byterian church at Brownsville is said
to be having splendid success in a

nine people have united with the
church as the result of his efforts,
while about 25 more are expected to
unite before the meetings close.

AT THE TANNERY.

New Scouring Machine, and Other
Improvements.

For the past few years the Eugene
tannery, under the management of W
W Haines, its proprietor, assisted by
his sons, has been gradually increas-
ing its business and branching out
into a wider field of labor. Mr Haines
is kept on the road a great deal of the
time, and now brings hides from one
end of Western Oregon to the other.
The tannery also uses a great deal of
wood and tan bark, which furnishes a
very lucrative business to a large
number of residents of Lane county,
principally those who reside in the
wooded and mountain districts. The
tannery also furnishes constant em-
ployment for several men.

Considerable improvements have
been made lately. Additions are now
being completed on the west and south
sides, increasing the building one-
third in size and making room for the
new machinery which has been proc-
ured, besides leaving ample work-
ing room. The new scouring
machine has been placed in the south
end of the building, while the leaches,
four in number, and the bark mill
have been placed in the new addition
on the west side. An elevator is being
built, near the east end, to the third
floor, and will be used in hoisting and
lowering the hides in bulk from one
floor to another. A new and large
water tank has been built and will be
placed on top of the building to hold a
water reserve to be used in case of
fire.

The scouring machine, which has
been on hands for several months, but
which was only placed in position and
set to work a day or two ago, is quite
a labor saving device. Heretofore the
process of scouring the hides has been
performed by hand, from three to five
men being required to turn out 200
sides per day, according to the condi-
tion of the hides, some requiring a
great deal more work than others. The
machine will turn out 200 sides per
day, and does excellent work. It will
not decrease the number of employees,
as the increase in business will furnish
work for all.

The inventory taken at the first of
this year showed \$4000 worth of hides
on hand, and the amount kept on
hand will range from this sum down
to \$1000. Mr Haines has put in \$1000
worth of improvements this winter.
The monthly output of the tannery is
now 600 sides of leather but that
amount will be increased to 750 sides
this spring.

THE LADIES BOWL.—This afternoon
at 1 o'clock about a dozen young la-
dies met at the bowling alley to en-
gage in practice of this healthful and
sportive game. They all claimed to
be novices at the business, but the way
they "floored" the pins would indicate
that they at least possessed the ability
with a little practice to make excellent
players. Four players were engaged
at a time, and the first game played
was Baltimore fives. At the finish
the score stood respectively 9, 10, 11
and 12. They seemed to enjoy the
game very much and it is quite prob-
able that this is only the beginning of
what will terminate in a ladies' popu-
lar bowling club.
