THE INDIVIDUALITY OF MEN.

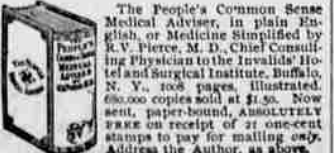

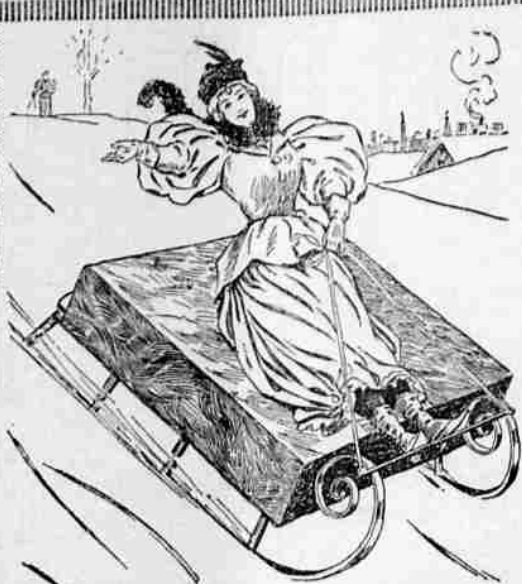
