:

"I have had a long siege in the grain business; have had more than

my share of the load to carry, yet I am glad I have been through with it all, and am ready to quit."

The big speculative dealer, who has made his mark in wheat, corn, oats and cotton in the last twenty years and is still mixed up in the most important cotton deal in New York, from which he promises to emerge successfully, passed the morning of his last day of business sitting in front of the big quotation board watching the course of the market.

Those who know "Jim" Patten best say he goes out of business worth \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000. Mr. Patten himself modestly states that he thinks those figures are too high.

BROWN RESIGNS AS ASSISTANT CASHIER

The Eugene Loan and Savings bank at its regular quarterly meeting of the board of directors today, after declaring the usual quarterly dividend, added \$25,000 to its surplus fund, making the capital and surplus \$150,000. Brown, who has been assistant cashier for the past thirteen years, and who has been instrumental in building this bank up to its present solid basis, tendered his resignation on account of ill health and will for a time retire from active business. REPUBLICANS FAIL TO CARRY OUT PROGRAM

(From Saturday's Daily Guard)

The Republicans failed to carry out their program at their "assembly" this afternoon and instead, as had been planned by the leaders of the party, the meeting adjourned until the first Saturday in September, which is a few days before the primaries, at which time they will have their ticket framed up in better shape.

This action was taken upon the advice of the younger element in the party, who foresaw failure of the ticket at the primaries had nominations been made today. There was much discussion and a great deal of time was spent in speech-making, resulting finally in adjournment.

With all the clamors of an old-time machine-controlled county convention, the Lane county Republican "assembly" called for the purpose of "suggesting" candidates to be voted upon by the Republicans at the primaries in September, opened at the courthouse this morning shortly after 10 o'clock.

The circuit court room was about three-fourths filled with delegates from some of the precincts of the county, a number of the precincts refusing and some neglecting to send delegates. The same old war horses of the party who have been seen in conventions here for the past many years, such as S. H. Friendly, F. M. Wilkins, Dr. Kuykendall, Dr. Harris, A. C. Woodcock, J. M. Shelley, M. J. Hillegas, Captain Dodd, H. L. Rann, Editor Moorehead and R. G. Callison, were to be seen in different parts of the house.

Friendly Chairman
The meeting was called to order by Colonel J. M. Williams and S. H. Friendly, upon motion of E. R. Mumme, was chosen temporary chairman. Mr. Friendly made a few remarks, stating that he had arisen from a bed of sickness in order to be present at this convention. He said this was to be more of a meeting of old friends to work for the common good of each other than a political convention.

John M. Williams and S. L. Moorehead were each in turn nominated for temporary secretary, but each declined, and Geo. A. Drury, of Coburg, was finally selected.

Chairman Friendly named J. M. Williams, W. W. Scott and A. R. Martin as committee on credentials, and according to program appointed the following committee on resolutions: Allen H. Eaton, I. N. Edwards, C. W. Washburne, J. F. Smith, Geo. A. Drury, C. Cole and A. L. Bond.

The committee on order of business consisted of Dr. Paine, W. S. Moon, Jared Scott, A. C. Woodcock and Mr. Scott, of Coburg.

The method of selecting the 66 delegates to the state "assembly" in Portland was the occasion of considerable discussion and it was finally agreed to accept Colonel Williams' plan of apportioning the delegates from several districts, each district consisting of a group of precincts, ranged beforehand by the colonel. The assembly then adjourned until 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Afternoon Session
The assembly was called to order again this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock and Dr. Kuykendall elected permanent chairman. The committee on credentials reported 240 delegates present, 96 having failed to come, 61 of the 96 being from that portion of the county out of which it is proposed to create Nesmith county. GISWOLD AGAINST MAJOR HAMMOND ASSEMBLY PLAN CHIEF RANGE OFFICE

Charles N. Griswold, Republican candidate for the nomination of county clerk, gave out an interview today in regard to the assembly plan, as follows:

Q. What is your position in regard to the assembly?

A. In my official announcement I stated plainly my position in regard to the so-called "assembly." I am not in favor of the assembly, for it is contrary to the direct primary nomination law. I intend to go before the people according to the provisions of that law, as is shown by the fact of my having filed my intention to be a candidate before the convention is held.

Q. Are you seeking the endorsement of the assembly and would you sanction the action should they endorse you?

A. No, I am not seeking the endorsement of the assembly, but should they endorse me I do not see any reason why I should not accept it just the same as the endorsement of any other voter. I thought that the assembly was hunting men, seeking

ing to find the worthy and well qualified men, and having found the most capable men for office to recommend them to the voters of the county or state. If this is so it is for me to hunt and not for me to seek it.

Question Up to the People
I believe that the people of the county or state should have the right given by the primary law to select their own officers. Therefore I am going direct to the people with my candidacy, and am pledging them that if I am nominated and elected I will conduct the office in a businesslike manner, for their best interests, fairly and economically. But beyond this pledge to the people I am making no pledges and no promises, and do not intend to enter into any entangling alliances or to bind myself to obey the dictates of any man or set of men.

I would not care to be clerk of Lane county under the gift or under the direction of a political boss.

14 PER CENT GAIN IN THE POSTAL RECEIPTS

The increase in receipts at the Eugene postoffice for the month of June just past over the same month last year is nearly 14 per cent, which is a splendid showing and indicative of the rapid growth of the city in that time. Every month this year there has been a substantial increase in the receipts over those of the corresponding month during the previous year. The receipts in June this year amounted to \$2,698.16 as compared to \$2,380.33, a gain of \$317.83.

The investigation resulting from this complaint led to the discovery of a wonderfully neglected condition of the track, which made travel over the line unsafe for life and limb. Consequently the order closing the road to further use pending its repair was issued this morning by the commission.

CLANTON APPOINTED MASTER FISH WARDEN

Salem, Or., June 28.—The board of fish commissioners today appointed Edward Clanton, of Clats Pass, as chief fish warden, to succeed H. C. McAllister, whose resignation, to take effect July 1, was received several days ago.

Clanton has been serving for the past two years as deputy warden in District No. 2, which embraces all the territory south of the Columbia river. He has been a life-long republican and a resident of Oregon, and was endorsed by leading citizens of Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Douglas counties. The board selected Mr. Clanton out of 20 applicants.

BOY DROWNED AT GARDINER

Gardiner, Or., June 30.—Albert Hansen, 13 years of age, and only son of Henry Hansen, of Butler Creek, was accidentally drowned Sunday afternoon. The accident was caused by the upsetting of a covered flat boat, in which the boy and two other lads were playing. The body was recovered about four hours after the accident.
