AT DIFFERENCES.

"The proposed big cannery in Salem when built will accentuate the necessity and value of good roads."—Statesman.

"Who is proposing any big cannery in Salem? The proposition of last fall is as dead as Julius Caesar's ghost."—Post.

Such differences as the above between newspapers can not result in any good to the town in which they are published.

There is a very sensitive lull in the discussion of the question of evolution in this city at present.

The fifth annual conference of the Y. M. C. A. of the colleges of Oregon, came to a close in this city last evening after a very interesting and successful session. Many delegates were in attendance and will go away well pleased with the result of the conference.

The Salem Statesman gives the Roseburg authorities a good hint in the following words: "They are talking of lynching a Roseburg scoundrel for the attempted assault of a young lady there. We would not be much surprised. In a community where a condemned murderer has twice been allowed to escape, people are liable to become desperate and do rash things."

The success which the upper river boats are having in reaching this city this winter is very encouraging, and is an indication that we may as well have river transportation during a greater portion of the year. The trouble heretofore has been in trying to run large boats. This could not be successfully done when at low stages of water there are many shallow riffles to be encountered. However, the companies who have the traffic of the upper valley towns in view are putting light draft boats into service which are able to overcome these difficulties, and with proper river improvement we may count on regular service in the future. The efforts which these companies are making to accommodate the wants of the people of this fertile section of the state are truly laudable, and no pains should be spared to give them all the encouragement possible.

The parlor and bar room warriors who abuse Great Britain as our greatest enemy, and are ready for a war, for some one else to fight, at any moment, have little idea of our trade relations. A few days ago the San Francisco Examiner, in its review of the year 1895, gave the figures of exports to Europe from that port as follows: Great Britain \$14,007,000. All other European countries \$85,000. We believe the same proposition will hold good at Columbia and Puget Sound ports. And that country admits our products free, while all the others follow the high protective system and shut us out with an almost prohibitory tariff. In our trade relations the Pacific Coast is certainly the worst used dog in the ring. The ships that carry our products abroad are forced by our tariff laws to come in ballast, mainly, and thus the producer must pay the cost of sailing the ships both ways, while he must pay tribute to a coterie of New England manufacturers of 50 to 100 per cent more than the same goods could be purchased for abroad. Yet the honest old granger, who for years has been led by the nose like an ass, and bewildered by the palaver of lemagogues, will sit on the fence and chirp about the beauties of high protection. In time the mortgage comes along and prevents him off the earth.

There is considerable earnest talk among democrats and populists in favor of fusion at the coming June election. It seems to be popular with both parties.

Europe has her war paint on. It would take but little to plunge her great powers into war. The jealousies and animosities of centuries are such that they are ready to fly at each other's throats on short warning.

Important School Decision.

An important decision was recently rendered by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Irwin, which is of special interest to rural school districts. In a letter to the superintendent of Lincoln county's schools he holds that a school district does not lose its organization by reason of its failure to have at least three months of school each school year, but simply loses its apportionment of state and county money.

Should a district fail to have school for a number of years, and then by private means raise funds and have the necessary three months of school the district would be entitled to its apportionment of state and county money thereafter. It would seem in the light of this decision that there is no way for a school district to lose its autonomy unless it be attached to some other district. A voluntary failure to elect officers, or to have the three months of school each year does not affect the organization.

Death of William Cox.

William Cox, aged about 60 years, died at his home in Crook county, Oregon, of pneumonia, Dec. 13, 1895. He was born in Lafayette county, Missouri, and crossed the plains in 1848. He was well known here in this valley at an early day. He was with the soldiers that went to the Rogue river in '55, during the Indian trouble there. For a few years he lived at Myrtle Creek, Oregon, and from there he went to Eastern Oregon where he has been engaged in the stock business. He never married. He leaves three brothers and two sisters to mourn his loss. They all live in Oregon.
