RAILROAD MAN SAYS

SPRINGFIELD WILL BE RAILROAD CENTRE

Superintendent Fields Tells Hotel Man That City Best Place to Invest

Springfield, Jan. 28.—The rumor of Springfield's car shop and railroad prominence cannot be downed in spite of the denials of the railroad officials. A Portland hotel man, an intimate friend of Superintendent Fields, went to the railroad man and frankly asked him which he considered the best location for a hotel in Oregon. Without hesitation, according to the hotel man's story, Fields advised him to go to Springfield. Without remembering the exact words of the railroad man he was given to understand that Springfield would not only have the terminal yards and shops, but would likely be 20 months or two years before these things would materialize, yet if the man really desired to get in on the ground floor, by all means go to Springfield. This, he said, was the best suggestion he had to offer among the towns in his division.

The hotel man, whose name cannot be used, related the incident without knowledge that he was speaking for publication, and had no intention of exaggerating. He declared his intention of returning to Springfield, and is in Portland now, making final arrangements. He was formerly an employee of the Southern Pacific company under Superintendent Fields.

TURBINE GENERATORS ARE INSTALLED

Springfield, Jan. 28.—Two new 50-horsepower steam turbine electric generators have just been installed in the Springfield power plant, to be used as exciters for the big turbine generators. They are the smallest steam turbines in the state, being of a very recent pattern and are the type of machinery that is being installed in this power plant. They run at a speed of 3600 revolutions a minute, which is 60 a second, and there is almost no vibration. One of them was connected up and cut in today. The other will not be needed until the new generator is installed.

BIG TIMBER SAWED FOR PULLMAN CARS

Springfield, Jan. 28.—One of the longest timber orders ever turned out of an Oregon saw mill, was shipped from the Booth-Kelly mill yesterday, consisting of several 72-foot timbers, 6x10 inches, which were shipped to Oakland, California, where they will be used as car sills by the Pullman Car Company. Seventy-two feet is the length of the larger cars, and these run the entire length. They have to be picked from flawless timber. In order to select this shipment, several additional pieces were cut, and only the best ones selected.
