PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.

Portland, Or., Jan. 18.—One of the features of the hop market at this time is the revival of interest in old stock. There is still a good deal of demand for hops that, regardless of age, are of such quality that they can be used by brewers, and with the supply of 1910 growth so near exhaustion on the coast, dealers are naturally turning to 1909s and 1908s and as a rule paying good prices for these products. For the best 1909 hops available 12 to 13 cents is freely offered, and a number of purchases at the prices named are reported to have been made within the past few days.

For choice 1908s 18 to 18 1-2 cents is said to be readily obtainable, but growers having such hops are not selling at all freely, many of them holding for 20 cents. As a result, buyers turn to the old growths, wherever anything of quality is to be found.

It was reported today that the Pineau lot of 350 bales, which suffered damage through flood in the warehouse across the river from Independence in January of last year, is to be sold at auction by Klaber, Wolf, & Netter in the near future. What these hops will bring in the auction market is a matter of conjecture. It is claimed that while damaged by water, they were not altogether ruined.

A few contracts on the 1911 crop at prices around 13 cents are reported to have been drawn this week, but to date not much business in this

demand for contracts, and it is rumored that as high as 14 cents has been offered for 1911s, but it is yet too early in the season for anything like activity in the contract market. Reports from California are that 14 cents is being freely offered for contracts, but with few takers.

Potato Market.

While there is no change in California conditions, potatoes are being hoisted here by buyers. For choice Willamette Valley stock as high as \$1.25 is being offered for supplies at points that carry general rates. In eastern Multnomah and Clackamas recent sales of extra fancy have been made as high as \$1.50, but generally speaking \$1.40 is being offered for this grade, with growers not selling to any extent.

The situation in the potato market is peculiar inasmuch as the time is drawing near when holders must either offer their goods for sale or else allow them to rot in their barns. The holdings of potatoes this season are the greatest ever known at this time of the year and most of the holding are figuring upon unloading in the California markets. This is true of Oregon, Idaho, and Nevada, as well as other nearby states. Colorado will not offer potatoes to San Francisco unless the goods are paid for at the time of shipment, as it is alleged that too much money has been lost heretofore by Colorado shippers who invaded the California market in times of scarcity.

Onions Being Held Back.

Notwithstanding the fact that the onion growers decided to sell their supplies to buyers at \$1.75 per cental f. o. b., country shipping points, dealers confirm that they are unable to confirm orders, even at the advance. It is claimed that the selling agency of the association is powerless to contract for delivery without asking each grower, therefore it is unable to do business as it should.

Onions are quoted firm along Front street with sales of fancy stock generally at \$2 per cental.

Not Enough Poultry Coming.

With practically nothing carried over from last week and receipts to date this week very light, the poultry market today showed a very decidedly strong tone. The high prices ruling on hens, chickens and ducks at the close Saturday, were readily obtainable, but no further advances were reported. The outlook is for a moderate poultry supply all the week.

For choice country dressed veal and pork the demand was such as to take all offerings at the range last quoted, and there was a fair inquiry also for good grade beef, at 7 to 8 cents per pound.

Eggs had without change from the last quotations. Dealers report receipts of local, but the trade is fairly well supplied with California and Eastern stock. With warmer weather egg prices are expected to gravitate.

There was no developments of particular interest in the butter market. Local creamery men reported current make working off well at going prices, but the weakness of the market on outside and Eastern stock is daily becoming more apparent, and this beyond doubt will in the near future affect the local creamery market.

Cheese was steady at the last quotations.

The Cereal Markets.

The eastern demand for our brewing barley continues quite heavy and sales are reported in the interior around \$24 a ton, which would mean \$27 Portland. However, local interests would not pay this figure and no brewing supplies are coming in this direction. The entire barley market is firm here, as a result of the eastern activity in brewing, but quotations on feed are generally unchanged.

The oats market is somewhat mixed as to character, with some buyers asserting that \$29 is being paid, while others are equally positive that the market is not so firm, and they would like to sell at the price named. In any event, none are now quoting under \$28.50. The failure of the oats market to keep pace with the advance in barley is exciting some attention, but it may be possible that the advance is merely delayed.

Wheat market is dull, with interior movement small and no change in quotations.

Alfalfa hay is being offered very freely by eastern region and Idaho interests and the price is low at \$13 per ton as a result of this forced movement.

Flour trade is quiet, both for domestic and foreign brands.
