 NOT SO UNCOMMON.

At Quincy, Ill., a great mistake was recently made in an examination before the county court, which came near landing a sane man in the asylum. Dr. Hendrick sent his insane brother to that city for the purpose of having the court examine him as to his mental condition. After the jury was empaneled the sheriff went back to the front of the spectators after his victim of insanity, but not knowing the man, secured one Tom Nichols, a railroad engineer, and believing himself in possession of Hendrick, asked him to take the insane chair. All eyes were turned on Nichols, who thought he was being used in the case of Hendrick, as a witness, who was taking it all in as one of the spectators. The jury, thinking they had the right man, declared him insane, and the sheriff took him in custody and proceeded to lock him up. It was with great difficulty that Nichols made himself known to the sheriff and secured his release. That nine men out of every ten would be pronounced crazy, upon examination, is almost certain.

What a spectacle is that of a Eugene merchant hauling potatoes to Corvallis in winter on a wagon road that parallels the Southern Pacific railroad! The wagon will return loaded with freight. Is it any wonder that hard times exist when a railroad levies a toll that makes it possible for wagons to haul freight over our bad winter roads in profitable competition? Yet the legislature has wasted the entire session threshing senatorial straw, apparently never paying any attention to the gigantic monopoly that throttles the industries of Western Oregon, charging every possible cent that traffic will bear. Many of the members were elected on distinct pledges to abolish the railroad commission and enact a maximum freight and fare bill. How will they answer their constituents?

The movement to establish a national park at Appomattox, says the Globe-Democrat, is meeting with much favor in Virginia and elsewhere. It is virtually the place where the civil war ended, and there is no finer instance in military history of the meeting of two great generals who were also gentlemen, one to accept a final reverse in a manly spirit, the other to show equal nobility in securing the fruits of national victory without the slightest feeling of personal triumph.
