TRAGEDY ON ROSEBURG STREET SHOCKED HOMEWARD-BOUND PEOPLE LATE LAST NIGHT

Roseburg, Or., March 14.—As the culmination of long-standing ill feeling over the affections of a woman, Roy McCullen, formerly in the hotel business here for many years, late last night in this city shot and killed Ben Mahan, a local plumber.

The shocking tragedy occurred on the principal business street and was witnessed by scores of people homeward bound from the theatre, where McCullen took Lillian Speicher, a divorcee, formerly a bookkeeper for Mahan, to whom the latter was once engaged. McCullen shot Mahan three times with a 25-calibre automatic Derringer. The first and second bullets made inconsequential wounds, but the third entered Mahan's back and pierced the region of the heart. Death occurred fifteen minutes later.

When the show was over McCullen and the woman separated and Mahan followed McCullen down the street. McCullen says Mahan threatened him and moved as if to draw a gun. McCullen then opened fire and Mahan staggered into the street and then back on the walk and fell, unconscious. He did not revive.

A revolver was found in Mahan's hip pocket undischarged, but it had a cartridge in the breech.

McCullen had complained to the prosecuting attorney a few days ago that Mahan threatened his life, and he was advised to let the woman alone.

McCullen is a member of a pioneer family of southern Oregon, a brother of former Sheriff H. T. McCullen, and was estranged from his wife and twelve-year-old son, who live in Portland.

Mahan was divorced. His sister, Mrs. F. B. Meord, wife of a Portland automobile dealer, arrived this morning and the inquest has just begun.

TWO LABORERS ARE KILLED BY SLIDE AT QUARRY

Adolph Nelson and Eli Brodvich
Meet Death and Third Man
Badly Injured

Telephone messages from the Hale station on the Siuslaw line, relayed from Acme, last night brought the news of the killing of Adolph Nelson and Eli Brodvich, laborers in the quarry above Acme, and the narrow escape of the remainder of the quarry crew Sunday. The members of the crew were working on the cliff when a sudden slide occurred, burying Nelson, Eli Brodvich and Chas. Brod, the last named being badly hurt, but it is thought he will recover from his injuries.

This quarry is being worked to secure rock for the jetty at the mouth of the Siuslaw river. It is loaded on scows and floated down to the river to its mouth.

Eli Brodvich had a wife and two children in Hungary, and he was saving up money enough to send for them soon. It is said that he had nearly the required amount, when the accident ended all.

OREGON ELECTRIC GETS SALEM FRANCHISE

Salem, Or., March 14.—"Speaking for myself, I desire to say that I look upon this franchise as a most fair and equitable measure, and I shall take great pleasure in signing this ordinance at once." With these ringing words, Mayor Lachmund gave his approval to the Oregon Electric franchise which passed the council last evening. Alderman Manning casting the only dissenting vote.

McMahon said there was no excuse for granting a franchise on Front street, because it is a residence street, and a freight road would prove a constant menace to the children of the residents.

The granting of the franchise means that several thousand men will very soon be at work in and near Salem, constructing the bridge and terminals in the city, and extending the road south towards Albany and Eugene. It is said that at least 4000 men will be put to work.

TWO MEN AND A WOMAN DEAD IN SAN FRANCISCO ROW

San Francisco, March 14.—A love tragedy in the underworld resulted in the quick death of two men and a woman early today. R. R. Mastyn, first-class gun pointer of the cruiser California, shot and killed Bessie Cook, a dance hall singer, and Hugo Randall, night clerk of the hotel where the girl lived. Then he put a bullet into his own brain. All died almost instantly.

Mastyn was in love with the girl and arrived unexpectedly at the hotel at an early hour this morning. A quarrel followed, the sailor finally shooting the girl. The hotel clerk, Randall, rushed to the room to inquire as to the trouble and was himself shot down. Mastyn came from Washington, D. C.

JOHN BAKER'S BODY FOUND IN RIVER THIS MORNING

After Search of 24 Days, Keopp
and Bushnell Are
Successful

After having been in the water 24 days, the body of John Baker, the youth who was drowned in the Willamette river near the Roseman place two miles below the city three weeks ago last Saturday, was found this morning between 9 and 10 o'clock by Will Bushnell and Albert Keopp, after almost a constant search.

The body, which was partially decomposed on account of the length of time which it had been in the water, was found several feet below the surface of the water in an eddy near a riffle in the vicinity of the old Bushnell ferry, which is about two miles below where the drowning occurred and four miles below the city. It was brought to the surface and W. T. Gordon, the undertaker, was notified. He brought the body to town and it is now at his undertaking chapel. Mr. Gordon, who is county coroner, deems it unnecessary to hold an inquest, as it is an established fact that he met death by accidental drowning.

Ever since the drowning a continual search for the body has been kept up. Hugh Brady, the professional diver from Portland, was sent for soon after the accident, but he was unable to locate the remains. Albert Keopp, who accompanied this young Baker at the time of the drowning, and Will Bushnell have spent days on the river and at last were rewarded. They had looked into this eddy several times before, but the body was not there. It evidently had caught on something beneath a pile of drift wood in a deep hole and finally became loose and floated to this spot only a short time before it was found.

The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Oregon chapel with interment in the I. O. G. O. cemetery.

JUNCTION HIGH WILL HAVE TRACK TEAM

The Junction City high school boys have decided to take up track work this morning instead of baseball as the prospects for a baseball team were rather limited and field work furnishes a greater variety of events.

The boys are taking a great interest in the work and it is bound to be a success as we have some very good material in our high school. The first training began last Tuesday when a half dozen boys took a two mile and a half cross-country run and from now on there will be steady training. A track, pole-vaulting, standing, hurdles, etc., will be arranged as soon as possible. As yet the boys have not decided whether they will enter a high school league or not, but at present the plans are to have a local meet during commencement week. The faculty have offered a medal to the one scoring the highest number of points.—Times.

SPRINGFIELD CITY COUNCIL ALLOWS PETITION

Final Decision on Street Paving
Made Last Night—P., E. &
E. May Extend

Fred Waters, representative of the Universal Construction company, which handles the El Oso pavement, was in the city this forenoon on his way to Portland from Springfield, where the city council last night accepted the petition of the property owners for paving Main street. Mr. Waters will at once confer with the officials of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company in Portland in regard to the company's extending its tracks up Main street as far as Seventh, the proposed end of the paving district, and if the company will do so, the burden of paving for the pavement on the street will be materially lightened for the property owners. Mr. Waters thinks the company will surely extend its line that far this summer, and probably further.

The matter of paving was referred to the street committee and the city engineer. The latter will make the plans and specifications for the work and secure from them an estimate of the cost of the work. The company will also make estimates from these plans on which to base its bid. The matter will then be ready for contract. It will be several weeks yet before the work can start.

LAW AGAINST KILLING CHINESE PHEASANTS FOR TWO YEARS

Restriction Placed on Hunters
to Allow the Birds to
Increase

Salem, Or., March 13.—Aside from a law protecting China pheasants for two years, no important changes in the game laws of general interest to sportsmen were enacted by the twenty-sixth legislative session. This is due largely to the fact that Governor West vetoed the great majority of bills having in view the enactment of changes in the present game laws. Therefore, hunters and sportsmen will have little difficulty in adjusting themselves to new conditions.

The greatest changes affecting game relate rather to the administration of the laws for the protection and propagation of fish and game than to the game laws proper. These were the law creating a new state fish and game commission to have complete control of the protection and propagation of fish and game and the law authorizing the commission to set aside by special proclamation wild bird and game refuges.

Owing to the fact that this newly created fish and game commission will come into being at the end of the 90 days period after the adjournment of the legislature Governor West thought it proper that as small a number of changes in the game laws should be allowed as was necessary to meet conditions and permit the fish and game commission to recommend to the next session what changes in the present game laws it feels is necessary to be made.

As set forth China pheasants will be protected for two full years. It will be unlawful to take or kill China pheasants in this state except for breeding purposes or propagation until October 15, 1912. After that date the present open season beginning October 15 and lasting until November 15 will again be established. Unless the next legislature makes some provision there will after that date be a limit to the sex or number of pheasants that may be taken or killed. As at present, the possession of the carcass, the feathers or any portion of a dead China pheasant is deemed a violation of the law and prima facie evidence is guilt.

The brick work on the tall office building and substation has reached the second story and the front portion is complete. It makes a very pretty building for Main street. The walls loom up to a height of 54 feet.

TWO GOOD REALTY DEALS JUST MADE IN SPRINGFIELD

E. Wells Buys Ten Acres from
N. A. Rowe and Sells Main
Street Property

Springfield, March 13.—Two important real estate deals took place here Saturday. N. A. Rowe sold 10 acres of land two miles from Springfield to E. Wells, a shoemaker, for \$3500. This price of \$3500 an acre approaches a record breaker for this section of the country. The land however is under cultivation and on a county road. The other sale was that of the sale of 17 feet of Main street property by Mr. Wells to Bud McPherson for \$1700. This sale is a high price for Main street frontage. The property is that on which the Wells shoe shop is located, across from the Sutton block, on Fifth street. Mr. Wells will give up his shoe-making business and begin farming. Mr. Rowe on the other hand will leave the farm and open a business office in Springfield. He has rented the old Rivett building on Fifth street.

PROPOSED LEVY CONSTITUTIONAL ACCORDING TO DECISION OF SUPREME COURT TODAY

Washington, March 13.—The corporation tax provisions of the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill were sustained today as constitutional by the supreme court of the United States. The court was unanimous in its decision.

The law was held not applicable to the Minneapolis syndicate, a real estate concern, on the ground that it is not "doing business" within the meaning of the law. Justice Day first announced that it was within the power of the senate to insert the corporation tax provisions in the tariff law, which originated in the house, and of which the tax provisions are a part. He said the court held that the tax was an excess tax on the doing of business, which is exactly the basis on which the government has defended the law.

Justice Day seemed to hold that the tax provisions were not the arbitrary exercise of a power. This had been urged in the argument as one reason why the law should be held unconstitutional.

WILL BRING MILLIONS

Thereby a source of income of approximately \$25,000,000 annually was assured the government. Of all the objections to the tax raised by the suits in all parts of the country, none of them were found sufficient to nullify the law. The court did not hold the tax not applicable to the real estate trust, of Boston, which is organized not under any statute, but under the common law.

TWELVE THOUSAND GOOD VENTILATION REBELS FIGHTING IN MEXICO

Statement Issued by Leader of Principal Hug Begins Scientific
Junta in This
Country

New York, March 14.—Dr. Francisco Gomez, leader of the Washington Junta of the insurrectionists of Mexico, delivered a general defiance of the Mexican government this afternoon, just before he departed for Washington. Gomez said the revolution against unsanitary ventilation conditions would not lay down their arms until their demands were granted, and that insurrectionists were not worried over the presence of United States troops in Texas. Continuing, he said:

"We, that is the insurrectionists, think the movement of troops is directed against Mexico, as well as to the smuggling of arms, and it is not purely directed against the insurrectionists. The government is now realizing the seriousness of the insurrection movement, and the whole country is thoroughly alarmed."

Gomez said there are 12,000 men under arms, fighting for the insurrection to cause, and that many Americans in high places would aid the insurrection with their resources.

GROTTJAN JURY OUT AND DISAGREEMENT SEEMS PROBABLE

Case Went to Jury at 11:15
This Forenoon—One Di-
vorce Granted

The jury in the case of the state vs. William Grotjan, accused of rape upon Mae Hills, went out this forenoon at 11:15 o'clock and at four o'clock this afternoon was still out indicating that a disagreement is probable. It is not learned how the jury stands, as no word has been sent from the jury room. Under the new law a three-fourths majority in civil cases may decide a case, but in a criminal case there must be a unity in a vote, as under the old statute.

One Divorce Granted.
Judge Harris today granted one divorce, Laura Bell Hebert being freed from L. W. Hebert, on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Eugene, April 18, 1904, and have no children. Mrs. Hebert is allowed to resume her maiden name, Laura Bell Dillon.

The case of L. M. Travis vs. Bert Lemon to recover money was continued.

HILLMAN WILL APPEAL FROM VERDICT

Seattle, March 11.—Clarence D. Hillman, the millionaire townsite promoter found guilty of using the mails to defraud, by a jury in the federal court yesterday afternoon on thirteen counts, will carry the case to the higher courts. In the meantime he is out on bail of \$100,000.

Study of Matter and Finds Conditions Poor

George Hug, the University graduate and athlete, now principal of the Eugene High school, where he recently used the woodpile cure for delinquency in students, has begun a campaign. In his school building against unsanitary ventilation conditions. Professor Hug secured the assistance of Professor Sweetser, of the University, who made exact measurements of the rooms in the High school building, amount of fresh air needed, the rapidity with which air circulated throughout the rooms and the figures which exact scientific instruments would measure. In spite of the fact that the system of ventilation in the High school building is supposed to be the best and most modern, serious deficiencies were found, and many changes will be made in the speed of the fan, the size of the outlets and inlets and other conditions.

Mr. Hug yesterday made an investigation of the temperature at which the teachers keep their rooms, and found that all but one were nearly 70 degrees or above, and even the teachers were complaining about the cold. Principal Hug at once ordered the windows opened and declared that he will keep every room in the building down to 65 degrees if the teachers and pupils are obliged to wear their wraps to get used to it. He is a strong believer in fresh air and declares that the temperature in his offices may drop to 55 degrees before he will complain.

A plan of Professor Hug to beautify the school grounds has been approved by the board of education, and a hedge of roses will be planted entirely around the building.

SEEK TO PREVENT PAYING CONTRACTOR

Washington, March 14.—Lee McClung, treasurer of the United States, was cited today by Justice Stafford in the district supreme court, to have cause on March 24th why he should be enjoined from paying Henry W. Paylor \$3,792.51, held by the government out of Hawley's contract to construct the Sunnyside reclamation channel in the state of Washington. It is alleged that Hawley abandoned the work and the reclamation bureau had to complete it.

ASK RELEASE OF AMERICAN CAPTIVES

Washington, March 14.—The state department today asked the Mexican government to release Blat and Cuatrecasas, Americans, held prisoners at Juarez, Mexico. The government of Mexico was told that the state department had information which showed the men were arrested on American soil.

TEACHER DROPS DEAD WHILE HEARING CLASS

Bellingham, March 14.—Professor J. H. Walters, principal of the Anacortes High school, dropped dead today while hearing a recitation. Walters was 28 years of age and came from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, a year ago. He was married six months ago.
