

HAWLEY ELECTED GOVERNOR OF GEM STATE

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 11.—Hope for the re-election of Governor Brady is all but abandoned at the headquarters of the Republican state central committee. The Democratic candidate, James H. Hawley, now leads Brady by an indicated plurality of one thousand, with 99 precincts in the state missing.

Hawley has been for years the leading criminal lawyer of Idaho, and was leading counsel in the prosecution of the alleged murderers of Governor Steunenberg. He is opposed to state-wide prohibition, while Governor Brady favors it.

HARBAUGH IS ELECTED CONSTABLE OF EUGENE

Wins by Large Plurality Over Opponents—Bryson Justice of the Peace

I. N. Harbaugh has been elected constable in the 12 precincts in the Eugene district. The vote was decisive, the totals giving him 773, or a 2 to 1 plurality over any other candidate. Only in Fairmount was he defeated, where Mr. Marsh won in his own precinct. The race between the other four candidates was quite close, and as the vote was being counted first one and then the other finish in Eugene was West Eugene No. 3, where the last vote was counted at 1:20 p. m. today. In this precinct the vote for Mr. Harbaugh was 136 against 49 for Thompson, 53 for Morris, and 35 each for Marsh and Plank. For justice of the peace R. S. Bryson practically had no opposition.

In the totals Marsh came second with 343 votes; Marsh had 289, Plank 227 and Thompson 112. Following is the vote by precincts:

SOUTHERN PACIFIC LAND GRAB IS ALLEGED

Washington, Nov. 11.—Attorney-General Wickersham, by direction of President Taft, has begun an inquiry to determine whether six thousand acres of valuable oil lands in California were known to contain oil when patented to the Southern Pacific. If such is the case suit to recover the land will be instituted.

This action regarding the oil lands was taken after a conference between President Taft and Secretary Ballinger and Attorney-General Wickersham. Thousands of acres of land in California known and believed to contain oil have been patented to individuals and to the Southern Pacific Company. Those who have heard of the president's action say that if his plans are successful a genuine work for conservation will have been accomplished.

POULTRY STOCK

State Imports More Than 100 Carloads of Eggs Every Year

Portland, Nov. 10.—Oregon is importing more than 100 car loads of eggs each year, according to the experiment station of Oregon Agricultural college. This 100 cars of eggs should all be produced here at home, and many more besides, according to the experts in charge of the experiment station work. How to bring this about is what is taxing the ingenuity of those having the agricultural future of the state in charge.

Conditions here for poultry growing are ideal. By experiment and by practical demonstration it has been shown that the hen thrives throughout this state and shows a handsome profit to her keeper when handled properly. But more chickens are needed to care for the demand that is outrunning production.

Prizes are offered for the best flocks and for the best progress made during the year. Indeed, the premiums are well worth striving for, the first prize being \$100 and the second \$50, while there are many minor prizes. Those failing to win any prizes can point to the poultry earnings for compensation, together with the knowledge and practical experience they have gained in the work.

Ben W. Hooper's Life Shrouded By Romance and Mystery



If Ben W. Hooper is elected he will have the honor of being the first republican governor Tennessee has had for thirty years, and he will have the further distinction of having won his high place largely by Democratic votes in a southern state that should be safely in the Democratic column. A striking feature of the independent Democratic convention, by which his candidacy was endorsed, was a procession of more than 500 Confederate soldiers; and in their faded suits of Confederate gray. So Hooper is a political curiosity, but much more important, he is an unusual man. He was found in the streets of Knoxville about forty years ago, a helpless and deserted orphan, and was committed to a Baptist orphan asylum. Where he came from no one knew, and no one seemed to care. He was not attractive in appearance, being small and delicate looking, but there was something in the bright gray eyes and in the way he had of looking at things that enlisted the interest of a prominent citizen of east Tennessee, who had the boy thoroughly educated. At the age of twenty-one he graduated with honors in law, and it was about this time that the romance of his life began to develop.

Dr. James Withycombe, of the experiment station, and Professor James Dryden, head of the department of poultry husbandry at the same institution, will make the awards of the prizes.

LYMAN ABBOTT SAYS ROOSEVELT WAS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR DEFEAT OF REPUBLICANS

New York, Nov. 11.—Dr. Lyman Abbott, editor of the Outlook, of which Theodore Roosevelt is contributing editor, today gave out his—Abbott's—interpretation of the recent election, embodied in an editorial to appear in the next issue of that publication.

"Popular dissatisfaction with present conditions, especially with high prices; indignation manifest over the control by special interests of the tariff revision, and still more at the defense and eulogies of the tariff bill; wrath at the corruption and hypocritical pretense disclosed in certain influential Republican circles, coupled with forgetfulness of the fact that the exposure and the prosecution were furnished by Republicans; a growing conviction that there had been an alliance between the special interests and the Republican oligarchy with the belief that the easiest way to hit it was by voting with the opposition," is the way Editor Abbott explains the Republican defeat.

"Nor do I think the jack-o'-lantern bugaboo of Mr. Roosevelt's imagined monarchical ambitions cut any considerable figure in the election. The fact that the greatest falling off in the Republican vote was in Pennsylvania, where his voice was not once heard during the campaign, is significant, if not conclusive on that point."

COLONEL DROPS OUT OF SIGHT
