MAZAMAS VS SHEEP.

Is the Cascade park reserve to be maintained at the expense of the people for the benefit of a few pleasure seekers—for no other visible good can come from it—who will not visit it more than once in two or three years, while the deserving settler seeking for an honest livelihood is to be deprived of its use? It would seem that way according to the clipping below which is taken from the Roseburg Review.

"Sheepmen who are herding their stock on the Crater lake reserve will be prosecuted by the government. Information against nine of them has already been filed in the United States court at Portland by the district attorney. The complaint was made by H S Whitford, secretary of the Crater lake club at Ashland, who wired the facts to Rev E M Wilber of Portland, who is also a Mazama. Now that their society intends making an excursion there, they say that it is not pleasant to think that the park is full of sheep and in defiance of the law. A deputy United States marshal was dispatched to Crater lake with instructions to arrest the sheepmen and to put and keep them off of the reserve."

The Oregon State Journal, published and edited by Harrison R Kincaid, the present republican secretary of the state of Oregon, refuses to sail under the colors of McKinley and Hobart. It comes out strongly for free coinage of silver, and prints some very able editorials on the subject. Col E Hofer, editor of the staunch republican paper, the daily Capital Journal of Salem, is state committeeman of the new silver party for Oregon. He will have the direction of the Bryan and Sewall campaign in this state as far as the silver party is concerned, and promises to make it a hummer.

Salem Independent: The Oregon State Journal, published by H R Kincaid, secretary of state, continues to come out strongly for the free coinage of silver, and prints some very able editorials on the subject. Mr Kincaid is a bold, fearless and honest man, and he will say what he believes to be right though the heavens should fall.

The Portland Telegram exposes its candidate in the following, which indicates that he must have a hired speaker to take the field for him: "McKinley cannot be dragged into a joint debate, but the boy orator is reminded that there is a person named Bourke Cockran who would probably consent to meet him in a jawing match."

H K Thurber, of New York, a member of the executive committee of the American Protective Tariff League and who handled the list of contributions to the Harrison campaign fund of 1892, is out for Bryan and free coinage. He says: "I verily believe that Bryan and Sewall will win in this fight. It is uprising of the people against opposition. I think the result in November will open the eyes of the republicans." Mr Thurber is one of those who consider free silver a better protective measure to American industry than protection itself.
