Wheat is rapidly advancing in price, and under a democratic administration.

Different localities in the United States are organizing bachelors' clubs. Eugene should fall in line, as ours is a club town.

The senate of the United States is mighty free with the people's money. A day or two ago it granted an increase in the pension to the widow of Colonel Frederick Dent, sister of President Grant, from \$30 to \$50 monthly; pensioned the widow of Major-General Doubleday at \$100 monthly; and pensioned the widow of General Carroll at 75 dollars monthly and the widow of Lieutenant Frederick Schwatka, the Arctic explorer, at \$30 monthly. The people have to work to pay such outrageous appropriations and they impose burdens upon the people which oppress them and deprive them of much they need.—East Oregonian.

Those pensions are all excessive, and not in keeping with the idea of the people in establishing a pension system. It is nothing but favoritism at the expense of the people. The poor widow whose husband lost his life fighting for the Union is given \$10 or \$15 a month, while the widow of one who held a higher position in time of war at a good salary, and died a natural death, is given \$50 to \$100 a month. Lieutenant Schwatka served in minor capacities in the military ranks for six years, from 1871 to 1878, and spent the balance of his time looking for the North Pole and drinking liquor, and passed to his death while on a spree. He never did his country any service in excess of the pay he received, and never impaired his health by exposure or in any fighting for his country, but his widow is remembered by our senators who draw on the public funds to bestow their charity. It is a rank abuse of public trust, and the senate seems ever ready to vote appropriations on short notice, but spends months wrangling over legislation which would benefit the general public, and then accomplishes nothing in that line.

The young man who has sought to blackmail the University of Oregon, and who would use the columns of the Oregonian through which to accomplish his purpose, is "spotted" by students of the university, and it is pretty certain that the remainder of his stay in this city will be quite unpleasant. Hazing has never been practiced in the University of Oregon, and the GUARD never expects to see it practiced here, but if such a thing was permissible, the young man in question would surely be a fit subject. But even now the finger of scorn is pointed at him, and he is openly ridiculed by those who were his fellow students, for his indiscreet and very foolish actions. This young man is not now a student of the university. As the Oregonian says, perhaps he would be an apt student for Stanford university. At any rate the sooner he gets himself away from Eugene the better it will be for his peace of mind. The statement that, in his so-called exposure of the university, he would be aided

and sympathized with by business men of Eugene is false in the extreme. The young man hasn't a half dozen friends in the city, and we do not believe there is a student of the university or a citizen of Eugene who would sympathize with him in his blackmailing scheme. The people of Eugene as well as the students are loyal to the institution of learning which is located in our city. Every student who has ever been within the portals of the university is loyal to it. No better evidence of this can be had than is exhibited in the mighty friendship which it has in its alumni. Each year they are spreading into different parts of the business and professional world, and wherever found are staunch friends of their alma mater, and will stand out against any false or malicious attacks which may be made upon its good name.
