**THE SILETZ RESERVATION.**—New-  
port Record: As we are receiving  
dozens of letters asking about the  
Siletz Reservation, and how to get  
there, etc. We say that there is a  
good wagon road from Toledo to the  
Siletz agency, a distance of 7 miles.  
The principal body of vacant land lies  
down the river and may be reached by  
canoe or on foot or horseback. All  
land allotted to the Indians is now on  
record at the county clerk's office, so  
that parties may now be able to see  
just what is vacant, also what land  
the Indians own. The Indians are  
allowed to lease their farms for a term  
of five years. The vacant lands of  
which there are about 184,000 acres  
will be open for settlement noon July  
25, 1895. Under the homestead, rock  
and mineral laws every settler will  
have to pay the sum of 50 cents per  
acre at time of filing, and three years  
later at time of final proof he must pay  
a further sum of \$1.00 per acre.

**Hop Intelligence.**  
Puget Sound Mail: The year 1895  
will witness a great decrease in the  
acreage of hops and a consequent  
great reduction in the quantity raised.  
This diminution of hop acreage will  
not be confined to any particular sec-  
tion of the country, but is universal.  
It will effect equally the hop regions  
in New York and the Pacific coast  
states of Oregon, Washington and Cal-  
ifornia. The latest reports from all  
these states is to the effect that field  
after field formerly devoted, exclusiv-  
ely to hop raising are being plowed up.  
The reason is obvious. The present  
market price of hops will not even pay  
the expense incurred in producing  
them for the market, let alone a fair  
return for the money invested and la-  
bor expended. Judge Powers, one of  
the leading hop growers in the vicinity  
of LaConner and a good authority on  
matters pertaining to hop culture in-  
forms us that a large number of hop  
fields on the South Fork are being  
plowed up and a number of others  
will greatly reduce their acreage, so  
that it is safe to presume that the  
hop crop of 1895 of Skagit county,  
and we might add for Western Wash-  
ington, as the same condition of  
things prevail in Payallup, White and  
Green river valleys as in this county,  
will only be about 50 per cent of the  
usual yield. The outlook for a suc-  
cessful season in hop raising is decid-  
edly gloomy.
