GIRLS VALUE PURITY IN MEN.

A young man writes to Edward W. Bok inquiring why so many girls seem to prefer the company of young fellows of slightly blotted character—men who have seen the world—and in many cases marry them, in face of the fact that their past lives are known to them. In the January issue of The Ladies' Home Journal Mr. Bok, its editor, makes this reply: "Girls, that is, the right kind of girls, do not prefer the company of young men of this sort. Doubtless, you have come across instances where this rule has been otherwise; so have I. But it is all in seeming, and not in the reality. Depend upon one thing: girls have as high an estimate of purity in man as men have of purity in woman. There are, of course, cases to the contrary, but these are few. Where girls marry men who are known to have led what is called a 'worldly life,' it is more generally due to a misunderstanding of facts or to ignorance than people imagine. There is a type of girl who finds a peculiar satisfaction in the conquest of a man who has 'seen the world,' and then comes to her as the one woman of all her sex who can make him happy. This sometimes pleases her vanity and love of conquest, but she is not many years older before she discovers that she has satisfied those feelings at a very high cost. There is another type of girl who rather fancies a man who is what is called 'fast.' But that sort of a girl is painfully ignorant of what is meant by that word as applied to a man. If she was not she would be very apt to change the adjective to 'vulgar.' And as she matures she finds this out. It is only young men of upright lives who can hope to win the favor and love of girls of high motives, the girls who make the best wives. If, at times, girls seem to favor young men of another kind, the glamour is simply transitory. It is rare, very rare, that a girl's better instincts do not lead her to the higher grade of young men. An upright life never fails of reward, and of the highest reward, from the hand of woman."

Money For Defense.

The residents of Pine Valley, Baker county, have raised \$100 for the defense of Porter, who killed the Maches in that valley on New Year's day. From all that can be learned, it seems that Porter, who has always been a good reputation, has been for a long time terrorized by the Maches, who were neighbors. About five or six days before the tragedy they ran him into his home with a six shooter, whereupon Porter nailed up his fence and forbade them his premises. However, the three Maches came up to the fence, cut it down and drove through. The elder Maches started the altercation with Porter, when young Mache drew a 44 Colt's and fired three shots at Porter, thus missing his head. Then Porter went to his cabin, procured his Winchester, and shot young Mache dead. The elder Mache stepped behind the sleigh, in which Mrs. Mache was seated, when a ball from the rifle struck him, going through his heart. Another one struck the woman and she fell dead in the sleigh. Porter is about 45 years of age and looks like an inoffensive man. He claims the shooting of the woman was accidental and expresses regrets. No inquest was held. Some ladies prepared the body of the woman for burial, while the men were buried as they fell.
