SILVER ON AN EQUALITY WITH GOLD.

The following letter appears in the New York Herald of August 6. To the editor of the Herald: The law of 1873, making gold the single standard of value in the United States, which was followed by similar laws in other nations, has caused a rise of 100 per cent in the commercial value of gold and a corresponding decline in the value of all other property, including silver.

Silver was the measure of value along with gold at 15 to 1 and 16 to 1 from 1792 to 1873, a period of eighty-one years. The present national debt, and nearly all state municipal, railroad and other debts in the United States were contracted under the silver standard although many have since been funded or changed in form, but are still drawing interest. By changing the standard from silver and gold to gold alone, a few thousand men, who own nearly all the gold and interest bearing bonds, stocks and mortgages, have doubled the value of their gold and of their credits, which are payable in gold, and have decreased the value of the property and earnings of their creditors one-half.

This has made the rich richer and the poor poorer. The single standard gold dollar is not an "honest dollar," but a dishonest dollar, invented by the few to enrich themselves at the expense of the many. To remedy this unhappy state of affairs, silver and gold the money of the constitution, should be again placed on an equal footing at a ratio of 16 to 1, just as they were during the first three-quarters of the present century.

This would make an unlimited demand for silver, not as a commodity, as now, but as money, which would speedily restore the commercial value to the money value, and make the United States, now the greatest silver-producing nation, the greatest nation in the world for wealth and commerce.

The United States must not wait for international bimetalism, but must lead the way to financial as well as commercial greatness. A protective tariff and silver on an equality with gold will make the United States the greatest financial and commercial power in the world.
