The spurs were shipped through the express company to St. Louis several years ago and were delivered to the wrong man, who melted them and sold the bullion. The origin of the spurs is what makes the sentimental value of them so great. It appears that in casting about for a fitting testimonial to the dashing cavalry leader the ladies found themselves too poor to present him with gold spurs, as was the intention, but they badly lacking, all of them. Therefore the cherished silver thimbles were sent to the melting pot and the spurs were the result, not particularly valuable intrinsically; but as relics invaluable.
