The average Oregonian is happy now, as the mists are prevailing.

Eugene is the best lighted city in the state and its taxes are the lowest.

The "Bean King" is dead, but Boston baked beans will still be in the market.

The football enthusiasts are now speculating on the outcome of the Portland game.

It is rumored in political circles that the Oregonian will not fight Senator Mitchell for re-election. Can this be possible.

The last term of circuit court in Lane county was an inexpensive one. Criminal cases have been scarce here for the past two or three years.

The latest intelligence from New York is that the hop-raisers generally are ruined. Many fields were unharvested, and many others were plowed up. Mortgages will be foreclosed, and hundreds will go out of business.

The American apples now in European markets are Baldwins, Greenings, Kings, Northern Spys and Ben Davis; also a few carloads of Pippins from Virginia. The highest grades of these apples are selling in London and Paris for \$3 to \$6 a barrel.

Rev Grannis, a Salem minister, makes the statement, "that 999 out of 1,000 are born of lust, and that the marriage relation is little better than legalized licentiousness." Such a quack and sensationalist should be driven from the pulpit by his church. He is a disgrace to his high calling.

In my judgment, neither Kentucky nor Maryland went republican because of free silver, nor because of the the single gold standard; but because the common people of those states wanted an opportunity to punish the men who so basely betrayed them in the last congress. An occasional pruning is a most excellent thing for any great party. The democratic party has had some experience in that line, and is better for it.

Elections are expensive, ordinarily, but more money was spent during the recent campaign in New York than in any similar canvass for local office. The reward which attended success at the polls is represented by the sum of \$132,500, the aggregate salaries for one year of the candidates on the county ticket. To secure this yearly return for periods ranging from three to fourteen years the different political organizations have expended \$225,000. Tammany heads the list of campaign spenders, because it found it necessary to raise an unusually large corruption fund. It gathered together \$95,000, which was distributed where it would do the most good. Tammany leaders realized that their fight was a desperate one. Experience in office has taught them that the pecuniary rewards are great enough to risk even the danger of spending a term in prison. For this reason they were audacious in their distribution of money for campaign purposes.

Charles Armstrong now has his horse shoeing machine in working order at Milton, and applied it in a practically way for the first time on Monday. This machine holds the rearing, plunging cayuse so tightly and firmly that it is impossible for him to hurt either himself or the man driving the nails. The animal operated on when an Eagle reporter was present was a bad one, but he was handled with neatness and dispatch. First he was led to the machine and the halter-strap tied to a post; then the adjustable sides were swung in, the wide canvas supports hooked up, and the animal raised clear off the floor by a windlass. While in this position the shoe was driven by the blacksmith. Then the animal was dropped to the floor again and released, and went off apparently satisfied with the treatment received. All danger to horse and workman is entirely obviated by this simple yet ingenious device.

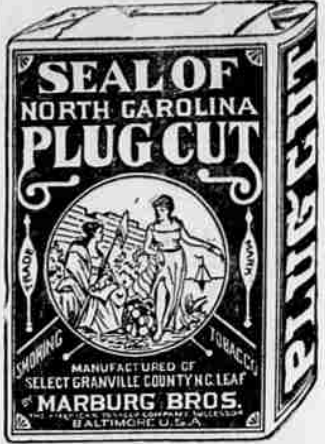
