Forest Fires.

A great many forest fires are raging at the present time in different parts of Oregon and Washington. Most of the conflagrations are caused by settlers firing their "slashes" which carry the flames into the heavily timbered country surrounding their farms, and soon the timber is all ablaze, spreading for miles around, and only exhausts itself when there is nothing more to feed upon. This is one of the deplorable facts which our government is to blame for, as settlers must clear their land by means of fire, the land laws making it an offense, for which a man is punished severely, if he cuts timber and sells it before he has a patent to the land. The best time a man can find to burn his "slashes" is when it is thoroughly dry, and as this is always the most dangerous time for the other forest, of course we will have forest fires more or less in heavily timbered countries like Oregon and Washington.

But Twelve Jurors.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—The district attorney has decided to try Theodore Durrant for murder with 12 jurors instead of securing 14, as at first contemplated. The managing and city editors of the Chronicle and Examiner were in court this morning to plead to the charge of contempt of court in publishing the views of sworn jurors in the case. Judge Murphy ignored their presence, however, and proceeded with the examination of jurors.

Another Pioneer Passes Away.

William Shields, the oldest man in Lane county, died at his home adjoining Cottage Grove, Sunday, and was buried Monday. Mr. Shields was born in Jefferson county, Tennessee, April 7, 1799, and at the time of his death was in his 97th year. He came to Oregon in August 1851, and to Lane county in 1852. Part of the town of Cottage Grove, or rather Lemath, is built on his original claim. The children surviving him are James P. Shields and Mrs. T. S. Lebow, of Cottage Grove, and Mrs. James Robinson, of Creswell. For a number of years past he has resided with his son James P. Shields.
