At Torreon a large force of cavalry will be sent in pursuit of the revolutionists, who have withdrawn toward San Pedro, where a decisive battle is expected today.

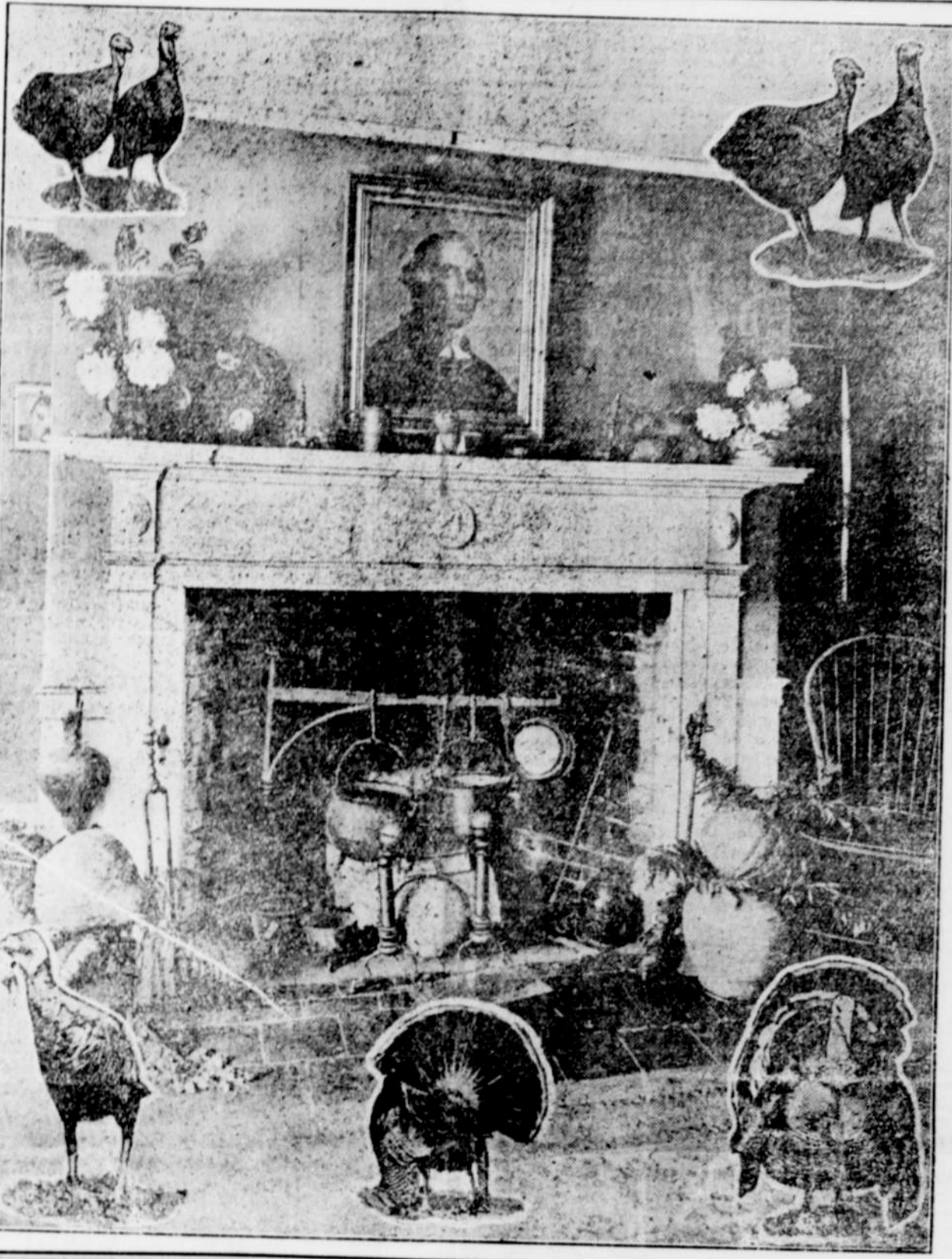
Waiting on Border Laredo, Nov. 23.—It is said on good authority that an army of two hundred revolutionists are encamped thirty miles from this city on the American side,
