**POSTOFFICE REPORT.**  
Business Done During Quarter Ending December 31, 1894.  
The last quarter, from October 1 to Dec. 31, inclusive, has been one of prosperity for the Eugene postoffice, the receipts of sales and money orders exceeding by a considerable amount, those of any other equal period of time in the history of the office. At the solicitation of a GUARD reporter, the efficient postmaster, Thos. J. Craig, kindly furnished the following statistics which makes a favorable showing for the office:

**Silver Lake Fire Heroes.**  
The Lakeview Examiner says there were at least three heroes that went to their death to save the lives of others in the Silver Lake hall fire that killed 40 people:  
Clay Martin came out with T. J. Labrie's child in his arms, but seeing that his wife was not there, he started back. Several persons tried to keep him out, but he pushed in, with the child still in his arms, saying, "I am going to save 'Becky', his wife. He and the child were not seen again.  
Wood Hurst, familiarly known as "Senator" Hurst, who had recently been married, could not find his wife outside, and, notwithstanding the many entreaties to stay out, he went to save her. He was lost.  
Frank Ross did the same. His mother was inside and he wanted to save her.  
Without a doubt each one of these men blocked the narrow passage and prevented others from getting out.  
Mrs. Dr. Oswley and her sister, Mrs. Snelling, when last seen were kneeling side by side, praying fervently, as if they knew it was their last moment on earth. Others were seen to be running about, aimlessly dazed, and might have escaped had they not lost their presence of mind.  
**WAS OVER-CURIOUS.**—Sunday's Portland Sun: Duncan McDonald, formerly employed on the steamer Eugene, who is serving a sentence of 100 days for a murderous assault on a woman whom he professed to love, was yesterday arraigned before Justice Geisler on the charge of defacing a building. It is alleged that while in jail and acting as a trusty, he broke the lock of the door leading into the female cells at the county jail, with the intention of making an entrance. McDonald pleaded not guilty and asked that his examination be continued until Monday, which was granted.  
**TO ROSEBURG.**—B. T. Bryan and E. L. Fisher, both employees of the Palace laundry, will soon start in the same business for themselves at Roseburg. They are bright, honest and energetic young business men and understand their business thoroughly, and we can assure the people of Roseburg that they will have a laundry conducted on a business-like basis and one from which none but the best work will be turned out. Mr. Bryan is out there now and Mr. Fisher will leave in about three weeks.  
**DISCHARGED.**—John and George Allen appeared before Justice Wheeler this morning for trial, but after the evidence was all in they were discharged from custody. The affair appears to have been a general wrangle over the domestic infelicities of Boquet and his wife and the charge against the Allens in the main seems to have been pure fabrication.

**WE STILL HOLD THE MEDAL.**  
Lane County is in no Danger of Losing Her Gun-accident Medal.  
Gun, revolver and didn't-know-it-was-loaded accidents have been scarce for several months, and other counties have been slipping up on Lane county with the intention of taking away her medal as the banner gun-accident county in the state. But we have taken a fresh start again.  
This morning about 7:30 o'clock, while Ed Poll a student of the University of Oregon, was coming over from his home at Springfield, he met with a painful accident, the same happening when he was near Edwin Judd's residence, about one mile east of town.  
In his right coat pocket was a revolver, and as he was studying on the way down, his hand unconsciously found its way into the pocket where the revolver was. The "gun" was a double-action one, and, in an evil moment he pulled the trigger. Buried in thought on his lessons, this was an easy thing for him to do without being aware of his actions. Very few persons there are who, while in a deep study, will not toy with anything their hands come in contact with. His clothing was set on fire by the discharge also.  
He found his way to Mr. Judd's house and his burning clothing was extinguished and Dr. Paine was sent for to attend the injured boy. On arriving the doctor found that the ball had entered the right leg just below the groin and ranged downward toward the knee, where it lodged about 10 inches from where it entered. The ball was removed and the wound dressed carefully. It was a flesh wound the ball not coming in contact with the bone on its course down.  
With good care, this victim of his thoughts and a loaded revolver, will be, in a couple of weeks, limping along the road to recovery at a very fair gait. We venture to assert he will be more careful of what he "monkeys" with in the future.

**D. P. Thompson May Run.**

SALEM, Jan. 20.—The train which arrived from Portland tonight carried as passengers H. F. Gullikson, advance guard of the Dolph army, and a few senators and representative. Among the latter were Riekenon, of Clackamas, Baker, of Lane, and Patterson of Morrow. A majority of the members of the legislature who left the capital on Thursday and Friday will not return before tomorrow. Senator Dolph and followers are expected on the morning train.  
The venerable senator does not look upon his return to the senate as an assured fact, and it is said he and his army of supporters will not give up the task of canvassing for votes until the last moment. There is some talk tonight of the entrance of D. P. Thompson, of Portland, into the senatorial conflict as a dark horse.
