DOESN'T WANT OUR VOTES.

The Salem Statesman, Rep., has a correspondent in Washington that writes thusly:

"Thomas Brackett Reed, speaker of the house and candidate for president of the United States, is evidently not looking with a coquettish eye toward the votes the Pacific coast will have in the republican national convention. When the committees were announced a howl of indignation went up from the coast congressmen, the echoes of which will not die away for many months. Not a Pacific coast member can be found in the great committees on appropriations, ways and means, rules, banking and currency, coinage, weights and measures, military affairs, mines and mining or agriculture.

"The treatment of Mr. Hermann in particular has aroused great indignation. If rank counted for anything, if experience and service counted for anything he should have been appointed chairman of the committee on rivers and harbors. He has served on the committee six years and was the ranking republican member. He represents a state with hundreds of miles of seacoast, and many splendid rivers; his appointment was requested in writing by all the senators and congressmen from five Western states, and notwithstanding all this, Mr. Reed appointed over his head young Mr. Hooker of New York who is just beginning his second term and represents a district with one lake harbor in it.

"It is much to be feared that his presidential aspirations have spoiled Mr. Reed. But one important chairmanship has been given to the Pacific and adjoining states, while all three of his colleagues in Maine have been given important committees and the appointment of Mr. Hooker is a part of the price Mr. Reed has paid for the expected

chairmanship was because he was not appointed a handpicked, by the republic party of the state having virtually agreed to support Mr. McKinley. Under the circumstances there is no great wonder if a congressman was unsuccessful.

BLAINE ON HIS OWN DEFEAT.

Murat Halstead writes, in McClure's Magazine, the inner history of "The Defeat of Blaine for the Presidency," giving conversations and letters never before published. Among the new letters is the following, written in Mr. Blaine's own hand, a few days after his defeat, and reproduced in fac simile:

(Personal.)

DEAR MR. HALSTEAD:—I think there would be no harm to the public and no personal injustice if you would insert the three enclosed items in your editorial columns.

I feel quite serene over the result. As the Lord sent upon us an ass in the shape of a preacher, and a rainstorm, to lessen the vote

in New York, I am disposed to feel resigned to the dispensation of defeat, which flowed directly from these agencies.

In missing a great honor I escaped a great and oppressive responsibility. You know—perhaps better than anyone—how much I didn't want the nomination; but perhaps in view of things, I have not made a loss by the canvass. At least I try to think not. The other candidate would have fared hard in Maine, and would have been utterly broken in Ohio.
