REFORM SCHOOLS GOAL OF YOUNG FORGER

Raywin Hurlburt, the 16-year-old son of a local plumber, was today committed to the state reform school at Salem for forgery. The boy was arrested Saturday evening by Sheriff Bown and afterward confessed to the crime.

On June 29 young Hurlburt attempted to cash at Tom Bennett's meat market a check for \$32 on the First National Bank, drawn in his favor and purported to have been signed by R. E. Davidson, a fruit grower. He was accompanied by a horse trader who has been here for some time. Mr. Bennett refused to cash the check and the horse trader then took it to Sterner's grocery store where he succeeded in getting rid of it in payment for a bill of groceries, receiving change. In a few days it was discovered that the check was a forgery, and Sheriff Bown was notified. The boy had bought a pony from the horse trader and had sold it to a man at Jasper, receiving \$20 for it.

He then bought a suit of clothes with the money. After he was arrested by the sheriff Saturday evening young Hurlburt made a confession, and again at his hearing in the juvenile court this morning he admitted his guilt.

SUNDAY WAS SCORCHER WITH MERCURY ROUND NINETY-FIVE POINT

Sunday was the hottest day of the present year, the thermometer registering around the 95 point on the average, although in some places 'twas two or three degrees higher in warmer spots. There seemed to be no suffering from the heat, although everybody who didn't go to the country for a day's outing, stayed pretty well at home and spent the day with as little exertion as possible. In Portland the government thermometer registered 97 degrees. While there is no official reading of the instrument in Eugene, it is thought 95 is about correct.

IMPROVEMENTS AT Y M C A ARE PLANNED

Deep Well Will at Once Be Drilled and Pumping Plant May Be Installed

The board of directors of the Eugene Young Men's Christian association met last night. There was nothing of unusual importance considered, but suggestions for improvements were made and the general view of next winter's work sized up. Among the first things that will be done is to have a deep well drilled so that the boys may drink pure water. The well will be large enough to supply all the water used in the building if it is so desired. The feasibility of a pumping plant of their own was discussed, but nothing definite was done. The cost of the water now used in the tank and in all the shower baths is considerable. If it can be found that it is actually cheaper, an electric pump with an underground air tank will be placed so that it can furnish water as fast as desired.

WHEN IMPROVE THE GROUND—It was decided last night to appropriate enough money to put the grounds around the building in shape and they will be levelled off and sown to grass seed. A green lawn at the front will be the appearance of both the building and the street.

BROWNSVILLE HIT BY COSTLY FIRE

The little city of Brownsville was visited by fire about 8:30 Friday morning, which completely destroyed the residence of S. P. Barger. The fire started in the roof, igniting from a flue of the kitchen stove, and had gained such headway before it was discovered that the fire department were unable to stop its progress and the structure burned to the ground.

Most of the household goods were saved. Mr. Barger estimates his loss at \$1,000, with but \$500 insurance.

City Hall Caught Fire

Scarcely had the fire department housed its apparatus when the roof of the city hall and that of Osburn's drug store were discovered to be on fire. The department was not long in extinguishing this blaze and aside from a few holes in the roof the damage was slight.

The drug stock, however, was damaged by water to the extent of perhaps \$500. The second fire is generally supposed to have originated from a cinder from the fire of the Barger residence, which was carried by the wind to the roof of the city hall.

STOREY'S \$10,000 FOUNTAIN REFUSED

LaCrosse, Wis., July 8.—Refusal of the LaCrosse park commission to accept from J. Ole Storey, Oregon lumberman and railroad owner and formerly mayorality candidate here, a \$10,000 memorial fountain for Copeland Park, for the reason, it is said, that the popularity of "Storey Fountain" threatened to bury forever "Copeland Park," has stirred up a real sensation here and sent Storey back to his Oregon home today in a high rage.

A part of the land of Copeland Park was donated by "Colonel" F. A. Copeland and the remainder was purchased. It was the site of the old Copeland mill, and the former boyhood home of Ole Storey, who was a waterboy in the mill before he became a millionaire in the West. His mother lived in the hut on the site many years and Storey decided that he would build a fountain there to be dedicated to his mother.

"I thought it would be no more than proper," said Storey, before leaving, "that since the former mill owner donated the park that one of the boys should donate the fountain, and I offered to do so only with the best intentions. If it is not appreciated more than is indicated by the park commissioners, I will not insist that they take it."

Members of the park commission deny that they have rejected the fountain, and say that they merely objected to having Storey pick out the most conspicuous spot in the park for a location. They suggested a corner of the park, but Storey would not consent to this change.
