Skipworth is in the lead in the senatorial fight, and he will win easily on June 1st.

The A. P. A's are still fighting McKinley for the presidential nomination. It is stated that they will throw their support to Allison.

Sheriff Johnson figures his expenses rather high for his first year of office holding. It probably included his election expenses in 1894.

Vote for the men to represent you in the legislature that can do something for Lane county. Don't send drones to the next legislature.

John B. Beavenue is the democratic candidate for surveyor. He promises the taxpayers that the office will be run in a first-class manner if he is elected.

Driver has been charged by Hon. E. R. Skipworth with having been a lobbyist at the last session of the legislature, and it looks as if he could not successfully deny it.

The political address made yesterday at Springfield by Hon. E. R. Skipworth was universally praised by republicans, populists and democrats alike. He will be elected.

The gold clause in a promissory note and bond has been declared void by a Nebraska judge. The court held that a mortgage was payable in any lawful money of America.

The Oregonian the leading republican paper in the state, honestly says that all the high tariffs imaginable, will not raise the price of wheat, oats, barley, fruit or hops.

P. J. McPerson, for assessor, will receive a large vote from all parties. He is known by nearly every voter in Lane county, and thoroughly understands the value of all property.

How about that tax roll Sheriff Johnson? Was it really "a mass of errors," as you stated, or was it the only way you could defeat your opponent, W. T. Eakin. Come now, and answer this question like a man.

Steven Spencer is a native son of Lane county and is making a splendid fight for the clerkship. He will not have to depend on a highly paid deputy to manage the office when he takes possession of the office the first Monday in July. His competency has never been questioned.

The present system of tax gathering, especially in the spring of the year, works a severe hardship upon the taxpayer, and at such times, the farmers have but little or nothing to dispose of for cash, and he is compelled to borrow the money to pay his taxes, and a high rate of interest. If the law was changed so as to enable him to pay semi-annually, half immediately after harvest time or say, the first of November and the other half the first of April, it would enable him to make his tax payments easier, than now, in the spring, if the whole amount be extracted at once.

Prof J. P. Holland, the democratic nominee for school superintendent, will receive many votes from the opposition, as he is known to be peculiarly fitted for the position. At the present time he is principal of the Junction City public schools.

Baker now puts in the plea that he never denied being a member of the A. P. A organization. How about his card in the Broad-Axe saying he was not a member, and also his statement when addressing the silver club at Waltherville in which he made the statement that he "never was and is not now a member."

Salem Journal, Rep: "Moorhead's lying excuse that he fixed up the journal revision job at \$10 a day 'at the suggestion of Hofer,' will not go down. Mr. Hofer told Mr. Moorhead that he would not serve on a committee to revise the Journal at \$10 a day, that it was too much, and that the speaker was always made a member of the committee and two members from Marion county could not well get on a committee of three."

The following plank from the platform of the democracy of Oregon is in line with the sentiment expressed in that article of the Constitution which declares that "no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust in the United States." It reads as follows:

"Twelfth - Religious difference should find no place in American politics, and the democratic party is unalterably opposed to the spirit of intolerant bigotry fostered for political purposes by those who seek to breed discord and animosities among the citizens of the republic; secret political bodies are a curse to party, state and nation. We heartily welcome the assistance of all good citizens who will cooperate in the suppression of any political movement organized for religious proscription."

When a minister of the gospel forsakes his high calling and joins the political caravan, he seems to leave all that is noble and grand in the same in the rear. Rev. I. D. Driver in his speech at Fall Creek related a vulgar story that a newspaper would not dare to reprint, even if inclined so to do, on account of the United States laws that prohibit the circulation of obscene literature. A portion of the ladies present were so indignant that they immediately left the room with blushes of shame on their pure cheeks. Such a man should not receive a vote for the high position for which he is a candidate. His candidacy is a disgrace to the county and every one of its citizens—men, women and children. Then it should be remembered that the county has not only her own honor to maintain but also that of the University of Oregon.
