JOHN K. TENER ACCUSED OF BIG FRAUD

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 25.—Though 3000 miles from Portland, Or., not only Pennsylvania's gubernatorial campaign seems to hinge on data supplied by a resident of the Willamette metropolis, but his research discussed by the Philadelphia North American was made the basis for a suit for criminal libel filed today by John K. Tener, republican candidate for governor.

Devoid of legal verbiage, the complaint alleging libel of Tener declares that the North American maligned him by calling the Astoria, Seaside & Tillamook railway a "phantom railroad," its promoters "swindlers," and their boast to "exploit the entire railway system of Astoria" a "baseless fraud."

Elaboration of the report made by the North American's envoy in Portland, Or., discussion of the literature sent broadcast by the National Public Utilities company, of which Tener was president, reproduction of Astoria pictures which illumined circulars

published by the corporation, and a table showing earnings of the road not yet built will be the principal exhibits in the libel suit.

Circulars Called False
 Excerpts from the corporation's exploitation literature upon which the North American commented and based its accusation of fraud against Tener include the following:

This railway is being built from Astoria, Or., across Young's river, through Warrenton, Or., and thence southward along the Pacific coast to Seaside, Or. After this portion of the road is built, it will be extended to Tillamook, Or., a further distance of about fifty miles, making a total of about 70 miles of road. All necessary franchise and rights of way for the present work have been secured, the preliminary engineering to the cost of several thousands of dollars has been completed, and the actual construction work is expected to be finished and the road in operation within twelve months.

In referring to the statistics sent out by the corporation giving estimated yearly profits, the North American said: "The road was thus shown to be able to earn a net surplus of \$52,800 for the first year of

DEFENSE OF DEITZ IS BEGUN IN MILWAUKEE

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 24.—Clarence Dietz, son of the defender of Cameron Dam, arrived in Milwaukee this morning to assume charge of the National Dietz defense fund headquarters. A meeting of the Dietz defense committee was held in the headquarters, at which officers of the executive committee were selected as follows: President, George Schultz; first vice-president, Rev. D. B. Cheney; second vice-president, William Neumann, proprietor of the Kirby House; Secretary, Powell Seelin; treasurer at large, John Reichert.

A meeting of the executive committee will be held every Wednesday night in the Froie Gemeinde hall, at which full reports will be made to Clarence Dietz, who will be the manager of the national operations.

Many men have offered bonds for the Dietz family. Twenty thousand dollars was offered today, William Neumann, Dr. Ralph Elmer Green, A. C. Koerner and City Treasurer C. B. Whitnall each offering \$5000. Each receipt for money received by the committee will be signed by Clarence Dietz personally and all funds will be transferred to him.

The Dietz defense committee has decided to incorporate in order to give its work for Clarence Dietz an official character. Myra Dietz will come here as soon as she can leave the hospital at Ashland.

Outlaw Deitz, In Jail, Will Fight For His Rights.

The exciting history of the experiences of John Deitz of Cameron Dam, Wis., promises to be continued because of the interest his friends will take in defending him before the courts of justice. The Deitz log cabin, now marked with hundreds of bullet holes, stands on Thornapple creek, in the northern part of Wisconsin. Deitz's first clash with the law was over his claim to the ownership of Cameron dam. One of the big lumber companies tried to send lumber down Thornapple creek, and Deitz promptly objected. The fight went to the courts, while the lumber stayed at the dam, held up by virtue of Deitz's rifle. A preliminary order of the court in favor of the lumber company was openly defied by Deitz and no officers could get to him to serve him with the necessary papers. In the end Deitz won his court fight, and his ownership of Cameron dam was established. But in the meanwhile Deitz and his family were in a more or less continuous state of siege for one reason or another. Deitz and his son Leslie wounded several deputy sheriffs in the course of the siege, and warrants for their arrest have been almost constantly awaiting execution. A score and more of deputies have surrounded the cabin on Thornapple creek at various times, but without success until Helen Deitz, the fourteen-year-old daughter, came out of the beleaguered house bearing a flag of truce and the great feud reached its end. Recently there was much indignation over the shooting of Deitz's two small children by deputies. The pleasant yarn that the father could drive nails in a board with a rifle at 100 yards apparently put such terror into the hearts of the besiegers that they took no chances when they caught two of the children driving in the neighborhood. They shot the girl, Myra Deitz, through the hip and the boy in the arm, although the children were unarmed and offered no defense. Afterward the girl was carried off on a train for greater security, although dangerously wounded and suffering greatly.

OLDFIELD BEST CHAMPION IN AUTO RACE

New York Oct. 25.—Barney Oldfield had no trouble in defeating Jack Johnson the champion heavyweight pugilist of the world, when that individual today aspired to wrest from Oldfield his honors on the automobile track. In the first heat Oldfield beat Johnson a quarter of a mile in five miles. Time, 4 minutes and 44 seconds. In the second and deciding heat Oldfield led by fifty yards in slower time.

PUGET SOUND FORFEITS GAME TO SALEM

Salem, Or., Oct. 24.—The University of Puget Sound team, which was accorded a record defeat at the hands of the University of Oregon Saturday by a score of 114 to 0, was scheduled to meet Willamette here today and arrived in this city evidently prepared to play the game, but before the afternoon was over the contest was called off.

The visitors at first demanded 15 minute quarters, which was refused by Willamette, but finally Willamette conceded this point and then the visitors backed down entirely, saying that they were too badly crippled in the game with Oregon.

LOWER RATE FOR WATER AT CITY Y. M. C. A.

The discussion of the methods and advisability of having the city books audited and the granting of a reduced rate of 10 cents per thousand gallons to the city Y. M. C. A. and the U. of O., which is of interest in that it was in connection with this that within a couple of months it is the intention of the water department to reduce all the water rates in the city because of the nearing completion of the city power plant, these two matters composed the principal business that came before the city council last night.

The matter of the Y. M. C. A. water rate was brought up by Mr. Roome, of the Y. M. C. A., who told that the last month's water bill for the building amounted to \$50. This, he declared, was prohibitive to the Y. M. C. A., which is just existing, and he asked for a lower rate. In summing up the advantages of a Y. M. C. A. to the city and showing that the cause was of general city interest, he mentioned that for the first time for many years there was no drowning accident in Eugene this summer. This he attributed to the Y. M. C. A. tank where the boys received swimming instruction and where also the greater part of the water is used.

The Eugene Y. M. C. A. has been asked to pay 25 cents a thousand gallons for its water. Seattle has a six-story building with 2800 members and gets its water free. Spokane, with 1000 members and a four-story building, pays \$4.00 a month; Bellingham pays \$3.00; Tacoma pays \$6.00; and North Yakima gives the water to the association for 10 cents a thousand. "We do not ask for the water free," he said, "but we would like it for 10 cents a thousand. The city donates the water to the depot park, and I really believe the Y. M. C. A. is as much of value to the city as an advertisement as it is. We build up boys and it seems as though this fact alone should call for an ordinance to give us a lower rate."

Most of the councilmen were in favor of the proposition, but Heller and Dorr were not decided upon the matter. Mr. Garrett said:

"I know that two members of the fire and water committee would recommend a reasonable rate. Eugene paid for this building and is interested in it, and I think that it is an advertisement for the city. I would recommend a lower rate than a flat rate, however."

Expect to Cut Rates
 "When we get our plant in operation, which we expect to do within a very short time, we expect to cut all rates and I believe that this 10-cent rate would not be out of proportion. I am heartily in favor of it."

Mr. Berger coincided with this view. The mayor suggested that immediate action be taken upon it. Mr. Koppe would make the rate for it and the U. of O. the same. The U. of O. rate is now 15 cents. He would reduce it or lower the Y. M. C. A. to 15. Berger was somewhat of the same opinion. He said: "I believe that the Y. M. C. A. should have 10 cents or less. We will reduce the rate to the private consumer to 25 cents within a very short time. We are charging too much now. I suggest that both institutions have their rates lowered."

S. W. Taylor, water superintendent, was then asked to give figures. He denied the statement of Mr. Ness that the water rate of Eugene was now too high and declared that Eugene's rate was now lower than that of any other city in the state except Oregon City.

Ten-Cent Rate Given
 Garrett said that Eugene would be pumping its own water within two months and suggested that this action be closed up at once. A motion to give the Y. M. C. A. 10 cents was made and passed with only the dissenting votes of Heller and Dorr. Henderson was absent.

A number of bills were ordered

paid. At this point Contractor Ryckman, who had signed a contract on the city to receive \$1200 if the work was completed before August 1 and \$1000 if not, demanded that he be paid the larger sum on the ground that there was more earth to be excavated than was represented to him. The smaller bill was ordered paid and action on the additional sum deferred to future meetings.

The committee of the whole recommended that \$1400 be the earnings of the water plant be transferred to the construction fund and this was done upon a vote.

Auditing City Books
 At this point Koppe brought up the matter of auditing the city books for the benefit, he said, of the outsiders and taxpayers. Before this subject was referred to the mayor and the finance committee to investigate the cost, it led to some interesting discussions on the part of the councilmen. The chief difficulty seemed to be as to how far back this investigation should go and whether the cost would be prohibitive. It was said that this might cost over \$10,000.

Koppe was in favor of beginning the investigation with the recent administration. The mayor agreed to with him upon this, for, as he said, he thought that his records were all that were wanted by the people. But the other members differed. Garrett would go back ten years. Ness would have the investigation go back still further, say 15 years. Dorr thought that two administrations should be sufficient. City Attorney Pipes suggested that since the investigation was desired by the Merchants' Protective association and the Commercial club, that these bodies pay the expense of auditing. The motion finally was that the mayor and finance committee be authorized to look up the cost of expending the books for periods of 4, 6, 8 and 10 years.

A sewer amendment that was very complete in details and contained a number of radical amendments that caused a smile or two and also slight disagreement in the council was ordered referred to the city attorney and sewer committee.

After checking off the assessments for the curbs on West Sixth street the meeting adjourned.

FIRE FROM CIGARETTE PUTS OUT SMOKER'S EYE

Cottage Grove, Ore., Oct. 24.—William Pearson, a resident of Dorena, while watching a game of billiards in a local resort Thursday night, while holding a lighted cigarette in his mouth, met with a peculiar accident. One of the players, Mr. Coffman, playfully attempted to knock the cigarette from his mouth with the billiard cue, when the fire flew upward and struck one of Pearson's eyes, and it is feared that he will lose his sight as the result of the burn.

CHAMBERLAIN ON ELECTION ISSUE IN OREGON

In order to cloud the real issue in this campaign, which is conventionism disguised under the name of assemblyism, it has been charged by the enemies of the Oregon system that there is a combination between Senator Bourne, Oswald West and myself to defeat Mr. Bowerman and to elect Mr. West. It is charged that this combination has for its purpose not only the defeat of Mr. Bowerman, but in some remote way to assist the alleged candidacy of Senator Bourne two years hence and the alleged candidacy of myself four years hence.

Those who make this charge know that it is false, and the people are beginning to understand that it is made purposely and deliberately to draw the voters away from the issue of conventionism.

I have made no combination with Bourne, or Ellis, or Hawley, or any or either of them, to further the candidacy of them or any of them. I have one thing in common with Senator Bourne. If this be treason, then two-thirds of the voters of this state are equally guilty with Senator Bourne and myself. That thing which Senator Bourne and I have in common, and which two thirds of the voters have in common with us, is the defense of the initiative and referendum, the direct primary law in its full integrity and purpose, State-ment No. 1, the corrupt practices act, the recall and all of the legislation which has been enacted by the people under the initiative and referendum.

The life of the Oregon system is now the issue. It is trembling in the balance.

The election of Mr. Bowerman and those who with him have been nominated under the so-called assembly method of nomination means the defeat of this system, and I am ready to unite with Senator Bourne, as I am undertaking to unite with two thirds of the voters of this state, in advising the people at the coming election to vote against every man, whether Democrat or Republican, who has received his nomination in any other way or manner than by submitting his candidacy in an open primary, without any suggestion of assemblyism or conventionism to the voters of the district, or county, or state, as the case may be.

I deny as positively as it is possible for me to deny the charge that there is any combination or alliance or understanding between Senator Bourne and myself, or between Senator Bourne, Mr. West and myself, and I state with equal positiveness that Senator Bourne and I have not conferred at any time with reference to the candidacy of Mr. West, and I believe as firmly as I believe anything that Mr. West himself has never conferred with Senator Bourne at any time in reference to his candidacy for the position for which he is now a candidate.

The charge comes from those who are the recognized friends of the assembly system and who have always opposed the direct primary law and Statement No. 1, and its purpose is so palpably to mislead the voters and to draw their attention away from the main issue in this campaign that no one will be deceived or humbugged by it.
