SIUSLAW COUNTRY

David Miller and Kenneth Mumma of Eugene were in Florence over Sunday bound for the cape on a camping expedition.

Eugene Snodgrass and wife and Andrew Starvord and wife of Eugene came down the river Monday en route to Tallicum Lake on a camping expedition.

E. Brothers of Brothers Bros. meat market in Eugene, accompanied by his sons, who were on the cape, arrived here Saturday en route to Heceta in quest of beef cattle.

The Washco came in from San Francisco Sunday evening with a considerable freight on board and will take a cargo of lumber from the Oregon & California Lumber Co.'s wharf.

The steamer Lillian, which has been in dry dock all summer undergoing repairs, was launched last Friday.

The steamer Roberts left Sunday morning for the Columbia to bring up another rock saw for the jetty work. She started back Monday evening, having in tow the saw loaded with coal, but encountered a strong head wind and put in at Coos Bay.

The Mitchell Avitt Biglow camping party, who were on the cape several days, came in from there Tuesday evening and remained in Florence till yesterday, when they left for Mapleton on their way to Eugene.

A. C. Jennings and J. T. Donaldson were in Florence Sunday on their way back to Eugene, after leaving a road up North Fork for the purpose to connect with the road formerly located up that stream.

L. B. Cushman left Tuesday for Portland to attend the state assembly as one of the delegates from Lane county. While in the city he will call at the United States engineer's office to ascertain what can be done about arranging with the government officials in regard to funds for improving Siuslaw harbor. Mr. Cushman is very anxious to have the government take up the matter and begin operations at once and not wait till the work now being done by the port commission is finished.

Several members of the Lane County Asset Company of Eugene will be at Florence Thursday, July 28, at 1 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of presenting matters pertaining to the proposed railroad from Eugene to the people of this vicinity.

Last Saturday George Montgomery brought to this office a head of let-

ture which beat anything in that line that we have seen. It was raised by Mr. Montgomery on the Sand near Acme, from very tender and furnished an agreeable change in diet for the editor and family.

A fish caught by C. E. Fere in the surf on the ocean beach Tuesday morning was an object of considerable curiosity to our people. Some pronounced it a cuttle fish, others a devil fish or octopus, and others a stingray. It is of a brownish color and the head, which is quite small, has eight tentacles of four or five inches in length. Its mouth resembles the beak of a parrot and the eyes are large and prominent. The body, which is about fifteen inches in length, is funnel shaped, the back part spreading out something like a wing on each side. The alimentary canal seems to be attached to the body only near the rear end, and the head can be drawn back until partly concealed, or it can be protruded till several inches from the body of the fish.—Florence West.

Attorney-General—J. N. Hart, Baker City.
Officers for which candidates will be recommended today:
Four justices supreme court, labor commissioner, state engineer, State railroad commissioner (at large).

The Platform.
The republicans of Oregon, in assembly convened, reaffirm their faith in the principles of the republican party, and with pardonable pride point to the record of its achievements.

We affirm our faith in the principles of representative government and in the maintenance of political parties, believing that no party can maintain its identity or exert its influence for good government without organization.

As the representatives of the republican voters of Oregon we find our warrant for this assembly in the express provisions of the preamble of the direct primary law, which reads as follows:

"Political parties are useful and necessary. The method of naming candidates for elective officers by political parties and voluntary political organizations is the best plan yet found for placing before the people the names of qualified and worthy citizens from whom the electors may choose the officers of our government."

"Every political party and every voluntary political organization has the same right to be protected from the interference of persons who are not identified with it as its best known and publicly avowed members, that the government of the state has to protect itself from the interference of persons who are not known and registered as electors."

We commend as the sentiment of this assembly the words of Governor Charles E. Hughes:

"I believe in party organization and I desire to see it strong, efficient and representative."

And the expression of Theodore Roosevelt that:

"Voters should be guaranteed the right to determine within the ranks of their respective organizations who the candidates of the parties shall be."

We reaffirm our faith in the principles of representative government and the maintenance of political parties, believing that no party or association of men can maintain its identity or exert its influence for the principles it expresses without organization; we believe in the wisdom of a government as free citizens of a free government we enjoy the constitutional right as members of the republican party to assemble for the purpose of adopting a platform, considering the fitness of candidates, making recommendations to the people and performing such other duties as may be deemed wise and expedient; and that any infringement upon such right is a denial of the wisdom of the founders of our government, both state and national, and against the rights guaranteed by our constitution and a violation of the real spirit of the direct primary law, with the fundamental principles of which we are in hearty accord, and believe it should be supported and obeyed.

We favor the creation of the office of lieutenant-governor of the state, who shall perform the duties of the governor in case of his inability to act.

We favor the abolishment of all useless and unnecessary offices, boards, commissions and clerkships and for a just and economical expenditure of public moneys.

We are opposed to the pending bill providing for the election of delegates to national conventions of the republican and democratic parties at the expense of the taxpayers. These delegates are not public officials, but are representatives of their respective parties and the taxpayers of the state should not be called upon to pay their railroad fare, hotel bills

and other expenses of these trips.

We favor an appropriation by congress placing the Indian war veterans of the Pacific Northwest on an equality with the veterans of the civil war in the matter of pensions.

We favor only such conservation of the public resources as will best develop and settle the country.

We unqualifiedly endorse the administration of President Taft and point with pride to the fulfillment by the national republican party and the pledges contained in its last platform. We point with pride to the history of the republican party and to the capacity of the party, so often demonstrated, to solve public questions and to legislate and administer the government in the interest of the whole people. We affirm our continuing loyalty to the principles and policies of the party, and we mutually pledge ourselves to the effort necessary to strengthen the party organization and to put into office men who are loyal to its principles.

SENATOR GORE AGAINST POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS

Tulsa, Okla., July 25.—Senator Gore of Oklahoma again broke into the limelight this afternoon after several weeks of comparative retirement, when in the presence of a crowd of several thousand people here he denounced the tariff, the ship subsidy, the postal savings bank, Speaker Cannon and Senator Aldrich. He was cheered at every point.

The senator was bitter in his attacks on the three recent issues in congress. He declared the postal savings bank measure was merely the starting of a central bank that would be founded on the grave of the individual banker and American freedom. He branded the ship subsidy bill as a brazen and notorious graft, and reiterated the arguments of the progressives against the tariff.

Standpatters Get Off Easy.
Although Speaker Cannon and Senator Aldrich came in for a share of the Oklahoma's contempt, he dealt lightly with the standpatters as compared with the recent speeches of Senator Bristow of Kansas and Cummings of Iowa.

NEW YORK FIRM BUYS HOOD RIVER APPLES

Hood River, Or., July 25.—A deal was consummated Saturday whereby R. & H. of New York will acquire the entire apple crop from the Sears & Porter orchards and the orchard of August Paasch. These two growers will have about 30,000 boxes. The price paid will probably be a little in advance of the prices to be paid by the union. George Rae, a member of the firm, is on the ground and negotiating the sale. The Hood River Apple Growers' union, it is stated, has several flattering offers for this year's crop, that will amount to about 300,000 boxes.

JAMES J. REGAN WILL EXPERIMENT WITH OREGON INDIANS

Portland, July 22.—Vice President Theodore Roosevelt, who was today elected national president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians over Matthew Cummings, the present incumbent, of Massachusetts. The vote stood: Regan, 169; Cummings, 157. There were four candidates placed in nomination: Cummings, Regan, McLaughlin, of Milwaukee, Wis., and J. McLaughlin, of Philadelphia. Rohan and McLaughlin withdrew from the contest, the former in favor of Cummings and the latter in favor of Regan.

NEGRO REYNOLDS, ACCUSED BY GIRL, AFRAID OF MOB

Roseburg, Or., July 22.—That S. M. Reynolds, the negro porter who was arrested at Grants Pass Tuesday night, accused of an attack upon Josephine Moss, the 14-year-old daughter of Joseph Moss, will be given a speedy trial, is evidenced in a report that Justice John T. Long, before whom the prisoner will be given a preliminary hearing, announced yesterday that nothing would prevent the state from acting quickly save the possibility of a motion for a continuance on the part of the defendant.

Reynolds was brought here yesterday afternoon by Marshal Joe Huffman and Deputy Sheriff Lake Lewis. A large crowd awaited the arrival of the prisoner at the depot, and for that reason every available officer in the city was on hand to aid in the event the prisoner attempted mob violence. As soon as the train stopped Reynolds was taken through the crowd to an awaiting automobile and spirited away to the county jail, where he faces a cell awaiting disposition at the hands of the officers.

Upon noting the crowd at the depot the prisoner appeared frightened and upon several occasions requested the officers to protect him from any possibility of lynching. He appears to realize the seriousness of the charge, but denies emphatically that he attempted anything wrong. Reynolds has employed a Portland attorney to defend him and he will arrive here Saturday, as will Mrs. Moss and her daughter, of Grants Pass. The latter will appear as the prosecuting witness. Reynolds was placed under \$5,000 bond and was subsequently remanded to the county jail.

PHILIPPINE EXPORTS ARE NOT HEAVY

Washington, July 25.—Since the Payne-Aldrich tariff law went into effect, the Philippines have not exported the full amount of cigars, sugar and tobacco permitted to enter free of duty. The Payne-Aldrich law authorizes the free admission of 150,000,000 cigars, 300,000 gross tons of sugar and 1,300,000 pounds of tobacco. Only 86,515,691 cigars, or a little more than one-half of the total amount allowed, were exported to this country. The actual amount of sugar exported was 104,951 gross tons, or about one-third of the authorized amount. Only 15,294 pounds of tobacco were sent to this country. Officers of the insular bureau do not expect the Philippines to export the full amount allowed free entry for the next three or four years.

COUGARS GET GOATS OF CATTAGE GROVEITES

Cottage Grove, Or., July 22.—Elisha Geer, a rancher residing 12 miles south of this city, shot and killed a cougar measuring nine feet. The ranchers of that neighborhood have been missing goats from their herds for some time past, and yesterday morning the carcasses of five were found in the hills. They at once set out to hunt the cougar, and the dogs treed it within an hour. Cougars have killed 38 goats in this neighborhood this spring and summer.

ASHLAND WILL GET ELECTRIC LINE

Ashland, Or., July 26.—By an overwhelming vote the citizens of Ashland yesterday granted to John R. Allen a franchise in that city for an electric trolley line, and by its action yesterday Ashland reverses a vote taken in regard to a similar application of Mr. Allen a few weeks ago.

This action is taken as a victory of the progressives, for a greater Ashland, and will greatly enhance the value of realty. Mayor Snell was a strong advocate of this movement.

The majority vote in favor of granting the franchise was 221. The vote stood 285 for, and 64 against. The city council Saturday night opened bids for the improvement of certain streets in the city with bitulithic pavement. The Warren Construction company was awarded the contract at a cost of something over \$140,000, the work of paving the street to be completed within 70 days. The non-progressives protested to the granting of the contract, but Mayor Snell and the councilmen back of him voted their opposition down, and work will start on the pavement within ten days.

This is the improvement against which the referendum was invoked, and a restraining order against the referendum was secured by the Warren Construction company through its attorney A. E. Reames. The court will hear arguments upon the restraining order next Monday.

MOVE TO OPEN UP HUDSON BAY

Winnipeg, Man., July 26.—Just three centuries ago Hendrick Hudson discovered the great northern bay which bears his name. After this lapse of years his discovery is to be made useful to mankind as the completion of the government railway to Hudson Bay western Canada will be shipping grain to Europe via that route. This will likely be within eighteen months.
