THEY HOLD THE FORT.

Railroad Commissioner Eddy says to the East Oregonian that the chances for the present members of the board are very bright and that little doubt remains that they will hold over until the next session of the legislature. The facts are that there has not been one official opinion on the subject, and only previous expressed opinions and precedents can be cited. The act under which the board was created contains the clause that the members shall hold office until their successors are elected and have qualified as provided in the act. The provisions of the act are that the legislature in joint session shall elect. In the report of the Oregon supreme court's opinion by Justice Bean, State ex rel Everding vs. Simon, are cited cases which are held by the commission to be parallel and in which decisions were rendered in favor of the holder-over officials. Only one unfavorable case has been dug up, and that by one of the candidates for appointment. It comes from Texas and was brought up by the death of an official after the regular election. In California and Indiana are parallels which seem to give the present railway commissioners title to the offices.

Mrs. Margret Hardy, of Moscow, charged with the murdering of her little adopted colored girl, some weeks since, was last week tried in the district court of Latah county, says the Lewiston feller. After the testimony was all in the jury retired and remained out all night, and next morning brought in a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree. We have not yet learned what sentence has been rendered by Judge Piper in this case, but understand that the least the law allows is ten years in the penitentiary, and the most life imprisonment.

The Dallas Chronicle: "In conversation with Governor Penneyer yesterday he expressed the opinion that if the free silver movement continues to grow for the next year as it has the past one, there will be two Oregon men who have been given considerable newspaper notoriety, who will have but little to say—Mr. Scott of the Oregonian and himself. The question is that time will be so thoroughly settled, that talk from the former will be useless, and from the latter unneeded."

The veteran actress, Mrs. D. P. Bowers, says there is really no such thing as a school of acting, though she has herself been teaching girls to act. "A great many New York girls are stage-struck, it seems to me," she said "and I have been paid \$5 an hour for lessons in coaching, but I would rather act all day and night than to teach girls to act.
