THE MCKENZIE WAGON ROAD.

Crook County Citizens Highly Pleased Over its Purchase by the Lane County Court.

D. W. Aldridge, the ex-newspaper man, who is now engaged in stock raising in Crook county, and who has been here buying supplies to take to his Eastern Oregon home, says the people of his section are highly pleased over the action taken by the Lane county court in purchasing Hendricks' ferry and the McKenzie toll road and making them free to the public. This gives us a free route directly across the mountains into Eastern Oregon and the people on the other side appreciate it very much, so Mr. Aldridge says, and many teams will be here during the summer months and September to buy supplies.

The Sautiam wagon road is yet a toll road and the owners of that road are greatly excited over the fact that the McKenzie route has been made free. They are unable to compete with Lane county in securing the traffic of Central Eastern Oregon and are advertising quite extensively in the Princeton and other Eastern Oregon papers to lure the trade over their route.

Mr. Aldridge states that the road from here to the upper McKenzie springs is in a fairly good condition, but that across the Cascade reserve and on the other side in many places it is very bad and needs repairing. To place it in good condition will require a great deal of work and outlay, as it has been allowed to go almost entirely without repairs in the past. It will be necessary to repair the old bridges.

Mr. Aldridge says the people of Crook county are very anxious for a good road across the McKenzie route and guarantees the assertion that they will assist in repairing the road. He thinks that if the two counties combine their efforts they may be able to secure an appropriation from the government for that part of the road extending across the Cascade reserve, inasmuch as that territory is owned by the government. This proposition will furnish something for our county court to think about and which they will no doubt lose no time in acting upon.

Right here it may be well to say that Lane county only a short time since completed the purchase of the McKenzie wagon road and has not yet had time to commence the work of repairing it. It is safe to say that as fast as her means will permit and the traffic of the road will warrant she will improve it, and the people of Crook county can rest assured that the people of Lane county will do all in their power to make a good road across the mountains into Eastern Oregon.

Union Meeting.

The regular bi-monthly union meeting of the Endeavor societies of Eugene will be held at the United Brethren church Sunday evening, July 14th, at 8 o'clock. This is the evening on which the consecration meeting of the international convention will be held at Boston, and it is desired that we have a large attendance as an especially interesting meeting is expected. At this meeting it will be announced whether or not the International Convention for '97 will come to Portland.

A CRAZY.

He was Found Wandering on the Streets this Morning.

An aimless and forlorn looking individual was run in by Constable Dan Linton this morning.

He gave his name as Adam Guise; is a tailor by trade; is of German descent; age, 40 to 45 years; eyes blue-gray; height, 5 feet 3 inches; weight, about 120 pounds; claims to be from Lucas county, Ohio; had two sisters living but has lost all track of them. He wears a soft black hat; black faded coat; no vest; black negligee shirt; dark gray pants with light stripe, and heavy lace shoes.

He was first seen on Ninth street, between Pearl and High, about 9 o'clock this morning, acting in a suspicious manner. Mr. Thos. Hardy saw him when he had a knife in one hand and a stick in the other. Shortly after Mr. Hardy met Constable Linton and notified him of the man's strange actions. The officer immediately repaired to the spot and met some little girls who said the unknown man had been following them with an open knife in his hands. He found the fellow crouching behind a tree and placed him under arrest. The man attempted no resistance but did not wish to give up his knife, which was a cheap pocket knife, none the better for usage. A search of his clothing revealed nothing but a few needles, a thimble and a tobacco pouch. In this pouch was another pouch; inside of that was a piece of cloth, and still inside of that was another cloth. On the interior of all these coverings, as if placed there for the best of care, was a small striped marble and a tiny light colored pebble. This and the knife the stranger seemed to prize very highly.

The man showed evident symptoms of insanity and this afternoon was given a hearing before Justice A. E. Wheeler, acting in place of County Judge Fisk, who is absent. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney J. M. Williams and medical examiners Dr. J. W. Harris and D. A. Paine, and adjudge insane. He will be taken to the asylum at Salem tomorrow morning by Constable Linton.

The man is simple in his actions and harmless looking, but if allowed to run at large might do damage. He uses language which would indicate that he had been well educated, but claims to have received but little schooling. He is an aimless wanderer with a diseased mind.

WELL-MERITED HONOR.—Salem Statesman: The dispatches from the great educational convention now in session in Denver, Col., show that this is one of the largest meetings of the kind ever held in the United States. The teachers of Oregon will be gratified to learn that Prof. E. B. Through his efforts, beginning in 1889, the educational interests of Oregon have become well known and her interests each year are represented and recognized in the councils and meetings of the N. E. A., the greatest permanent educational organization in the world. While not present at the meeting this year, being detained in Oregon by business interests, Prof. McElroy has been present at every session since and including 1886.
