NOT GUILTY.—Not guilty was the verdict returned by the jury last evening in the case of the state vs J B Hopkins, manager of the Eugene Lumber Company. The case was tried before Justice Wheeler at the court house, the company having been charged with dumping sawdust from their mill so that it was carried into the Willamette river by high water. A jury trial was had, the case being prosecuted by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney J M Williams and Attorney N E Markley. The defense was represented by Attorneys Dorris & Stevens. The jury was drawn as follows: F M Wilkins, Jas Barger, John Harris, J H Lamson, B C Dunn and A O Stevens. The jury was out but a few minutes when it returned a verdict of not guilty.
