SPRINGFIELD WILL

SOON VOTE ON LIQUOR QUESTION

Springfield, Dec. 6.—With the city election over, it is now generally understood that a petition will be circulated within the next few days calling for a special election to be held in April, or, if possible, before to take a vote upon the question of whether the city shall be "wet" or "dry." Springfield will probably be the first city in the state to vote upon the question of whether or not liquor shall be sold under the provisions of the new "home rule" law. The method of procedure is that a petition shall be presented to the mayor, and he, through the city council, will call for a special election.

It has been planned for some days to put this matter in the shape of a petition, but those interested withheld until after yesterday's election, in order that this question might not be one of the considerations at the election. It will be actively taken up now by the liquor interests.

General satisfaction has been expressed over the results of the election and it is thought that there will be perfect harmony from both parties.

LARGE VOTE POLLED AT CITY ELECTION

Springfield, Dec. 6.—The largest vote ever cast in the city of Springfield showed the interest that was taken in the city election yesterday. The total vote cast was 343. Mullen was chosen city recorder over J. J. Totten by a vote of 176 to 142, and E. E. Morrison is the new city treasurer, defeating Erhart 191 to 141. The election booths were crowded all during election and an especially heavy vote was taken from five o'clock, when the mill closed, until seven o'clock. Although party spirit was rife, the election was markedly orderly and quiet.
