JOHNSON TO QUIT, SAYS HIS MOTHER

Champion Only Stayed in the Ring to Defeat Jim Jeffries

Chicago, July 5.—J. Arthur Johnson, retired heavyweight champion of the world, announced today that he will quit boxing. "I have decided to quit boxing," he said. "I have been in the ring for many years, and I have won many fights. I am now 35 years old, and I am getting tired. I want to live a quiet life and raise a family."

That will be the title of the vanquisher of the mighty Jeffries, announced Mother "Tiny" Johnson. "Arthur told me positively that he'd whip Jeffries, remove all possibility of the slightest dispute as to his right to the title and then quit fighting," said the champion's mother today at the family home, Thirty-third street and Wabash avenue. "It was his last night in Chicago before he went to California to begin training for the fight. We were having our regular chicken dinner. Arthur said to me: 'Mother, don't you worry about my fight with Jeffries, let me do the worrying; but I really haven't anything to worry about, for I could whip Jeffries in my present condition. I'm going to train only because the law requires it. Don't fret that Jeffries will whip me, for I'm not going to let him hit me to do any damage.'

"I'll retire," says Jack. "But I am going to stop, after beating Jeffries. Then I will have whipped everything worthy in sight, and I'll not pull off any sham battles with puny weaklings. I'll just retire and hold the title, as Jeffries claimed to hold it."

"I'm glad Arthur is going to retire," continued his mother. "He's gone far enough in pugilism—as far as he can go. He's got the title beyond all dispute and there's nobody good enough to contend for it, so I know that he meant it when he said positively that he'd quit."

Negro Will not Stop Training
"But," added the champion's mother, significantly, "Jack will never stop training. He always said he'd keep in good athletic condition, even in his old age, and if a good man is developed within a few years, why Arthur might be forced to come out of his retirement and defend his title."

CATHOLIC EDUCATORS IN SESSION AT DETROIT, MICH.

Detroit, Mich., July 6.—Today's session of the national congress of Catholic educators opened with a conference of the college department at Detroit College. Other meetings were held this morning by the parish schools department and the seminary department. Prominent Catholic educators from all over the country took part in the discussions.

This afternoon the science section will hold a session. Rev. William F. Rigge, S. J., Creighton University, Omaha, Neb., will talk on "What Catholics have Done for Astronomy." In the philosophy section, at 4 p. m. Rev. M. J. Ryan, professor of metaphysics, St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, N. Y., will discuss the educational value of scholastic philosophy as an undergraduate mental training. In College Hall, this afternoon, at 2 p. m., there will be a meeting of all teachers of the elementary schools attending the convention, presided over by Rev. A. P. Ternes, pastor of St. Elizabeth's church, this city. A sister of charity will read a paper on "The Essential Branches of Elementary Education." "Incultation of Religious Principles in Teaching Profane Branches," by a sister of the holy name of Jesus and Mary; "Teaching of Geography," by a sister of charity.

At 8 p. m., this evening, there will be a public meeting of the college department in College Hall. Edward T. Wade, of Chicago, will read a paper on "The College Graduate of Politics." Byron V. Kanaley, Chicago, will discuss "The Catholic Graduate in Business."

Starting at 9:30 a. m., tomorrow, the closing day of the convention, the college department will hold a session, at which time officers will be elected and other business transacted. Very Rev. L. A. Delurey, O. S. A., president of St. Thomas College, Villanova, Pa., will read a paper on the need of local organizations, state or provincial, to co-operate with the college department of the Catholic Educational association.
