

TYPHOID SCARE IS THING OF PAST SAYS DR. WALL

City Health Officer Makes Very Favorable Report to Council—Other City Affairs

BOAT HOUSE BEING BUILT IN STREET

Mr. Chambers May Have to Tear Down New Structure—Mass Meeting Thursday

"The typhoid scare is a thing of the past," said Dr. Geo. Wall, city health officer, at the council meeting last night. In making a report to that body, "Only two new cases have been reported since the first of January and all the cases are getting along well." The doctor, in making his report, stated that sanitary conditions are much better about the city now than they were a month ago, due to the activity of the council, the plumbing inspector and the health officers.

The council meeting opened last night with the passing of a number of ordinances assessing costs on public improvements as follows:

For the improvement of Agate avenue from Twenty-first street to Twenty-fourth street.

For the construction of a concrete curbing on West Seventh street from Olive to Blair.

For the improvement of Garden street in Fairmount.

For the construction of a sewer in alley between Washington and Jefferson streets from Chesire street to the alley between West First and West Second.

Dr. Wall's Report.

At this point Dr. Wall submitted his report. Beside reporting on the typhoid situation and the sanitary conditions, he had a list of places where trash and rubbish exist that are dangerous to the health of the community. One was the lodging house at southwest corner of West Eighth and Olive streets. He reported that the residence property on East Seventh street back of Otto's, where two cases of typhoid fever appeared on account of sewerage running into the well had been cleaned up and the owner was ordered to abate the well and connect with

the city water as soon as the filters are installed.

He found the Condon school septic tank, which has been giving trouble, to be working satisfactorily. As to swimming tanks he found none at the University, but at the Y. M. C. A. he was informed that no water is now being used from the city mains and none will be used until after the filters are flushed. The Underwood House, where fifth is said to exist, was examined and Mr. Frasier promised to abate the nuisance. Analysis of the water in the city well had been made, and it was found to be free from contagion. The water used at the bottling factories has also been analyzed. That at the plant of the Eugene Cold Storage and Ice Company was found to be the best in the city, as far as examined, and that at the Weinhard ice factory and the Eugene Bottling Works was found to be excellent.

Mayor Matlock stated that the Eugene Heating and Power Company has a quantity of lumber left over from the construction of the central heating plant which might be secured at a bargain by the city for use in building crosswalks and the street commissioner was instructed to examine it, and buy it, if he thought it could be used.

The matter of paying interest on the \$150,000 refunding bonds and the \$60,000 filter and water main bonds, was attended to and the proper order made.

House in The Street.

Councilman Moon, of the street committee, called the council's attention to the fact that F. L. Chambers is erecting a boat house on the banks of the mill race, on what is claimed to be city property, being a part of the street. The matter was referred to the street committee and chief of police, with power to remove the building.

The matter of condemning a short strip of land for the opening of Olive street from West Fifth to the depot grounds, was brought up by the mayor. This matter was given to a committee to assess the damages and benefits to the property owners, but the committee has never reported. The council fixed the time to hear the report as January 23.

The recorder was instructed to notify the property owners.

Councilman Moon called attention to the bridge on South Willamette street where Mrs. Marquise was run into by a street car and severely injured. Garrett moved that the street committee take the matter up and arrange with the street car company to widen the bridge, according to the company's franchise. If arrangements cannot be made, the city is to fix it and charge it to the company.

Bridge Is Dangerous.

Chief of Police Farrington asked what should be done in regard to

complaints of the dangerous condition of the south approach to the big red bridge across the Willamette. The county claims that it is the city's duty to fix this end, and the city claims that the bridge belongs to the county. In the meantime several big holes have been worn in the floor and several horses have stuck their legs through lately, but fortunately for the city, none of the animals have been injured. This matter has been discussed often and the matter of fixing new boundaries so as to exclude the bridge from the city limits has been hanging fire for a long time. City Engineer Waggoner was instructed to go ahead with his work, and the boundary question will soon be submitted to the voters. Garrett moved that the city attorney get the boundaries fixed, and that the matter go ahead. This was carried.

Garrett brought up the matter of pay for the councilmen and stated that he expected to retire from the council this year. For this reason he felt free to advocate a report remuneration for the councilmen who gave a great deal of their time to the city's affairs. He moved and the motion was carried that the matter be taken up and a report as to the amount of salaries be given.

Discuss Commission Government.

Moon moved and the motion was carried, that the council meet in session with the citizens on Thursday evening of this week to give the people a chance to say whether or not they want to vote upon the matter of the adoption of a commission form of government at the April election.

Garrett called attention to the fact that there is over \$300 due the water department from users of water and instructions were given the water superintendent to shut off the water, where there is no payment, after due notice has been given.

Money From Gas Company.

The Oregon Power Company tendered a check for \$71.30, representing one-half of one per cent of the company's gross earnings on the gas plant for the year 1910, the total being \$14,257.41. This is according to the franchise. The check was officially received and turned over to the general fund.

The bill for the costs in the suit of Oscar Milligan vs. the city was allowed. It amounted to \$160.95.

Sever Inspector Zell made a short report in which he stated that much plumbing in the city was not up to the standard that everything possible is being done to remedy conditions.

The meeting adjourned till Monday evening, January 23.

EATON TELLS HOW POLITICAL GAME IS PLAYED

Says That Fulton, Bourne, Et Al., Organized the House

State Capitol, Salem, Or., Jan. 16.—Senator Bourne, ex-Senator Fulton and W. S. U'Ren were severely arraigned by Representative Eaton, of Lane, in a speech in the House of Representatives today for their participation in the organization of the present Legislature. Eaton's address, which was in some particulars sensational, was delivered as a valdictory, following the unsuccessful attempt of the Lane county man and his associates to wrest from Speaker Rusk the appointment of the House standing committees.

Mr. Eaton concluded his remarks by announcing that he proposed to cut away from Oregon modern-day politics as the game is played and "step upon a platform" of decency, consistency and honesty.

"The Legislature was not organized by its members," declared Mr. Eaton. "While I regret to say it, and also to admit that I at one time voted for him, the first card was played by Oregon's senior Senator, Jonathan Bourne. The next card was played by Charles W. Fulton, ex-United States Senator, while still another card in the game was played by that all-wise, far-seeing statesman and law-giver, W. S. U'Ren, who induced Representative Libby, against his personal convictions and sense of decency, to sign up with Thompson for the support of Rusk."

Deal With Fulton Told.

"Mr. Fulton came to the members of the Lane county delegation and told them that the Thompson forces would consent to the election of myself as Speaker of the two Senators from that county would support Bowerman for president of the Senate. But there was nothing doing. I refused to consent for the reason that I had from the beginning wanted Selling elected president of the Senate."

"The next proposition, while it did not become directly from Mr. Fulton, was undoubtedly inspired by him, and was that if the Lane county Senators would support any other man than Selling, the election of my-

self as Speaker would be granted without any concession. Because of our royal support of Selling this also was turned down. The final proposition, in the attempt to defeat Selling, was that if either Senators Calkins or Bean, of Lane, would accept the office, they would be elected president and I would also be elected Speaker of the House. But we rejected all these overtures.

"The last card, however, in this organization fight was played only a few days ago, when I was given to understand that if I persisted in my fight the University of Oregon would offer for it. The same threat was made to the Representative from the country in which the State Agricultural College is located. If it has become necessary for me to compromise myself in order to avoid this threat, then these institutions will have to get what they can. They surely can go before the Legislature on their merits and if they are not so treated, those members of the House responsible therefore will have to assume the responsibility."

Loyalty to Rusk Affirmed.

"At the beginning of this campaign I became a candidate for Speaker, believing that a member of the House could be elected to that office without making promises. I found out. But I wish at this time to reaffirm my loyalty to Jerry Rusk as our Speaker and to assure the members of the House that I have no desire further to carry this fight."

"I do want to say that I do not think it is right that the Speaker who represents the choice of a majority of the members, surrender to one man, who represents nine votes, one of the prerogatives belonging to the Speaker."

"The Speaker himself is not directly to be blamed for this deal. He conducted a clean campaign. The man who negotiated the deal and bargained away to committee appointments was Senator Fulton of Multnomah. As evidence that a deal on these committees was made, I will at this time forecast a number of the chairmanships as they will be announced. Mahoney will be chairman of banking, Brooke of judiciary, Fouts of revision of laws, Hollis of insurance, McKinney of irrigation, Bryant of railroads and Abbott of ways and means. Libby was to get chairmanship of roads and highways, but a change has been made in that committee. Clyde, while scheduled for head of the committee on education, will also be replaced."

McKinney was the first to reply to Eaton's remarks. The Baker county man resented the charge of Eaton that any attempt had been made to use the University of Oregon as a club to influence the position of Eaton or any other member as to their position on any matter coming before the Legislature. He said that merit alone, and not personal grudges, would always determine the

consideration these institutions will receive in the Legislature.

Fouts sarcastically answered Eaton's charges as to himself by saying he had observed hovering about the Lane county man a "halo of purity, virtue and decency," and directly charged that Eaton's tactics in conducting his campaign for the Speakership were not beyond criticism. Proceeding, Fouts declared that early in the campaign Eaton solicited his support and while Eaton made no specific promises, assured Fouts that he (Eaton) would have need for such "lawyers of ability" on his committee. Fouts said the reason he had refused to support Eaton was because he and his "progressive Republican colleagues" did not regard Eaton as such a man as could be trusted with the appointment of important committees, such as that on revision of laws. Fouts emphatically denied that any trade had been made and said he did not know what committee places he was to receive until after the Speakership contest had been determined.

Thompson warmly resented Eaton's charge that the men associated with Thompson in the Speakership fight were of the kind that could be delivered or traded by any one man or a score of men. He accused Eaton of connivance in his candidacy for the Speakership.
