HOBART HAS MISGIVINGS.

Chicago Times-Herald: Men are sometimes timid and half-frightened in the face of great luck. BIMETALLIST CONVENTION.

Jacksonville Times: A number of those citizens of Jackson county who are in favor of bimetalism and the free coinage of silver met at Medford last Saturday afternoon. M. F. Eggleston of Ashland presided and Chas. E. Wolcott acted as secretary. Speeches were made by Gen. E. L. Applegate and others, and a resolution endorsing the bolt of Teller and others from the republican national convention and in favor of the candidacy of the Colorado senator for president was adopted. The following were elected as delegates to the state bimetallic convention which meets at McMinville on July 9th: S. Patterson, M. F. Parker, J. J. Houck, H. S. Evans, M. F. Eggleston, W. H. Bradshaw, J. B. Welch, C. E. Wolcott, I. W. Thomas, Frank Williams, E. E. Phipps and A. S. Jacobs. The following county central committee was appointed: M. F. Eggleston, J. J. Houck, N. A. Jacobs, H. S. Evans, J. B. Welch, W. N. Luckey, C. E. Wolcott.
