

CLOSING SESSIONS

The Y M C A Finishes the Work of the Fifth Annual Conference.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON⁸ SESSION

After a song, the conference was held in prayer by Prof. Williams, of Albany, after which Prof. Howland submitted a blackboard review of the work for the past year. This review was a table of statistics giving all kinds of information concerning college Y M C A work in Oregon. The report of the eleven colleges which have associations in them shows that there are 1086 young men in these colleges of which 485 are professed Christians; 25 are active members of the Y M C A; the total membership being 531. There are 413 new students among them and 94 members have been added this year. Eighty are engaged in Bible study, have been converted through the efforts of the college Y M C A men, and the average attendance upon the gospel meetings have been 30. The Y M C A committees are in the field and \$121.50 have been raised by contributions. This report was followed by an interesting talk by Prof. Meyer, who brought out the meaning of the statistics of the past year.

At 3 o'clock D. C. Williams of New Mianville college took up the topic "Work for New Students." His remarks were along the line of work with the new men when they first enter college.

This paper was followed by a couple of songs by Rev and Mrs Leppert, of Yamhill.

Two papers were read upon the subject of "The Association College President" by A W Foshay of Albion college and Otis Taylor of Cornell college. This was followed by an interesting talk on "Impressions of Northfield," by Mr Dummitt.

Mr Michener next took the floor and after urging upon the delegates the importance of providing themselves with Y M C A literature for the proper and intelligent perusal of the work, announced that the necessary funds had been raised to have a training school, on the same plan as the Northfield conference, next spring at Cascades near San Francisco Bay, the expense of which would be comparatively light.

The subject of "A Spiritual Awakening" was discussed by Mr Michener in a very able manner, after which the convention adjourned for the afternoon.

EVENING SESSION.
Saturday evening's session was held in the M E church. Prof Howland of Albany college read a passage of scripture and Prof Hanley of Williamette University led in prayer. Miss Stella Dorris of this city favored the audience with a very pleasing solo.

The principal address of the evening was delivered by C. C. Michener, New York City, international secretary, on "The College Movement."

SUNDAY'S SESSIONS.
At 9 o'clock the convention assembled in the south parlor of the dormitory to hear the subject of "Bible Study for Personal Growth" discussed by Mr. Michener. A very interesting
