F. J. Berger Said to Be Choice of Administration—S. H. Friendly Mentioned

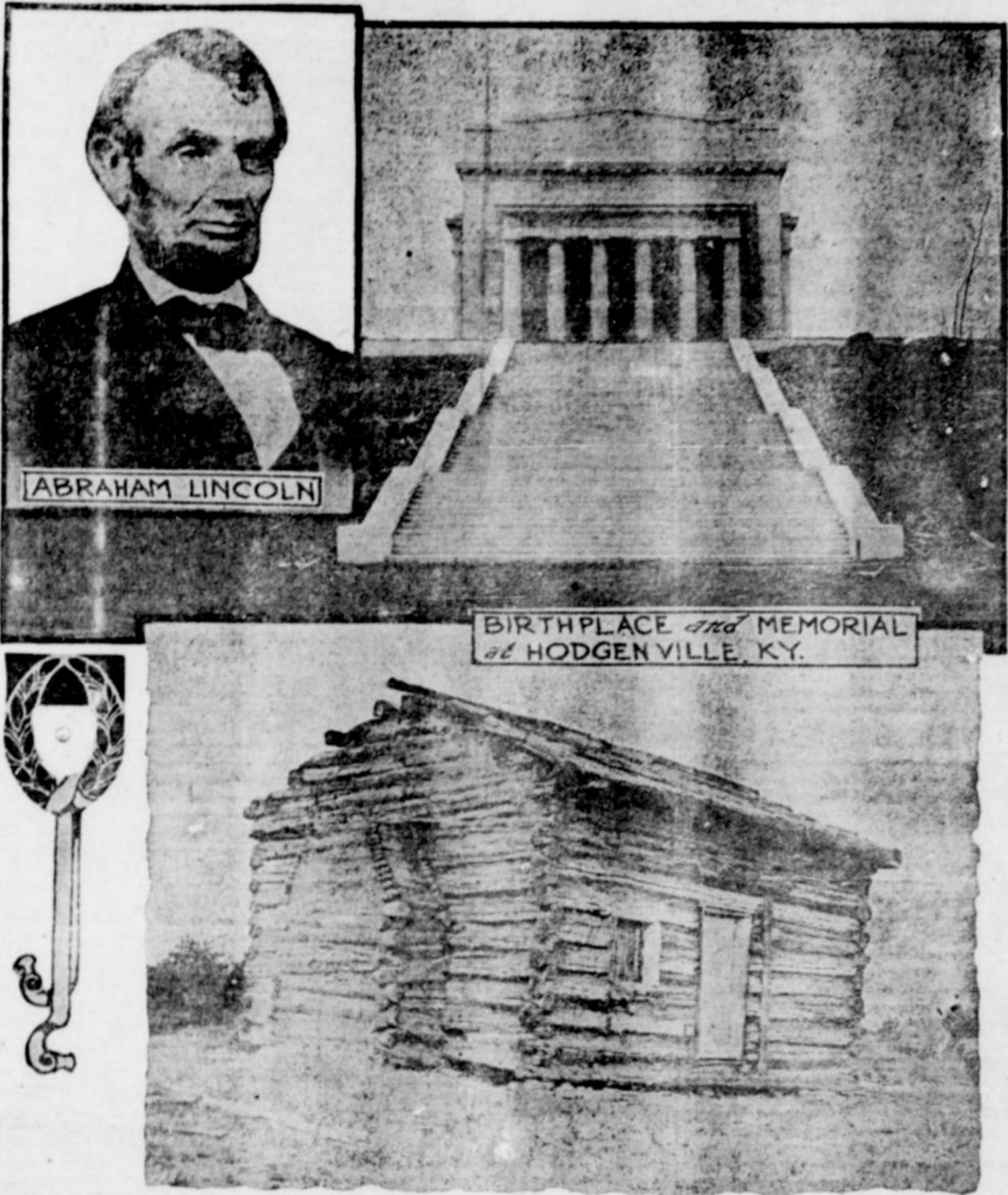
Who will be candidate for mayor at the April election is a paramount question in the minds of the people just now and aside from the commission charter and high taxes, that is one of the most talked of topics.
