WILL NOT BE TAKE OFF.

The Snagboat Will Work Between Harrisburg and Eugene at the First Favorable Opportunity.

The report that Major Post, of the corps of government engineers, would spend the winter in the East and would have the government snagboat tied up until spring, seems to be without foundation, at least so far as the snagboat is concerned. There is yet between \$7,000 and \$8,000 of the appropriation for the improvement of the upper Willamette river left, and, fearful lest there might be some truth in the report and we would be left without a boat to keep the river clear of snags and other obstructions during the boating season, some of our citizens wrote to Major Post to ascertain if there was any truth in the statement that the boat would be removed for the winter. The following reply has been received by Mayor Matlock:

U S ENGINEER OFFICE, PORTLAND,) OR., November 20, 1895. J D MATLOCK, Esq., Mayor of Eugene, Oregon: Dear Sir:—Your letter of the 19th inst. at hand. The removal of obstructions between Harrisburg and Eugene cannot be undertaken by the snagboat in the present stage of water in the Willamette river. This portion of the river will, however, receive attention at the first favorable opportunity.

VIOLATING THE LAW.

The Siuslaw Canneries are Still Running, Though the Season has been closed since Nov. 1st. Warrants Issued.

For some time it has been known by the officers in this city that the salmon canneries on the Siuslaw have been running in open violation of the law. No action has been taken by the deputy sheriff or the deputy fish warden, at that place, whose special duty it is to protect the fishing interests of the Siuslaw, and the deputy game warden until he could obtain sufficient evidence to warrant arrests being made.

This morning warrants were issued for the arrest of the manager of Rose Hill cannery, located on the south side of the Siuslaw river about two miles above Florence, and Wm Kyle, manager and part owner of the Florence cannery. The warrants were placed in the hands of Constable T D Linton to serve and he left for Florence on the Siuslaw stage this morning and expects to return here with the accused parties next Wednesday evening.

The officers claim they have sufficient evidence to convict the cannerymen of running in open violation of the law on the 9th inst. There is no doubt but that they have been running a greater portion of the time since the close of the open season, November 1, and if such can be proved the case against them will be a strong one.

Owing to the fisherman's strike during the open season, the canneries lost a run of two weeks or more in the most valuable part of the season, and therefore their profits were greatly diminished for the run, and in order to make up this deficiency is probably one cause which has led them to violate the law.

Inasmuch as the fishermen who have been catching salmon for the canneries since November 1, have also been violating the law, warrants will be issued for their arrest as soon as the case against the cannerymen is heard.

The Siuslaw strike, like other disturbances of its kind, resulted in accomplishing nothing for the fishermen, and proved a heavy loss to both themselves and the canneries, and to the community at large, and has cost Lane county a heavy bill of expenses, which promises to be even greater before the matter is settled.
