POPULAR YOUNG LADY VICTIM OF MYSTERIOUS MURDER IN ABILONE, KANSAS

Abilene, Kas., Aug. 15.—Without a clue to the murder of Bertha Benigus, who was found dead in her parents' home on Sunday morning, the police today found other evidence which makes it certain that she was killed by some one who entered her bedroom. Miss Benigus was one of the town's most popular young women. Her father has a meat market, and she for several months has been employed in the telephone office.

Saturday evening she was down town with some young friends and at 10 o'clock left them, asking one of the girls to spend the night with her. Miss Benigus was planning a surprise and was to have left today to meet Carl Livingstone, a former school mate, and a long-time sweetheart, to whom she was to be married. Livingstone is employed as cashier in an eating house in Topeka. He was sent for immediately after the young woman's death was discovered.

That the young woman committed suicide is disproved by circumstantial evidence. Miss Benigus' body was so carefully covered that when at first her father went to the room he thought the bed had been made and that she had left the house. Later he found her beneath the coverings, and she was working.

MONTANA FOREST FIRES AGAIN SERIOUS

Washington, Aug. 11.—The forest service has called on the war department for aid to fight the fires in Montana. A battalion of the Fourth Infantry, now in the maneuvers at American Lake, Wash., to Missoula.

Serious forest fires are again raging on the headwaters of the Yellowstone, and the situation in the Coeur d'Alene national forest in Idaho continues extremely critical. Conditions in other national forests are materially improved, according to advices received by the forest service.

FIRES IN MOUNTAINS
WEST OF EUGENE
Lake Creek and the Upper Long Tom Districts Suffering From Flames

Captain Beerman returned yesterday from a trip to the headwaters of the Long Tom river and the Lake Creek valley. He reports several fires in those localities and they are spreading rapidly, with little or nothing being done to check them. This is on account of the lack of help, all the ranchmen out that way being busy with their crops, and those who are not busy are unable to cope with the flames. No great damage has yet been done, but if a rain does not come soon they will spread and will be very hard to stop.

This is one of the longest periods without rain experienced in the Willamette valley for a long time, and a good deal of trouble is being caused by the drought. It would be a good thing in more ways than one, besides extinguishing the forest fires, if it would lay the dust and purify the atmosphere.

CHAUFFEUR HURT IN BAD AUTO ACCIDENT

[From Monday's Daily Guard.]

For the second time in a month the big Rambler automobile owned by E. de F. Finkbecker of this city went over an embankment along the McKenzie river yesterday, but the second accident resulted more seriously than the first, when the machine jumped over two of the passengers on its downward flight without injuring them. This time the chauffeur, A. C. Corneilus, who was also in the first accident, suffered a broken leg.

Corneilus started from Eugene in the forenoon with three passengers bound for the McKenzie summer resorts. As they reached a point four miles above O'Brien's, the wheels of the machine plowed into the soft dirt at the side of the road and near a gulch, when something went wrong with the steering gear, so the chauffeur believed, and the machine plunged down the gulch. The one passenger in the machine, the other two having stopped about 200 yards this side of there, jumped out and landed safely, but Corneilus was taken to the bottom of the declivity, 25 feet below, with the machine, and was pinned beneath, being unable to extricate himself. The passenger ran to the nearest house and telephoned to O'Brien's for help, saying that Corneilus was dying.

Physician Indifferent. George Spence, who was eating lunch there at the time, started out in his machine for the scene of the accident, but first asked a physician from Coburg, who was also eating, to come along, as he might be the means of saving the man's life. The doctor deliberately replied that he guessed he would finish eating first. Spence made the run from O'Brien's to where the man lay suffering beneath the machine in exactly ten minutes over the roughest stretch of road in the whole McKenzie valley. He helped a number of other men free the chauffeur from his position, and found that his left leg between the ankle and knee had been broken. Otherwise he suffered little injury.

Coburg doctor who wanted to finish his lunch first, was met as Spence, with the injured man, neared O'Brien's on the way back. Eugene Doctor Sent For. A telephone message was sent from O'Brien's to a Eugene physician, who went up in another machine belonging to Mr. Finnegan, who accompanied him. After the bone had been set the injured man was brought to Eugene and placed in the hospital, where he is getting along very well.

The machine that went over the embankment was not badly hurt and was brought to town under its own power. It seems remarkable that it should meet with two such accidents and come out of each with practically nothing damaged.

ONE OUTLAW KILLED AND ONE ESCAPES

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 13.—A posse in pursuit of two horse thieves came upon them near the Callahan ranch, twelve miles northwest of Dairy, this morning and killed one, named Dumoak, but the other, named Kuhl, made his escape.

The killing took place 45 miles from this city and the nearest telephone is twelve miles from there, word being brought in by messenger. The first of this week a number of mules and horses were stolen from the country in the vicinity of Silver Lake and a posse was organized and pursued the thieves. They were trailed to Sprague River, where the trail was lost, but was found again near Williamson river.

As the posse came over the mountains near the Callahan ranch they came upon the men and called upon them to surrender. Dumoak attempted to get behind a tree, but before he could do so he was shot and killed.

His companion succeeded in making his escape and the posse is still in pursuit. The horses and mules were recovered.

Coroner Earl Whitlock, Deputy Sheriff Shaller, District Attorney Kuykendall and Court Reporter Richardson were notified and left for the scene of the conflict, but have not yet returned.

VAST LOSS SUFFERED WHEN BELGIUM'S EXPOSITION WAS GUTTED BY FIRE

Brussels, Aug. 15.—The ruins of the burned section of Belgium's exposition of 1910, destroyed by yesterday's fire, are still smoking, but all danger of renewal of the fire is past. The exposition management has decided to close it for a few days, until the ruins are cleared away, when it will be reopened. It is impossible in the present confusion to estimate closely the losses, and while they will run into millions of francs, it will not be so great as \$100,000,000, as first estimated.

Fortunately, most of the priceless art treasures, which had been loaned to the exposition or acquired by it, including 8000 Gobelin tapestries, a large exhibition of jewelry, many paintings, marbles and much ancient furniture, were removed by the police to places of safety out of reach of the fire and the pillaging of criminals, who attempted to take advantage of the disaster.

DETECTIVE BURNS WILL BE ARRESTED ON ELECTRIC BUILDING

He is Charged With Subornation of Perjury in the Perrin Case

San Francisco, Aug. 15.—A warrant for the arrest of William J. Burns, the detective employed by the prosecution in the graft cases, has been issued by H. M. Wright, United States commissioner for the Northern district of California.

The charge on which Burns is wanted is that of subornation of perjury. The complaint sets forth that on August 13, 1907, Burns secured

the false testimony of Charles B. Snell, which was given before Judge De Haven in the Perrin case. The specific testimony in question, which afterward resulted in the indictment of Snell for perjury, was his statement that he was not the attorney of Dr. E. B. Perrin at the time when the agreement was entered into with John Benson.

MAZAMAS ASCEND ALL THREE OF THE SISTERS

Camp Riddell, Aug. 15.—The camp is tired and happy. All of the Three Sisters have been a scaled by members of the party. As has been previously stated, an expedition of five ascended the South Sister last Monday. Tuesday the official climb of the Middle Sister was made by a large party, and the ascent of the three highest pinnacles of the North Sister was accomplished by one of the Mazamas. Yesterday three members of a party of six made the ascent of a very rugged mountain miles south of the camp, the Husband. Today the official expedition for the South Sister left camp, and a small party started for the Bachelor and Broken Top.

Two Heroes in Camp. Camp Riddell has two heroes, its oldest and youngest members. H. H. Prouty of Portland and young Morse Riddell, son of H. H. Riddell, the leader of the expedition. Mr. Prouty, who is a brother of Interstate Commerce Commissioner C. A. Prouty, is an experienced and seasoned mountaineer. He left with the official climb party for the Middle Sister at 6:05 a. m. of Tuesday, carrying a heavy pack, and for an hour kept the slow pace adapted for a large party. Then, pushing on far in advance, by himself, he reached the summit of the Middle Sister, at an altitude of 10,500 feet. After reaching the peak, he rested for an hour, dropped his pack and left a written message for the climbers far below. Then he descended to the ridge below on the north, and crossed from the Middle to the North Sister. After incredible labor and with great skill and daring he climbed all three of the high pinnacles on the North Sister. The highest pinnacle was reached at 12:33 p. m. In six hours and 28 minutes from camp, he had ascended two peaks, one 10,000 feet in altitude, and had unaided and without even a canteen, reached the highest pinnacle of the North Sister. He reached camp once more at 4:01 p. m. two hours and two minutes from the starting time. None of the mountaineers in camp knew of any such record. Mr. Prouty yesterday made a daring hand over hand climb up a steep cliff and was the first Mazama to reach the summit of the Husband.

New Mazama. Morse Hayward is 7 years and 9 months of age. He is the youngest person to reach the summit of the Pacific snow peak over 10,000 feet high. Morse made the ascent in fine style and by special voice of the club, proposed by Jack Montague, was elected a Mazama at the summit. Jack Montague had the previous record of being the youngest Mazama.

Have Snowball Fight. The party making the ascent of the Middle Sister left camp, after an early breakfast, at 6:05 a. m. It was divided into two divisions, led by C. W. Whittlesey and R. W. Montague, with H. H. Riddell bringing up the rear. The ascent was made slowly and easily on the western slope. After crossing the gravel flats above the camp, the two divisions followed the snow banks where possible, as going was fairly good early in the morning on the hard snow, and over the rough boulders and shell rock at other points. One large glacier was crossed. At one point the ascent was made up a high, 50-degree snow bank, and ice axes were used to make a footing. One of the descent the largest number of the party coasted down this hill on their backs, making the descent in a few seconds where the ascent had required half an hour and hard work. A snowball fight at 9000 feet altitude was an incident.

The last 1000 feet of the ascent was up a steep cone of loose rock and rough lava. It was by all means the most difficult of the ascent.

OREGON SOLDIER IS TYPHOID VICTIM

Cosgrove, Or., Aug. 15.—Private G. R. Kirkman, of Company G, 4th Oregon, has been stricken with typhoid fever. At first it was feared it would be necessary to send the company home, but Colonel Elbert, senior medical officer of the department of the Columbia, decided it would not be necessary. Kirkman was taken to his home in Roseburg, Or., by a detail from the medical corps.

TOOK 42 YEARS TO COLLECT \$12

J. W. Range, Alaska Miner, Has Hard Time Getting Money From Uncle Sam

Guard Special Service. Portland, Aug. 13.—It took the United States government 42 years to pay a debt of \$12 in the case of J. W. Range, an Alaska miner now in Portland. He has just received a check for the amount from Uncle Sam. Moreover, he had to give up one-third of the \$12 to a collector in Washington, D. C.

Range served three years in the Civil war and when he returned to his home at Mill Village, Pa., his friends wanted to do something for him and made him postmaster. He remained in less than a year and came west.

Five years ago he received a letter from a Washington attorney advising him that he had a just claim against the government for \$12 and that he would collect it for one-third of the amount. Range told the attorney to go ahead and collect anything he had coming.

Although a tardy paymaster, Uncle Sam proved good for the claim and the check came for \$12, signed by Secretary MacVegh. He then sent the attorney \$4 of the long-delayed settlement. The sum was for the overpayment of postage stamps.

VERY ILL FROM EFFECTS OF FRUIT SPRAYING AND DYNAMITING

Handling dynamite and spraying fruit trees will perhaps indirectly cause Guy Parker, of Pleasant Hill, to lose his life. A couple of weeks ago he was bothered with severe headaches that soon developed into delirium. He was brought to the Eugene hospital and treated for what was at first thought to be poisoning directly from the arsenic in the spraying material and from the nitro glycerine in the dynamite. It was seen that he could not live, for soon after entering the hospital his delirium became violent and he lost practically all control of his muscles. A few days ago he became unconscious and did not regain consciousness until today when he was himself only for a short time. Last week seven physicians held a consultation over the patient's condition and decided after careful investigation that the puzzling disease was not from direct poisoning from the spraying material or the dynamite but was a case of tubercular meningitis. It was probably brought on by the fumes of the explosive and the arsenic in the spray.

It has been six weeks since Parker worked at spraying when he was employed in the orchards of the Bohmstedt company at Creswell and the dynamite was handled externally. However, it is probable that the latter is more directly the cause of bringing on the disease. It is a feature of the nitro-glycerine to dilate the blood vessels, which will produce blood headaches. Arsenic in the open air is not very dangerous when applied externally. However, it is a fact that even the arsenic used in dyes on wall paper has caused poisoning to persons living in the rooms. These two causes will probably result in Parker's death.

ABSOLUTE DIVORCE GRANTED MRS. McKIM

Reno, Nev., Aug. 14.—Amid intense excitement in a crowded courtroom, after one hour and twenty minutes, Mrs. Margaret Emerson McKim was yesterday granted an absolute divorce, without a question from the court. Her story of drunkenness and recently on the part of her husband, Dr. Smith Hollis McKim, occupied 25 minutes. She was quickly surrounded by a crowd congratulating her, and after thanking Judge Pike, she hysterically laughed with joy and relief, accompanied by the "countess," her traveling companion, who sat by her side, she left the courtroom with her attorney.

In the absence of any attorneys for her husband, her testimony was not cross-questioned. Gowned in a pure white lace dress, her only ornaments being a simple small gold band ring on her wedding finger and a large horse shoe brooch studded with diamonds on her breast, with a large green picture hat, her flushed yet animated and smiling face presented a picture.
