FOSTER'S FORECASTS.

Prof. Foster's last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from the 16th to the 20th, and the next, which was due in Japan about December 8th, will reach the Pacific coast near the Columbia river about the 20th, cross the western mountains by the close of the 21st, the Missouri valley and upper lakes the 23d, Ohio valley, east Gulf and lower lakes the 24th, Eastern states the 25th, and Newfoundland the 26th.

The path of this storm center will lie along the northern border of the United States causing unusually warm weather all over the country preceding and during the disturbance, only moderately cool weather following. Rainfall from this disturbance will be limited to small areas and excessive evaporation will cause drought in many parts of the country. Better rains may be expected from the next disturbance.

A warm wave will cross the western mountain country about the 20th, the great central valleys about the 23d, and the Eastern states about the 24th. A cool wave will cross the western mountains about the 23d the great central valleys about the 25th and the Eastern states about the 27th.

The forecasts of a dry November have been wonderfully verified, not more than half of the usual amount of rain having fallen during the past month. Rural Northwest: The experiments which were recently made in California seem to indicate that both the Perkins process and the Carbonic acid gas system are superior to the old method of refrigeration by ice in transporting fresh fruit. It is claimed for both of the new processes that they will prove cheaper than refrigeration and that fruit can be shipped after it is ripened and that it will reach its destination in such condition as to keep well. If we can send ripe fruit to the East safely it will bring about a great increase in the consumption of Coast fruit.

Roseburg Plainealer: Corporations, as well as republics, are ungrateful. And there are no exceptions to the rule. During the great A. R. U. strike last July all of the conductors and engineers on the S. P. lines in Oregon remained steadfast to the interests of the company, and their efforts, no doubt, aided the company greatly in winning the fight. Now the company announce a very material reduction in the wages of all employees, including engineers and conductors. It is quite likely that no serious objections will be made against the reduction, as the result of the A. R. U. strike caused so much dissatisfaction in labor circles that it will be impossible to ever again inaugurate a successful railroad strike. The railway corporations now have the master hand, and they stand no show of losing it, at least during the present generation.

The Ashland Record is to blame for the following item: Judge E. C. Bronaugh, the great jurist of Portland, was in court at Jackson ville this session. Judge Bronaugh is a very intellectual and respected

Christian citizen, who interprets the calamities befalling the people of late, as in line with the destruction of the earth and the second coming of Christ within the next seven years. He has contributed a number of very able and clear articles on that theme to current literature, and belongs to that sect in Portland. Judge Bronaugh is also very wealthy in this world's goods. At one of their meetings a poor devil in the denomination roasted the judge's unchristian like attitude in holding so much property while countless millions were starving. 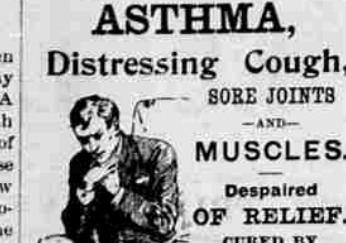
