NO AGREEMENT ON RATE FOR STREET LIGHTING

Most of the time of the city council was taken up at the adjourned meeting last night with the discussion of a new contract with the Northwestern Corporation for lighting the streets and the city buildings for one year. There was no definite action on the matter, although the present contract expires tomorrow night. The outcome was that Manager Spencer agreed to give the council two more weeks in which to decide the matter. In the meantime the company to furnish the lights to the city at the same price as in the old contract. It is thought that some conclusion may be reached on the matter by the time the council meets again on December 12.

The new contract calls for arc lights at \$6 per month per light for a period of one year. Mayor Matlock objected to this rate as exorbitant and he called for a \$5 rate, the same as Corvallis pays. Manager Spencer would not agree to this, but would give a \$5.50 rate if the contract was made for five years, or a \$5 rate if given a 10-year contract. The council would not agree to make a long contract for the reason that the city's electric plant on the McKenzie is expected to be utilized some time in the future for street lighting as well as to furnish power to operate the water pumps, the primary purpose for which it was built. In checking up the incandescents burned by the city it was found by Manager Spencer that 16 lights are being used at the city's pumping station that have not heretofore been paid for. Including these, a rate of \$40 per month for all the incandescents used by the city was proposed in the contract. This seemed to be satisfactory to the members of the council.

The city is at present using \$6 are on the streets, which at the rate of \$4 per month means an outlay of \$24 for the street lighting, and this added to the \$40 a month for the incandescents, makes a total of \$64 a month.

The matter of continuing the present system of festoon lighting on the business streets was brought up by the mayor. He stated that the business men do not wish to bear the burden of paying for these lights after the present contract expires, and said that if a better rate than is now given could be had the city would be glad to pay for them, but Manager Spencer said his company could not afford to make a lower rate. No action was taken on this matter.

Routine Business
The council opened with the reading and allowing a number of bills on the power plant account.

Mayor Matlock stated that he had been in phone communication with Engineer Meyers at the power plant and Meyers informed him that there was considerable water in the ditch on account of the swollen condition of the river, but that the ditch was holding very well and he thought there would never be any danger from floods. He could not set any definite time for the completion of the plant until the present storm and freshet is over.

Warrants were ordered drawn to several persons for excess assessments in payment for a sewer on Mill street.

Superintendent Taylor Resigns
The resignation of S. W. Taylor as city water superintendent was tendered for the reason that he has been elected county treasurer. The resignation is to take effect not later than December 31. He goes into office the next day. The resignation was placed on file.

An ordinance levying assessments for the improvement of the alley between Oak and Pearl streets from East Fifteenth to East Sixteenth was passed.

The street committee reported favorably on accepting the new curbing on West Seventh street and the report was adopted.

Streetcar Accident
Mayor Matlock called attention to the recent accident on South Williamette street wherein Mrs. Sarah Marquis and her son, Maurice, were injured and one of their horses was killed by being run into by a streetcar. Mayor Matlock called attention to the fact that the bridge on which the collision took place is narrower than called for in the franchise in that it was not built clear to the curb, as provided for. He said the accident was due to the fact that there was not room enough between the bridge railing and the car track to avoid it. He said if the accident was the city's fault the city would have a lawsuit on its hands, and he wanted to know whether the company or city is to blame. The franchise was looked up and it was found that the bridges should extend from curb to curb, whereas this bridge does not. It was agreed that the mayor and as many of the councilmen as could go should inspect the scene of the accident this morning.

A petition for the improvement of the alley extending from Olive to Charnelton streets between West Eighth and West Ninth was referred.

Councilman Berger moved that in order to meet some labor bills on the power ditch, \$1000 be transferred from the general fund to the construction fund. The motion was carried. Berger also reported the sale of some wire to the Northwestern Corporation for \$261.75 and the money turned into the construction fund.

FILTER PLANT WILL BE COMPLETED IN A MONTH

If the machinery and material arrive within the next few days, Eugene's new filter plant, which has been under course of construction during the past four months, will be completed within another month. The big concrete clear water well was completed yesterday, and nothing remains but the installation of the settling tanks and the filter machinery. The settling tanks are being constructed by the Oregon Iron & Steel Company in Portland, and will be shipped soon. It is only a matter of a few days to put these in their places behind the well after they arrive. M. Sissensvine, of the Jewel Filter Company, has the contract to install the machinery. He is now in California, but is expected here any day. He has been awaiting the completion of the concrete work, and as this is far behind the contract time, the machinery should soon be here. The city water authorities have heard little from him lately, but have notified him that everything is in readiness.

The greatest part of the construction of the plant is complete. This is the big clear water tank, which is an enormous box, built in two partitions of reinforced concrete, with top and bottom. It holds the pure water before it is pumped to the reservoir. Many veracious delays upon this work have occurred and it has taken much longer than expected to complete, but it is a pretty piece of work completed. The filter machinery will stand upon this and will be roofed in with a corrugated iron building.

It will only be a matter of a few weeks before the plant is complete and the water users will not be able to determine the height of the river by looking at the drinking water on the breakfast table.

MINER SHOTS AND KILLS CARDWELL

Quarrel Between Men Over Slayer's Non-Employment Ends in Murder

Grants Pass, Or., Nov. 28.—Edward Cardwell, a well-known miner of this county, was shot and killed Sunday afternoon by Lige Boyatt. Cardwell had been working with the construction in building a wagon road from Leland to the Alameda mine in the Galice district, and was sent by the foreman to the Alameda mine to get men to work on the road. In securing the men, he did not employ Boyatt. Cardwell started back toward Leland, and when within eight miles of that place stopped in a construction tent out of the rain. Boyatt had followed him and a quarrel ensued in the tent. Cardwell started to leave when Boyatt whipped out a revolver and shot him, the bullet striking Cardwell in the left shoulder, and lodged in the spinal column, causing his death.

Sheriff Russell was notified and is now scouring the mountains in that vicinity with a posse, looking for Boyatt, who has disappeared. Cardwell is unmarried and is well known here, having lived here all his life. Boyatt is married and has seven children, and but little is known here if him, he having recently come here from Oklahoma. Cardwell's body will be brought to this city this afternoon.

BIG MEN MAY BE WOOL GROWERS CONVENTION

Portland, Or., Nov. 29.—Speakers are being made to the attendance of Secretary Baller of the interior department Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture at the annual convention of the National Woolgrowers association at Portland, January 5, 6 and 7.

Letters requesting their attendance will be sent from the office of the association, commercial and prominent citizens. It is believed that sufficient pressure can be brought to bear to bring these cabinet officials here, adding greatly to the interest of the convention. In a recent letter to Secretary Walker of the association Secretary Wilson says:

"The wool interests should carefully look after at the present time. I do not think it would be wise to have legislation by congress detrimental to the wool interest of the country. The sheep has become one of our great meat-producing animals, and it costs the people much at this time to buy meat."

"We should encourage the development of the sheep industry all a the line. There are millions of acres east of the Mississippi—10 million east of the Alleghenies—south as well as north of the river, that should maintain sheep. Somehow the American farmer has not appreciated fully the value of sheep as a meat producer and ovator of the soil. The spring lamb that comes on the market during summer is the one kind of meat that has been produced without feed grain; and that is a mighty reason for the increase of the sheep industry."
