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SPRINGFIELD MAN MYSTERIOUSLY DISAPPEARS

Springfield, Aug. 23.—Springfield has had another disappearance mystery. Joe Morton, formerly driver of the short edge line from the end of the street car line into town and well known about Springfield, has not been seen since last Thursday evening and his wife and friends fear that he has met with foul play. Morton, well known as "Curly," was last seen, as far as can be learned, at what is known as the St. James near beer place on the county road in West Springfield.

What makes the disappearance more complicated is the manner in which he left his wife. He left her at noon, saying he was going to conduct a refreshment booth down town. He said that he would not be able to come down in the afternoon and see him. She told him that she could not leave the tent and household effects alone for that length of time. She would bring the small child. Morton and his wife had been living in a tent and he had just about finished a barn on the lot. So when she mentioned this he helped her move all the things into the barn. One side of this was open and he told her that when she was ready to come down town that the neighbors would help her pull it up. This was the last that she saw of him. She was not able to get away from the house in the afternoon, but after supper followed his directions.

She understood him to say that the stand that he was to conduct was a stand for Clodfelter. Clodfelter did have a stand, but he made no arrangements for Morton to conduct it for him. Neither did he even talk with him about it. As far as can be learned Morton had no stand at all that day. He did talk with several of the streets that afternoon of renting the room in the rear of the Sutton block to open a pool parlor. This he was to get from Chas. Nadeau of Eugene. The tables and other equipment he would have to buy himself. In the evening when Mrs. Morton went to town she was unable to find her husband, and when he did not come home that night she became worried, and the next day asked the Springfield marshal if he had seen him, which he had not. She asked him to look for him.

Eugene Police Notified. Saturday, still more alarmed, she went to Eugene and saw H. M. Manville, whom she knows. After she related the facts to him he notified the chief of police. Up to this time he has been unable to ascertain anything, although descriptions of the man as well as his photograph have been sent to various places.

There could be several theories to explain his disappearance. The reports that he has had trouble with his wife are untrue, according to statements of those who know him well. He is known to be somewhat indolent, but Mrs. Morton helped him earn part of their money and they get along very well. He has debts that run up toward a hundred dollars, most of which is to the Booth-Kelly sawmill for lumber, with which he has built his barn. They were very careful not to run accounts at the store.

The most probable theory is that Morton became intoxicated and left some place in this condition. He drank until last winter, when he was taking drinks offered him by passengers on his stage when he was cold. Since then he has been more or less addicted to the habit, but recently his wife thinks that he has become much better in that way. Several weeks ago he was around with a Portland grocery drummer named Knutzen. They were very much together and drank together. Thursday night while in the near beer place in West Springfield he was

Magazines can now be easily forwarded from the Eugene Y. M. C. A. to the railroad construction camps above Natron. A. J. Gillette, the local agent of the S. P. Co., has taken the matter up with the powers that be, and Secretary Terrill has a letter from H. P. Hoot, assistant engineer of the company at Natron, in which he acknowledges receipt of Mr. Gillette's letter relative to the distribution of magazines to the laborers on the construction work from Natron east, and then states:

Should I have any surplus over after distribution among our employees, I shall be pleased to forward these to any of the Utah Construction Co. camps, or will deliver them to Dr. Cheshire at his hospital camp. I wish to thank Mr. Terrill for his generosity, and also accept our thanks for your trouble in the matter."

There Will Be Surplus

The Y. M. C. A. will make it a point to see that there is a surplus. Dr. Cheshire states that there must be 1500 or 1800 men in the various camps, and he has agreed to lend a hand in the distribution of what magazines come to him. Each trip he takes he can take along a small bundle of them. The shipment some time ago was by stage to Leland, formerly in the U. of O. baseball nine, and now working with one of the steam shovels above Natron. He brought in word that the men had been reading greasy scraps of newspapers from the cooks' camp; a complete famine of reading matter. Those who have old magazines are asked to notify the Y. M. C. A. and boys will be sent out for them.

Fruit Cannery Very BUSY CENTRE NOW

Hundred People Employed Putting Up Peas and Peaches—Prunes in Two Weeks

About the busiest place in the city right now is the cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association. About 75 women and girls and a third as many men and boys are constantly employed at the work of canning Bartlett pears, apples and peaches. The pears are coming in rapidly and it is all the big force can do to keep up with the work. Apples are being canned in lesser quantities. Peaches began coming in this afternoon and a part of the force was put to work on them. They are fine this year and Manager Holt says they are at their best right at this time.

The work of packing green peas has been completed and the association will ship two carloads to the coast. This is not very many compared to what other fruit centers ship but the association's long suit is in the canning of them and more is made off the fruit by that method.

COEUR D'ALENE TOWNS BURNING AND EXHAUSTED FIGHTERS HELPLESS TO CHECK FLAMES

Spokane, Aug. 22.—Twenty-three are known to have perished and between 75 and 100 are missing in the forest-fires raging in the Panhandle of Idaho, in the Coeur d'Alene district. In addition there are over 100, mostly fire fighters, who are injured. Never in the history of Idaho has a baptism of August fire reached such widespread proportions or created such universal damage. Like a rapidly widening inflamed sore, angry flames lick up the virgin forest, homesteads, mine buildings and human life. The stampede of settlers to reach places of safety has strained the facilities of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company, and passenger trains are made up of all classes of cars, including box cars.

The great tide of fire is being driven today by a forty-mile gale, and the greater part of the Idaho Panhandle is fire-swept. So far the greatest damage is in the more populated district of the Coeur d'Alenes. A strip many miles wide and stretching from the St. Joe river eastward threatens Wardner, Kellogg, Osburn, Wallace, Mullan, Burke and towns farther east into the mountains.

Superintendent Weagle, head of the fire fighters, said this morning: "All the crews are hopelessly lost, and those not dead are being taken care of in three Wallace hospitals."

He says Ranger Gullaski reports six dead, while the remainder of the crew of 75 were compelled to find safety in the West Fork of Placer creek, where they stayed for nearly three hours with only their heads above water. Ranger Bell reports 12 men dead from his crew on Big creek near St. Joe. Three others were burned blind and 13 have broken legs caused by falling trees. He also says the entire fire-fighting force is disorganized and badly in need of more men. A hurry call has been sent to Spokane and other cities.

Losses at Wallace. Spokane, Aug. 22.—Following is a summary of the news received from Wallace yesterday:

In addition to at least 25 otherwise hurt, it is said that ten persons have been made blind. Indication in Wallace, however, are that nearly half of the city will be saved. Communication with Wallace to the west has been possible at intervals today, but eastward it is entirely cut off, and it is known that the entire east half of the town, above Seventh street, has been burned. West of that a hard fight is being made and with improvement in the water supply there is more chance that the flames may be driven back.

Lives Lost in Wallace. In Wallace the dead include: John Boyd, pioneer of the district and for 16 years general agent of the N. P. railroad here, suffocated in his home in Pearl street while trying to rescue the family parrot.

Two unknown, whose skeletons were found in the ruins of the Michigan house. Unknown man, burned to death in Coeur d'Alene house. The conflagration in the East End was stayed soon after 11 o'clock today. Back-firing, in which the members of the city fire department, a company of the Twenty-fifth infantry and many volunteers prevented new fires west and south.

City's Loss Close to Million. The loss to the city is estimated at close to \$1,000,000. Some of the principal losses are as follows: Coeur d'Alene Hardware company, warehouse and stock, \$150,000. Sunset Brewery, \$80,000. Pacific hotel and Annex, owned by W. L. James of Spokane, \$20,000. Coeur d'Alene Iron Works, \$50,000.

O. R. & N. depot and string of box cars, \$50,000. Smith & Fisher, \$50,000. Times Printing company, \$15,000. Worstall Furniture company, \$50,000. Standard Oil company, \$20,000.

About 150 small residences and many other minor business houses.

Hospital Is Saved. Providence hospital and the big mills of the Federal Mining company were the only buildings in the East End that were saved.

Forest Supervisor George W. Weigle reports that the region between Wallace and the St. Joe river is swept practically clean, with enormous loss.

Fires between Burke and Mullan threaten both towns and many women and children have been sent out. At War Eagle tunnel six were found dead and two were badly burned. Five of the dead were in the tunnel, where they had sought refuge. They lay face down in the water, covered with wet rags and blankets. Some had died from the fire and some from suffocation by smoke. The injured were taken to Providence hospital in Wallace.

Twelve dead were recovered at Big Creek. There were three injured and three others were completely blinded.

ST. REGIS DOOMED BY FOREST FIRE

Missoula, Mont., Aug. 22.—A report was received by the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company at 11 o'clock this morning from St. Regis advising that the wind was blowing a gale directly from the fire zone to town. The report declares there is little chance for the old town now, as the flames will soon come in from two sides.

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Overland is surrounded by fires, which are only twelve miles distant from the town on either side, but the village is said to be adequately protected and in no danger. In the Clinton district of the Missoula forest, ten men are unaccounted for, and a relief expedition has been started out of Clinton to seek the lost men.

At Woodside, a large portion of the forest officials this morning report Camas county, east of Potomac, as being the seat of a big fire which is covering both forests and ranches. A large force of men started out last night for Potomac and this morning 100 more left this city for the Camas country.

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STEAMER CAPTAIN MURDERED BY ROBBERS

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—Only meagre accounts of a tragedy on the steamship Buckman yesterday morning have reached here. Capt. E. B. Wood was shot and instantly killed in his cabin in an attempted holdup of the vessel on the high seas off Eureka, and his body, Fred Thomas, leaped into the sea after the failure of an accomplice in the engine room to join him in taking mastery of the boat, but as Wood was unable to make any statement and Thomas is gone, details could not be learned.

The attempt was made at 2:15 o'clock Sunday morning when Thomas, as went to the captain's cabin and summoned the steward, to the door. Hearing shots the quartermaster ran from the bridge to find his superior officer breathing his last at the door of the cabin.

The accomplice was overpowered by the engineers and brought up in irons soon after the shooting of the captain.

The wireless operator was called and messages were flashed to the U. S. steamer President, which was nearby. The President hunted for Thomas for an hour but it was found that the murderer had sunk into the sea.

At first it was believed that the shooting was the work of a maniac, but the capture of the accomplice revealed the fact that it was for the purpose of robbery.

The Buckman is due here at noon today.

WESTERN PACIFIC RUNS FIRST TRAIN

Daylight Special Carries Tourist Party That Includes 100 Newspaper Men

Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 20.—Carrying more than 100 newspaper men from all parts of the United States, the luxuriously equipped Western Pacific special, the first westbound through passenger train over the new transcontinental line, left Salt Lake today. The train will arrive at Winnemucca, Nev., tonight, where another celebration awaits the travelers. They will continue to Oroville on Sunday. This arrangement has been made by the Western Pacific officials so that the pioneer tourists may see the entire road by daylight.

Sunday night will be spent at Oroville and the trip to Oakland will be continued Monday morning. Oakland is a monster jubilee will celebrate the opening of the new line.

The completion of the Western Pacific railway from Salt Lake City to its Pacific coast terminal at Oakland, Cal., and the inauguration of passenger service will be an event of national importance, as affecting the transportation interest of the country. This piece of road, 923 miles in length, is practically an extension of the Gould system westward, and means that a new factor has entered the field in the distribution of transcontinental traffic. The Western Pacific connects with the Denver & Rio Grande railroad at Salt Lake, so that the Gould lines are now continuous from Pittsburgh and Detroit to the Pacific coast, and with these connections are able to supply through freight and passenger service from the Atlantic, the gulf and the Great Lakes, to the terminal city of Oakland, located on the continental side of the Bay of San Francisco, from which ocean lines will take traffic to all points on the Pacific coast and to the Orient.

NICARAGUA REBELS CAPTURE CAPITAL

New Orleans, Aug. 22.—Managua has fallen, and the revolutionists have finally reached the goal for which they have been fighting for ten months. President Madrid did not flee, but remained in the city until the last.

Joe Estrada today issued a proclamation declaring his brother, Estrada, president of the re-united Nicaraguan republic, and the revolutionists are pouring into Managua.

The situation is alarming.

EIGHTEEN LOST WITH BRITISH SHIP

London, Aug. 22.—Eighteen lives were lost when the British cruiser Bedford ran ashore on the rocks of Quailport Island, Korea, yesterday, according to a report received here today. The men were members of the English royal staff.

The accident occurred during the full speed trials and the cruiser was evidently badly smashed, since deaths are stated officially to have been due to "the crush of water." The vessel lies in such a desperate position that there is no possibility of saving her. Her hull is full of water up to the engine room bulkhead, and the water is pouring in through gaping holes punched by sunken rocks.

The officers and crew have been taken off.
