The McKenzie Wagon Road.

BELKNAP SPRINGS, June 19, '95.
Although it has been but a short time since the commissioners' court of Lane county refused to grant the McKenzie & Salt Springs Wagon Road Company the right to collect further tolls on that important thoroughfare, which connects the eastern and western sections of the state, and the fact that it is a free road with free ferrage is only known locally to any considerable extent, travel over it has greatly augmented, and far exceeds that of any previous year.
This road, or rather the pass, is conceded by all who have the opportunity to make a comparison to be the best one across the Cascade range in the state. It is a direct and short route, there are no difficult grades, and travelers have the opportunity to procure feed for their stock as far east as Los' Creek, 64 miles from Eugene, leaving but a short day's drive across the mountains to a place where supplies may be procured.
With these facts in view no man can dispute the great importance of the McKenzie road, as a pure and simple business proposition, to the citizens of Lane county and the central town of Eugene. With a first class road trade with Crook county and other portions of Eastern Oregon, contiguous, will be stimulated, and travel, as is already the case to a considerable extent be diverted from the poorer Santiam toll road, paying their expenses and giving trade to citizens of Lane county.
But the road needs to be worked at the present time to secure the full benefits that may accrue. The road company cannot be expected to expend money on improvements for which they get no return, and as it is not a county road county funds or district work cannot be applied. The settlers on the upper McKenzie are few, and alone cannot take care of the road, so at present travel to a certain extent must work its way through. It is to be hoped the commissioners court will speedily settle the contention with the road company and lay it out as a county road from the summit boundary between Crook and Lane counties to the end of the county road on the west, so that organized work may be performed. Then with the aid of a small appropriation from the county the settlers may keep the road in good condition for travel.
In the meantime the citizens of Eugene should start a subscription paper, and furnish means to temporarily repair the road where needed. With a competent superintendent the cost would be small, while the accruing benefits would be large. From personal conversation with settlers along the road we are assured considerable work would be subscribed. Some one is needed to start the work. We feel satisfied the enterprising business men and public spirited citizens of Eugene will not neglect to take full advantage of the opportunity offered.

UNIVERSITY AFTERMATH.

Alumni Banquet.—Students' Ball.
The exercises of this year of the University of Oregon closed last evening with a grand banquet at the dormitory by the alumni and the students ball in Conser's hall.
The banquet was prepared under the direct supervision of Mrs S Munra, who is celebrated for her skill in providing the most dainty and attractive viands with which to satisfy the cravings of the inner man. The long tables extending lengthwise of the dining hall had a seating capacity of ninety persons. The tables were loaded down with all the good things which only Mrs Munra knows how to prepare, and were gaily decorated with bouquets of bright flowers. Everything was spotlessly clean and neat, and the alumni of the University of Oregon perhaps have never sat down to a more inviting repast than the one last night. One of the prettiest things which ornamented the table was the bill of fare which was so ingeniously arranged on a small fan as to make a most beautiful souvenir of the occasion. The fan was made from glazed paper, having six shutters. It was trimmed in the college colors, and on one side were the words: "University of Oregon, 1895," while on the other side was the bill of fare.
Arthur Veazie was toastmaster, and President Chapman, Herbert Condon, Roslyn McKinley, Judge R S Bean, of Salem, A C Spencer, C C Strong, J R Greenfield, Judge Geo H Williams of Portland and S H Friendly of Eugene, delivered toasts.
The grounds adjoining the university buildings and dormitory were gaily decorated with Chinese lanterns and made a very pretty sight.
The students' ball was well attended by about forty couples, and was a very pleasant social affair. The dances were continued until about one o'clock this morning. Refreshments were served at Pool's.
MUSICAL ALUMNI.
At the meeting of the musical alumni the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mrs R McMurphy; vice-president, Miss Carrie Hovey; secretary and treasurer, Miss Stella Dorris. Miss Dorris at this meeting was formally taken into the association.
