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FARMERS BUILD OWN ELECTRIC RAILROAD

Hundred Mile Trolley Line Is Under Way in the State of Missouri

Southwest Missouri farmers are taking kindly to the idea of popular ownership of public utilities. Much as, in fact, that they are building their own electric railway from Springfield to Joplin with a branch line from Mount Vernon to Pierce City, the entire line to be 100 miles long. It has been named the "Jersey route," a Jersey cow having been adopted as the trademark, and all rolling stock and stationery will bear the big cow arranged as a coat of arms.
