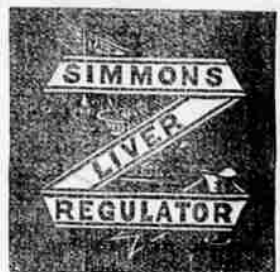

#### Among Friends.

Police Judge Campbell, of San Fran-  
cisco, and formerly a resident here,  
dropped in at the police station Fri-  
day night, says the Oregonian, having  
come north to attend the funeral of his  
mother last Wednesday. There was  
quite a foregathering in Chief Minto's  
office, and Judge Campbell entertained  
the crowd with an account of how  
they dish out justice in San Francisco.  
San Francisco, according to Judge  
Campbell, is a very, very wicked  
town. They have more cases in a day  
in the police court there than come up  
in the Portland municipal court in a  
month, the daily average being 30.  
This does not include simple drinks,  
of whom there are from 200 to 300 per  
day. "We don't arraign the drunks  
in court," said the judge, "they would  
flood us if we did. I make the rounds  
of the cells where they are confined  
and 'dish out' justice on the spot."  
Judge Campbell is a very popular man  
in 'Frisco, though he says it is a hard  
town to ride politically. The only  
thing that bothered him he admitted  
were the A. P. A's and Catholics, but  
as he is not a Catholic and does not  
belong to the A. P. A. he hopes to re-  
tain his friends on both sides. "They  
very nearly got me though," said the  
judge. "An A. P. A. had applied an  
obnoxious epithet to a Catholic, who  
knocked him down. Both men were  
arrested and brought up in my court,  
and there was the whole 'push' of  
both crowds in court to see what I  
was going to do. It was a pretty hard  
nut to crack, but I heard both stories  
and then fined each man \$10, and every-  
body was satisfied. You see," added  
the judge, that was justice, because  
both men were in fault," and for a  
moment there was silence in the  
chief's office while the San Francisco  
jurist combed his hair through his  
luxuriant whiskers.

#### THE WILLAMETTE.

##### On Another Rampage—Heavy Loss of Saw Logs.

The Willamette is on another rati-  
page. The stream is running bank  
full and in many places has begun to  
creep out over the bottoms.

The heavy downpour of Saturday  
night, which continued all day yester-  
day and a greater portion of last night  
without abatement has caused the  
river to rise very rapidly and this  
morning it had reached the 14-foot  
mark at this place. The weather  
turned suddenly warmer Saturday  
night and has remained that way  
since so that the rains extend far up  
into the mountains and doubtless  
some snow is being brought out,  
which helps to swell the flood.

Shortly before noon today the stream  
had reached the 15-foot mark on the  
gauge at the river bridge, but was  
rising more slowly. It had broken  
over the banks in several places and a  
number of small streams were pouring  
across the county road leading north  
from the bridge.

But very little drift wood was com-  
ing down the stream today. The rain  
has almost ceased to fall today and it  
is not likely that the river will go  
much higher.

The Fall Creek Improvement Com-  
pany, of which A. Wheeler is presi-  
dent, and J. B. Hills is manager, to-  
gether with the Eugene Mill & Lum-  
ber Company, have suffered a heavy  
loss because of the unexpected rise in  
the river. Saw logs commenced to  
pass down stream by this city about  
5 o'clock last evening and have been  
floating by all last night and all day  
today. The logs came from Fall  
Creek, fifteen miles up the Willamette  
from here, and no word has yet been  
received from there, so that it is not  
known just how serious the loss will  
prove to be. The logs were gotten out  
for the Eugene Mill & Lumber Com-  
pany and were yet in the hands of the  
Fall Creek Improvement Company.

Accordingly to an estimate made  
there are about 1,400,000 feet of logs  
along the banks and in the streams of  
the Fall Creek country. Of this  
amount it is thought that 200,000 feet  
had already been floated in the Big  
Fall Creek just below its junction  
with the little creek. These are be-  
lieved to be the logs that are now going  
down the river. They were held by a  
boom which has proven insecure  
against the angry waters of a rapidly  
rising stream. All the logs that go  
below this city will be lost, but all that  
lodge above the banks of the stream  
above here can be saved, as they can  
readily be floated down to the mill  
after the high water subsides. A large  
proportion of them, however, have  
been carried by and will be lost.

The loss will aggregate several  
hundred dollars. About two-fifths of  
the 200,000 feet of logs in the Fay  
boom had been sealed and the Eugene  
Company may have to lose these,  
while the loss of the balance will fall  
to the Fall Creek company. The  
boom could hardly have been adequate  
for the purpose, though logs have al-  
ways been considered safe in Fall  
Creek at the Fay boom after the first  
of March.

The water has been coming through  
the slough by McVeigh's point and  
has shut off travel between this city  
and Springfield by the river road.  
Travel between the two places today  
had to go by way of Henderson.

ANNUAL MEETING.—Tonight the  
common council of the city of Eugene  
will hold its annual meeting. At this  
time the mayor will read a report of  
the condition of the city's affairs and  
make the appointments of officers.  
E. R. Skipworth, H. J. Day, Robt. Pratt  
and Mr. Doyle have served respectively  
as city attorney, city marshal, night-  
watchman and street commissioner  
during the past year. They have all  
discharged their duties to the best of  
their ability and all are well qualified  
to fill the places which they hold. The  
GUARD sees no reason why they  
should not be re-appointed and be-  
lieves that the business men and citi-  
zens of Eugene in general desire them  
re-appointed.

OREGON STONE CHOSEN.—George W.  
Davis, of the Pioneer Stone Company,  
is in receipt of a telegram announcing  
that the stone of the Oregon Pioneer  
quarry, on Yaquina bay, has been se-  
lected to be used in the construction  
of the San Francisco Call building,  
says a Salem dispatch. There has  
been some effort in California to create  
a prejudice against Oregon building  
stone in favor of the California pro-  
duct, but Oregon continues to get  
some very desirable contracts. Be-  
sides the Call building, Oregon has  
furnished the stone for the ferry depot  
and the handsome Parrott building, in  
San Francisco.

#### APPREHENDED.

##### A Two-Year Old Boy a Would-be Assassin.

The sequel to the peculiar case of at-  
tempted poisoning of the Widow  
Smith and her family at Coburg has at  
last been found. The readers of the  
GUARD will remember the case which  
has been published heretofore. In all  
23 visits were made to the farm by the  
family persecutor and now it trans-  
pires that he is a twelve-year-old boy,  
Oral Poindexter, a stepson of Granville  
Poindexter, who lives on a farm ad-  
joining the Smith farm.

Since the recent visits were made to  
the Smith place by some unknown  
person who scattered poison about the  
premises members of the family have  
been keeping a sharp lookout for the  
would-be assassin, and S. O. Garrison, a  
neighbor, was appointed a special  
officer to keep a watch for and arrest  
the guilty party. On last Friday Mrs.  
Smith left the house, while one of the  
little girls remained there to keep  
watch. Soon after Mrs. Smith left,  
the little girl saw the boy, Oral  
Poindexter, approaching the house.  
He carried in his hands a small vial  
containing a liquid which he started  
to pour into the pump when the little  
girl knocked a tin pan off of the stove  
making a noise that frightened him  
away before he accomplished his pur-  
pose. Mr. Garrison was immediately  
notified and asked to arrest the boy,  
but he desired more evidence before  
arresting a boy so young.

On Saturday morning one of the  
little girls, Hilda Smith, aged 13  
years, went to the barn yard to place  
some eggs under a goose. While  
stooped over in a position to place the  
eggs she was struck a blow on top of  
the head from behind. She was ren-  
dered senseless by the blow and was  
carried into a chicken house about 30  
feet distant, where she was left and  
was afterwards found by some of the  
members of the family. Dr. Mackey  
of Harrisburg was sent for and rendered  
medical assistance to the little girl  
whose head is yet in a painful condi-  
tion from the effects of the blow. On  
the afternoon of the same day Oral  
Poindexter made three visits to the  
Smith house and posted threatening  
notes on the door each  
time. He was seen each  
visit by members of the family who  
were keeping a watchout.

Mr. Garrison was again notified and  
this morning arrested the boy at the  
home of Mr. Thompson, bringing him  
to this city this afternoon.

Oral Poindexter is a boy small of his  
age. He wept bitterly when ques-  
tioned in the justice's office this after-  
noon. His parents were in this city  
at the time of his arrest, having been  
here for several days to get medical  
treatment for Mrs. Poindexter. It is  
believed by many that he has been  
prompted to commit the acts and it is  
said that family troubles have existed  
between the Poindexters and the  
Smiths for some time.

The boy was placed under \$500  
bonds to await examination, as owing  
to the high stage of water it will be  
difficult to get witnesses here for a few  
days. He has not yet raised bonds.  
His mother and his step-father left  
town today at noon and do not know  
of his arrest.
