WITHDRAWALS AND COALITION.

The peoples party candidate for sheriff has withdrawn from the contest. He will loyally support Horace Hampton, the democratic nominee, and asks the peoples party to do the same. It is not unlikely that further withdrawals will take place from one party or the other before the middle of May, the limit of time when changes may be made on the ticket.

Mr. Veatch's reason for withdrawing is a common sense one. The republican party two years ago pledged itself in county and state to exercise strict economy and lop off useless expenditures. This it utterly failed to do and instead increased the burden of taxation. The pledges were like ropes of sand. This same party renews those broken pledges and again comes before the people asking for support. Will the people trust them with power again? They are in the minority, but to secure their defeat, the democratic and peoples party must unite so far as possible. Running separate tickets neither has a ghost of a show. Candidates should sink their personal ambitions and endeavor to labor for the best interests of the people. With three candidates for each office in the field, nominations except on the republican ticket are empty honors. It is not too late yet for effective work.

Winter is lingering in the lap of Spring with a vengeance. He should get off.

We won't hear much about tariff this campaign. The financial question is the live issue.

ER Skipworth, the democratic nominee for state senator, is in the fight to stay, notwithstanding any reports that may be circulated to the contrary. He stands squarely on the democratic platform, and if elected will vote for a free silver democrat for United States senator.

"If people would accept the plain Bible gospel truth, it would rightly settle every question before the American people today."—Rev. I. D. Driver in the church a few days ago. Why then don't the Reverend gentlemen stick to the text and proclaim the gospel with as least as much earnestness as he is haranguing the people to elect him to the state senate. Consistency is not one of Driver's virtues.

So far there are several candidates to be voted for in Lane county upon whom the democratic and peoples parties have joined forces in whole or in part. The peoples party candidates for prosecuting attorney and member of state board of equalization are endorsed by the democrats and will receive their support. The office of county treasurer has been left vacant, which is strongly in favor of Mr. Patterson the peoples party nominee. On the other hand the peoples party endorse John A. McMahan, democratic nominee for county judge, and their candidate for sheriff has withdrawn in favor of Mr. Hampton the democratic nominee.

R H McDonald, who wrecked two banks in San Francisco over two years ago, by his reckless use

of depositors money, has at last been discharged from jail and is a free man. Thousands of depositors lost their money, people in comfortable and affluent circumstances were bankrupted, happy homes were wrecked and untold misery resulted from the criminal misdeeds of this man.
