SEVERE FIGHTING REPORTED IN MANY PLACES BETWEEN SOLDIERS AND REBELS

El Paso, Nov. 23.—Wild scenes of disorder marked the night at Torreon, with the government forces in full control of the city. The death list is estimated at sixty or seventy, largely from the insurgent side. The revolutionists lack organization and their supply of ammunition and arms is limited.

The insurgents massed outside Chihuahua have control of a large territory, but the government forces and property owners are in possession of the city. Wires in many directions have been cut, and it is impossible to ascertain exact conditions.

Heavy fighting occurred today at Santa Isabel and Chihuahua. Reports from Monterey state that a large force of federal troops is enroute to Monolovia and Heahulia to meet Madera, who is reported marching to that place with one thousand well equipped cavalry and several hundred infantry. This force, it is said, is being augmented all along the line of march.

At Torreon a large force of cavalry will be sent in pursuit of the revolutionists, who have withdrawn toward San Pedro, where a decisive battle is expected today.

Messages are being accepted by the Mexican government telegraph operators, who claim to have the wires open.


