In its last issue the American Wool and Cotton Reporter says: "Reports received from the leading markets of the country indicate that there is no reaction in the upward movement in the price of wool. Our semi-annual record of new mill construction for the first half of 1895, furnishes convincing evidence that the clouds of depression have been giving away and that a period of prosperity is developing in textile lines. Thirty-

eight new woolen mills have been established in the United States this year against 17 for the corresponding period of the last year of the McKinley tariff. The number of cotton mills has increased from forty-three last year to seventy-three this year. The number of knitting mills has increased over last year nearly 100 per cent. It will also be seen that the list of enlargements and improvements is an imposing one." Under free wool we see: 1. Better prices for domestic wool. 2. Improved condition of woolen manufactures in this country. 3. An increase in the number of woolen mills. 4. Steadier work, better wages and more persons employed in industry. 5. Cheaper and better clothing and blankets for the masses of people. The tariff on wool has been called the keystone of the Republican protective system. How unworthy must be the structure that depends upon such tax.
