BE JUST IN YOUR DEMANDS.

The editor of the Manufacturers' Record in an article relative to the many sufferers in western Nebraska, suggests that "the south should contribute a solid train load of corn," and says it should be sent to Nebraska for distribution. The suggestion is a good one, and the Globe hopes the south will sustain its well-established reputation for charity and generosity by contributing the corn, as suggested by the Manufacturers' Record. The Globe has a suggestion to make also to the effect that the Manufacturers' Record make some additions to its suggestion that the south send corn, and suggest that the woolen manufacturers of the east send a solid train load of manufactured woolen goods to Nebraska for distribution—that as a further suggestion it make a similar suggestion to the boot and shoe manufacturers to send a solid train load of the needy barefooted ones of the same state; that it add yet another to the meat packers to do likewise; and yet another to the coal combines for a solid train load of coal to cook the corn and warm the home, now so desolate. The corn may possibly help to feed but it will neither clothe the naked nor warm the freezing. Be just and reach out with your charitable suggestions.

Out of a total population in New York of 1,891,000, 70.46 per cent., or 1,333,000, live in 39,138 tenement houses. It is a somewhat remarkable fact that the lowest death rate in the city is in one of the most thickly settled tenement house districts, occupied by some of the poorest people, in the wards where the Jewish population is the densest. The death rate among the crowded Jews was in 1891 only 18.73 to each thousand, and in 1893 only 17.14. The comparatively clean habits of these Jews, their observance of the Mosaic law about food, and their abstinence from alcoholic liquors, are given in explanation of this low death rate. In the Italian districts the death rate is double what it is among the Jews, and the population not so dense; and even in the wards occupied by the wealthy people, the death rate is greater than among the Jews. The 4th, 14th and 8th are the Italian wards, and the death rate in 1893 was 33.78, and 31.98 respectively.

From the report of the railroad commissioners of Oregon we learn that the average ton mileage of roads in the United States is 551,232, and the average rate per ton per mile, 893 cents; on the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company's line in 1893 the ton mileage per mile of road was 283,455, less than one-half of the average of the United States, and the rate per ton per mile, 1,366 cents. On the Southern Pacific's lines in Oregon the ton mileage per mile of road for 1894 was 42,942, about one-sixth the volume of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company, and the rate per ton per mile, 2.40 cents. The difference between the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company's rate and that of the Southern Pacific is accounted for on the ground that the volume of traffic of the former is much larger, as above set forth, and much of it through busi-

ness, and the average haul per ton is 223 miles, while the average haul of the latter is but 93 miles.

United States District Attorney Knight, of San Francisco, has stated that upon the resumption of the cases against the strikers next week 50 per cent. and probably 75 per cent. of the cases would be dismissed, and the prosecution pushed only against the ring leaders.
