GALLAGHER COOLY TELLS POLICE OF HIS DEED

New York, Aug. 9.—Gallagher, the would-be assassin of Mayor Gaynor, made a statement which, in substance, was that he came to Hoboken at 9:20. He went to the steamship pier and went aboard the steamer. A clergyman pointed Gaynor out to him. Shortly afterward he fired at the mayor. He does not know whether he fired more than one shot or not. "Knowing that Mayor Gaynor was going to Europe," his confession goes on, "to enjoy himself, after depriving me of my bread and butter, not for the sake of the money, but for the sake of the point of committing the act." Gallagher was remarkably cool when making the statement, to which he affixed his signature. It was announced that all the physicians in attendance on Mayor Gaynor would hold a consultation late today to decide whether it would be safe to use the X-ray on the mayor. President Montt of Chile was a near observer of the attempt to assassinate the mayor. He and Mrs. Montt were sailing today on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Gross.

Gallagher was again locked up after arraignment, but not until after he had been repeatedly photographed by a large company of camera men who crowded the court room. He seemed rather pleased than otherwise by the attention he was attracting, and in getting ready to pose before the cameras he straightened his collar and necktie and stood erect and complacent while the light was flashed.

Shows Stolidism.
New York, Aug. 9.—"When the mayor was shot," said Commissioner Thompson of the water department, who was standing near Gallagher at the time "he placed his hand over his wound and said: 'Isn't this a pity? Then he calmly asked to be taken to his stateroom.'"

POPE PIUS ENTERS ON SEVENTH YEAR OF INCUMBENCY

Rome, Aug. 9.—Confronted by the most important crisis of his reign, Pope Pius X today enters upon the eighth year of his incumbency of the highest dignity in the religious world. In recognition of the seventh anniversary of his coronation, solemn mass was held this morning in the Sistine chapel and was attended by many cardinals and the diplomatic corps. The Holy Father, while greatly concerned over the split with the Spanish government, is confident that the Spanish people will remain firm in their allegiance to the church. It is stated here that for several years the Vatican has entertained fears of the religious orthodoxy of King Alfonso. The young monarch, it is alleged, has been a student of rationalistic and scientific literature, with the result that he has become an agnostic and has conferred only grudgingly to the observances of the church. Alfonso, it is said, held the church responsible for the death of Ferrer and the consequent expressions of disapproval which were uttered around the world. Since then he has not only been willing, but anxious, to overthrow the power of the church in Spain.

With the young King of Spain not only an anti-clerical, but a rationalist who privately dismisses religion as "superstition," the hope of the church rests with Don Jaime, the pretender. Meanwhile, the spirit of the "martyr" Ferrer walks abroad in Spain, and his cry for "religious liberty" is heard from other lips than those of the proletariat he sought to educate and arouse.

STREET CAR SMASHES INTO LAUNDRY WAGON BUT NO ONE IS HURT

Wheels of Wagon Broken Off and Driver James Harris Thrown to Ground

Another street car accident occurred this morning when a driver tried to cross the car tracks while looking out for the cars. One of the Fisher laundry wagons, driven by James Harris, was wrecked on West Eleventh street beyond Lawrence a little after 8 o'clock, when it was struck by a College Hill loop car. The street car was handled by Motorman R. H. Davis and Conductor G. G. Thorpe. Bystanders who witnessed the accident say that the driver was not to blame for the affair. It seems that Harris was driving along the north side of the street, and just as the car approached turned to the other side. The motorman shouted and applied the brakes, but the car struck the night wagon just as the rear wheels were in the middle of the track. It lifted the wagon clear of the track, smashing the wheels as though they were made of straw and left the vehicle upside down in the street. The driver was knocked down and the driver dumped indifferently out into the dust. Neither horse nor driver were hurt, but both were badly frightened. A lady standing on the sidewalk had presence of mind enough to catch the bridle of the horse before it ran and further damage from a runaway was averted. It is hard to understand how the accident occurred. The driver of the street car in this kind of a wagon makes it very difficult to hear from behind and the street cars frequently are battered where it appears as though the drivers are indifferent of the car's right of way but they are usually careful. The wheel tracks showed that the turn was very abrupt. The motorman said he saw the horse turn but was unheeded by the driver of the laundry wagon, and was too close to stop his car with the hand brakes, with which the new cars are fitted.

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EDWARD'S FUNERAL COST \$25,000 MORE THAN DID VICTORIA'S

London, Aug. 8.—The returned \$292,500 as the cost of the late king's funeral shows an increase of \$25,000 over that of Queen Victoria, the expense of which was \$197,500. But the fitting up of Westminster hall for the lying in state of Edward VII cost \$10,000, and the expenditure incurred in the funeral of the late king was \$19,000 for the velvet and gold drapery of naval officers and men. Neither of these items were incurred at the funeral of Queen Victoria, when also the sundry expenses amounted to only \$2500 as against \$12,500 last May. Compared with other great state funerals, those of the late king cost not a fifth of Emperor William's in 1888, the expense of which was \$436,000 to the city of Berlin alone and \$50,000 to the imperial treasury. The great Duke of Wellington's funeral cost \$500,000, that of Napoleon \$250,000, William IV's \$30,000, and the prince consort's only \$30,000.

MAYOR GAYNOR'S RECOVERY IS ASSURED

New York, Aug. 9.—Secretary Admanson came from the mayor's room shortly after 4:15 o'clock, bringing word that the patient is progressing nicely, had no fever, was cheerful, and had even expressed a desire to eat. Preparations were then under way to take an X-ray photograph of the mayor's wound.

At 3:45 p. m. Gaynor's condition was reported as unchanged. To Health Commissioner Lederle the mayor said he was confident he would recover. Lederle says the mayor is cheerful.

Wife Visits Mayor.
Mrs. Gaynor was brought by automobile from the Gaynor country home to the hospital in Hoboken. She visited her husband in company with Mrs. Vingt, their daughter. The visit lasted but five minutes, and then the mayor said:

"Very strange; very strange; why did he do it?"

At 2:45 p. m. one of the house surgeons said:

"Mayor Gaynor's pulse is normal and the patient is strong and cheerful. The bullet probably lodged under the tongue."

REAL BULLETS WHISTLE IN AIR IN SHAM BATTLE

Camp Life at American Lake Takes on a Serious Turn as Bullets Cut Through the Trees

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 8.—Weekly inspection occupied the morning at the army maneuver camp at American lake Saturday, after which the soldiers took a rest after a week of hard work in carrying out the various problems presented for solution. Little work will be done until Monday, when there will begin a full week of maneuvers.

Two big events occurred in the camp yesterday—the paying off of the soldiers and the start of the 90-mile endurance ride for officers which former President Roosevelt inaugurated during his second term to determine whether officers should be retired or not.

There was a short sham battle yesterday, the company officers generally taking the leading parts in directing the warfare.

It was rumored among the men that real bullets were used instead of soap wads by one company in the sham battle and that the whistle of the bullets through the trees made the skirmish take on an uncertain aspect. No one was hurt, however. Right inspection will be given hereafter to see that no ball cartridges get into the ammunition supplied the soldiers.
