IS FUSION PRACTICABLE?

The Times-Mountaineer, of The Dalles has this to say that is worthy of reproduction:

"It is announced that a move is on foot in Lane county to the effect a fusion between the Democrats and Populists. In the past such a combination would have been impossible, for the reason that the policies of the two parties were widely different, but the time now seems ripe for such a combine. There is nothing to prevent them affiliating with the Democrats in a demand for economical administration of public affairs and a reduction of taxation, both federal and state. On this issue the Democrats and Populists can join, and on financial questions there need be no dividing line. The rank and file of both parties is composed of the producing classes, therefore their interests are identical, and there is no reason why they should not combine their energies in an effort to wrest the reins of state government from professional politicians in whose hands they have fallen during late years.

"A reform in state government in Oregon is demanded by the people. The extravagance of the past two legislatures has increased the burdens of taxation until they are becoming unbearable, and the unbusinesslike methods of the sessions of 1891, 1893 and 1895 have convinced the people that they cannot hope for a more economical administration so long as the party that held sway in those bodies is retained in power. So long as the legislature of Oregon is dominated by a few Portland tricksters, nothing but extravagance can be expected, but those few leaders have such a firm hold upon the Republican party of this state, that the efforts of the really honest members of the party to shake them off will ever prove futile. There is but one way to relieve the state from the influence of this officialism that now exists; it is by a marshaling of the forces of the producing classes under one head, and in a combined effort to down bossism and inaugurate economical measures."

WOMEN'S RIGHTS IN INDIANA.

The legal rights of women are nowhere in the Union more liberal than in the state of Indiana. In the recent address of a lawyer before the Women's Club in Indianapolis these were thus formulated: "Since 1881 a married woman may hold real or personal property the same as if she was unmarried. She is now permitted to become surety or indorser for her husband, or any other person. She may carry on any trade or business, and perform any labor or service on her own account, and is entitled to her separate earnings. Her legal condition is one of comparative freedom and independence."

The Militant church of Chicago,

of which Dr. Rusk is the pastor, is preparing for war with Great Britain. On Sunday, after divine services was concluded, attention was turned to affairs military. The National Torpedo Defense Association was formed, and Major F. H. Lynn, who in 1883 was identified with the torpedo service of Great Britain, is at the head of the movement. It is designed to call a national convention of representatives from the cities exposed to coast attack and arrangements will be made for the instruction of recruits in torpedo work.

Judge Morrow, in the United States court at San Francisco, has decided that every person born in this country is a citizen of the United States. The question is one that long has been in controversy, and which is not settled by this decision, as the collector of the port will appeal to the United States supreme court. With the Indians and Chinese as citizens the politician has new material to work upon.

Cigarettes and Insanity.

Cigarettes have fairly earned the title of "coffin tacks," by virtue of their health destroying powers. It now seems, according to the statement of a well-known physician of the west, Dr Benjamin Blackford, that they may do even worse things than cause death. After a careful examination of a large number of patients at a lunatic asylum, and a thorough investigation into the family history of each case, it was found that the majority of the younger patients had been addicted to the use of cigarettes.
