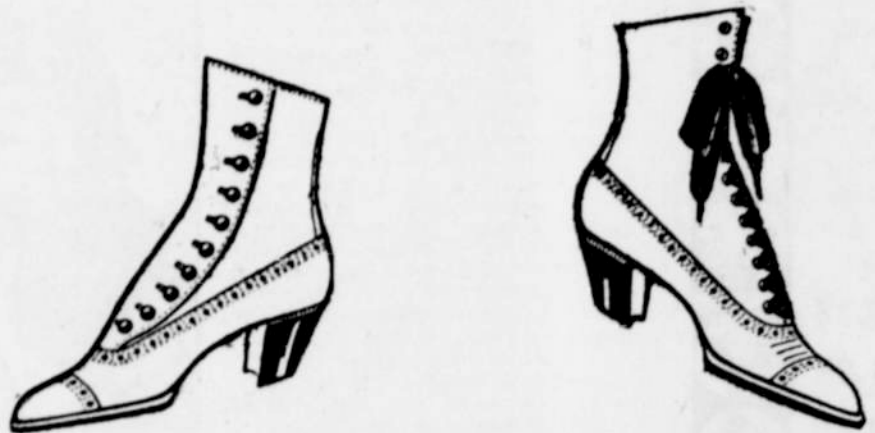

Oregon Apple Show

Every apple grower of Oregon should make it a point to exhibit at the All-Oregon Apple Show in the Armory, at Portland, November 30, December 1 and 2. It is possible to win in one premium \$250. In addition to this is a premium of \$250 offered by Lewis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern railroad, that may be won by the sweepstake winner, the only provision being that it shall be grown in a section contributory to the Great Northern railroad, and these sections are described as follows:

Between Portland, Oregon, and Vancouver, B. C.; along all Great Northern lines in Washington, Idaho or British Columbia, including Spokane and the Inland Empire railroad points; along the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad; on Astoria & Columbia river railroad; on Oregon Trunk railroad; on Oregon Electric railway (including the Willamette valley to Eugene); on United railway; on Pacific & Eastern (including Medford to Butte Falls).

There is also another premium of \$250 offered by the Northern Pacific which may be won by the same party if their orchard should be contributory to the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern both, and by winning the sweepstake, would make \$750 cash. ESCAPED CONVICT

KILLED BY GUARD

Desperate Criminal Seriously Wounds Dan W. Ackley First

Burns, Or., Nov. 29.—In a last desperate effort to regain his freedom, Arthur Fisher, escaped convict from the Idaho penitentiary, grappled with his captors this morning and as a result now lies dead, while Dan W. Ackley, penitentiary guard from Boise, is suffering with a wound through the abdomen. While Ackley's condition is serious, doctors believe his chances for recovery are good.

Fisher, who was serving sentence at Boise for horse stealing, escaped April 19, 1906, and during the past two years had been herding sheep in this county. Sheriff Richardson received notice last week to capture him and on Friday Fisher came to Burns, when the sheriff made the arrest and notified the Boise officials.

Last evening Guard Ackley arrived and identified his man. This morning Ackley was preparing to take the stage for Vale. While Ackley and Sheriff Richardson were placing the Oregon boot on Fisher, who stood up between the two with his foot on a chair, Fisher reached over quietly and slipped Ackley's revolver from his pocket. He turned the gun on Sheriff Richardson, the bullet missing the officer's head by a narrow margin.

Ackley grappled with Fisher, and in the scuffle Fisher shot him through the abdomen. Richardson pulled his gun as soon as he could safely shoot and put six bullets into the desperado, killing him instantly.

Fisher, whose prison name at Boise was James Tannen, was 29 years old. It is reported he shot a guard at the Walla Walla prison some years ago. He is said to come from a good family in Lawrence, Kan.

Oregonian: Cargo has accumulated at the Central dock for Florence and Sluslaw points, there having been a rush for goods owing to the recent fire at Florence, but the gasoline schooner Wilhelmmina was prevented from loading all offered. Arrangements were made whereby the Breakwater will carry the consignments to Coos Bay, there to be transferred to the Wilhelmmina for Sluslaw.

YEAR IS BIG FOR LIQUOR AND OLEO

Government Gets Great Revenue from Booze and Near-Butter

Washington, Nov. 29.—The United States has just passed through a banner year for smokes, drinks, oleomargarine. Here is the nation's record for the twelve months ended on June 30, as it shows in the figures of the internal revenue bureau:

Of distilled spirits, 163,000,000 gallons, 30,000,000 gallons more than the year before.

Of fermented liquors, 59,485,111 barrels, an increase of 2,000,000.

Of cigars, 7,600,000,000, or 160,000,000 more than in 1909.

Of cigarettes, 6,830,000,000, an increase of 1,000,000,000.

Of plug, fine cut, cube cut, granulated or sliced smoking tobacco or chewing tobacco or snuff, 402,000,000 pounds, 4,000,000 more than the year before.

Of oleomargarine, 141,862,222 pounds, 50,000,000 pounds increase.

Illicit distilling and manufacturing of moonshine whisky is on the increase, "especially," the bureau says, "where are state-wide prohibition laws."

The internal revenue receipts on all these things—and certain other things, such as playing cards and mixed flour—amounted to more than \$285,000,000.

While the manufacture of oleomargarine has increased, the tax receipts were disappointing. That is said to be because a large proportion of the oleomargarine is so made as to take a lower tax than formerly.

PLANS FOR NEW BUILDING EXPECTED TO ARRIVE SOON

Springfield, Nov. 29.—The Northwestern Corporation company is expecting daily the arrival of the plans for the new brick substitution here. When these arrive from Chicago, bids will be secured and the contract let, construction beginning soon after the first of the year. The building will be one-story high on the street, but two stories in height in the rear, where the machinery is to be installed. The one-story part in front will be used for the offices. It is possible that the front will be faced with pressed brick, but this is not yet determined. The difficulty here is not the cost, but the limited supply of this brick that is obtainable. The work on the brick power plant near the depot has been more or less held up by the rain, but is being rushed as rapidly as possible. There is some difficulty in securing gravel here, but it may be possible that the city will supply this in the form of crushed rock from their quarry near the plant. The legality of this under the charter is questioned. At present this rock crushing plant is working full shift to lay up a supply for the use on the streets.

Last evening Chief of Police Farrington obtained a confession from a boy by the name of Johnson, aged 12 years, that he shot the Forneri boy in the calf of the leg the other day, mention of which was made in last evening's Guard. The Johnson boy was handling an automatic revolver and not knowing the mechanism of it, pulled the trigger. It was discharged, and the bullet went through the other boy's leg. Both boys at first stuck to the story that they did not know where the shot came from and that they did not hear the report.

SECURING ROOMS AND BOARD FOR VISITORS AT BIG CONVENTION

People Who Have Accommodations for Y. M. C. A. Men Urged to Telephone

Ray Goodrich, chairman of the entertainment committee in charge of the work of finding homes for the visiting delegates to the convention of the Young Men's Christian Associations of Oregon and Idaho, is receiving many cards from those who plan to come to Eugene and who want entertainment. All who can take delegates for Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings are urged to call up the Y. M. C. A.—Main 808—not later than 7:30 tonight. Those who are so situated that they can take delegates, and would care to, should state the number they can accommodate either for room and meals, or for either, at this time to avoid embarrassment of the committee.

When the boys' conference was held in Albany last year several boys from Eugene were kept waiting at the headquarters in one of the churches for so long without any one being able to give any encouragement that places could be found for them at all that they were a pretty blue lot. The number of delegates that came in was greater than they had expected and there certainly was trouble for the committee, upon whom the responsibility fell. Some one asked yesterday if this was a boys' conference coming this week. Since a boys' conference is the kind that has been seen most of here recently, there may be others in Eugene who expect that we are to have a gathering like the one in Eugene two years ago, and at Hillsboro this last week. The convention coming, however, is for business men, young men and students. Every college in the two states will be represented and good delegations will come from the various city associations.

COMMISSION PLAN COST TACOMA MONEY

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 30.—Under the first six months of the commission plan of city government the report of the city controller just issued shows that the city payrolls have been increased \$40,000 more than for a similar period under the old system of government.

During the campaign, proponents of the commission plan promised a saving of approximately \$240,000 annually.

According to the controller's report, salaries since the commission has been in power have totaled \$410,373.14 as compared to \$372,037.12 for the same period of time under the old government system.
